7	<pre>improvement districts; adding definition; clarifying what can receive certain benefit from improvement</pre>
8	district; and providing an effective date.
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11	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
12	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 11 O.S. 2011, Section 39-102, is
13	amended to read as follows:
14	Section 39-102. As used in the Improvement District Act, the
15	singular includes the plural and:
16	1. "Acquired" means the acquisition of property or interests in
17	property by purchase, gift, condemnation or other lawful means;
18	2. "City" means any city or town incorporated pursuant to the
19	laws of Oklahoma;
20	3. "Engineer" means a city engineer, city official, employee or
21	other person competent to advise and assist the governing body in
22	planning and making an improvement;
23	4. "Cost" means any cost necessarily or reasonably incurred in
24	making the improvement, including but not limited to cost of:

1	a. preparation of preliminary reports,
2	b. preparation of plans and specifications,
3	c. preparation and publication of notices of hearings,
4	resolutions, ordinances, and other proceedings,
5	d. fees and expenses for engineers, attorneys, laborers
6	and other personal services,
7	e. rights-of-way, materials and other lawful expenses
8	incurred in making any improvement, and
9	f. capitalized interest, funding of reserves, premiums
10	for reserve surety bonds, and obtaining bond
11	insurance, letters of credit or other credit
12	enhancements or liquidity instruments;
13	5. "District" means an area designated by the governing body to
14	be benefited by an improvement and subjected to payment of special
15	assessments for all or a portion of the cost of the improvement;
16	6. "Governing body" means the city council, city commission or
17	board of trustees of an incorporated city or town;
18	7. "Improve" means to construct, reconstruct, maintain,
19	restore, replace, renew, repair, install, equip, extend, purchase,
20	alter or otherwise perform any work which provides a new facility,
21	or enhances, extends or restores the value or usefulness of an
22	existing facility;
23	8. "Improvement" means any type of improvement made or service
24	provided by authority of this Improvement District Act and includes

1 reimprovement of any prior improvement made pursuant to any other
2 act;

3 9. "Mail" means by first-class mail;

10. "Trustee" means a city acting pursuant to this act;
11. "Street" means any highway, street, alley, boulevard,
avenue, right-of-way, public ground, or other public facility, or
any part thereof; and

8 12. "Publish" or "publication" means printing in a newspaper 9 which maintains an office in the city or town and is of general 10 circulation within the city or town, or, if there is no newspaper 11 which maintains an office in the city or town, a newspaper of 12 general circulation within the city or town and in two (2) separate 13 issues thereof, at least seven (7) days apart; and

14 <u>13. "Business" means any enterprise operating within the</u> 15 <u>jurisdiction of the governing body which is licensed to conduct</u> 16 business.

17 SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 11 O.S. 2011, Section 39-103, is 18 amended to read as follows:

Section 39-103. The governing body of any city may create one or more districts for the purpose of making or causing to be made any improvement or combination of improvements that confer special benefit upon property <u>or businesses</u> within the district. Such improvement or combination of improvements may include the following, without limitation because of enumeration:

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Acquisition of property or interest in property when
 necessary for any of the purposes authorized by the Improvement
 District Act;

2. Opening, creating, widening, and extending or altering of
streets to improve paving, and surfacing, constructing and
reconstructing gutters, curbs, sidewalks, crosswalks, driveway
entrances and structures, drainage facilities, and service
connections from sewers, water, gas, electricity, and other utility
mains, conduits or pipes;

Constructing or improving main and lateral storm water
 drains and sanitary sewer systems and facilities;

Installation or improvement of street lights and street
 lighting systems;

14 5. Construction or improvement of water mains and waterworks 15 systems;

16 6. Improvement of parks, playgrounds, and recreational 17 facilities;

18 7. Improvement of any street, parking or other facility by
19 landscaping, or planting of trees, shrubs, and other plants;

20 8. Constructing or improving dikes, levees, and other flood 21 control works, gates, lift stations, bridges, and streets 22 appurtenant thereto;

9. Constructing or improving vehicle and pedestrian bridges,
 overpasses and tunnels;

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1 10. Constructing or improving retaining walls and area walls on 2 public ways or land abutting thereon;

3 11. Constructing or improving property for off-street parking 4 facilities, including construction and equipment of buildings 5 thereon;

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12. Constructing or improving pedestrian malls; or

7 13. Constructing or improving offsite facilities or
8 infrastructure serving all or a portion of land within a district;
9 notwithstanding that, such facilities or infrastructure may also
10 serve areas outside a district, but subject to cost apportionment
11 requirements of subsection A of Section 39-110 of this title; or

12 <u>14. Services of marketing, promoting or branding of the</u> 13 <u>governing jurisdiction or any improvements or business with the</u> 14 governing jurisdiction.

15 SECTION 3. AMENDATORY 11 O.S. 2011, Section 39-104, is 16 amended to read as follows:

Section 39-104. Any district may include one or more streets or 17 areas which need not be contiguous and may include two (2) or more 18 types of improvements. Such improvements may be included in one (1) 19 proceeding and constructed and financed as one improvement. 20 The district shall include, for the purpose of assessment, all the 21 property or businesses which the governing body determines is 22 benefited by the improvement or improvements, including property 23 utilized for public, governmental, burial, or charitable purposes, 24

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1 except property of any religious organization used primarily for 2 religious purposes, or of the United States, or any agency, 3 instrumentality or corporation thereof, in the absence of consent of 4 Congress. The board of county commissioners, the governing body of 5 a city, town, school district or any agency or institution of state 6 government is authorized to pay the amount assessed against property 7 under its ownership or control.

8 SECTION 4. AMENDATORY 11 O.S. 2011, Section 39-105, is 9 amended to read as follows:

10 Section 39-105. A. Whenever the boundary of a city is upon or 11 along any street which at that point lies wholly within, partly 12 within or partly without or wholly outside of its boundary, but contiguous to the boundary of the city, the governing body of such 13 city may include the street in the district, improve that portion of 14 such street and assess a part of the cost thereof against the 15 abutting property or businesses lying on both sides of such street. 16 Provided, however, if such street is wholly or partly within the 17 boundary of another city, the governing body of such other city 18 shall, by resolution, consent to the improvement and give its 19 consent to assessment of the benefited property or businesses. 20

B. If, within thirty (30) days after the adoption of the
ordinance levying the assessment by the city creating the district,
the governing body of the city in which the property <u>or business</u> is

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situated does not, by resolution, consent or ratify the assessments,
 the governing body of the city creating the district may:

3 1. Modify the boundary of the district to exclude the property4 or businesses from the district;

5 2. Assume the cost of the improvement assessed against the6 property or businesses lying beyond the boundary of the city; or

Nullify the proceedings, including any contract, relating to
the district. Any failure on the part of the governing body of the
other city to ratify the assessments levied by the city creating the
improvement district shall not affect the validity of the
assessments which have been levied against any property or
<u>businesses</u> lying within the limits of the city creating the
improvement district.

C. The owner, or his designated agent, of any property <u>or</u> <u>business</u> lying outside the boundary of the city creating the district and in the district, including the county and any affected subdivision outside the city, shall have the same rights granted to owners of property <u>or business</u> lying within the boundary of the city creating the district.

D. Whenever a part of the boundary of two or more cities is upon or along any street or is along the edge of any street and the governing bodies of the cities determine the necessity for making an improvement upon any portion of the street, the governing bodies of

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1 the cities may contract, upon such terms as are to them mutually 2 agreeable, to make the improvement. The contract shall:

3 1. Authorize one of the cities to create the district pursuant4 to the Improvement District Act; and

2. Prescribe the apportionment of the costs, if any, among the
cities and the manner and payment of such cost. The payment of such
costs by the cities party to the contract is lawful whether the
improvement is wholly within, partly within and partly without or
wholly outside its limits.

10 SECTION 5. AMENDATORY 11 O.S. 2011, Section 39-106, is 11 amended to read as follows:

Section 39-106. A. For area within the boundary of a city, a petition shall be filed with the city clerk. The petition shall state in bold, capitalized letters at the top of the page that the cost of the proposed improvements shall be assessed against the property <u>or businesses</u> benefited by the improvements. In addition, the petition shall be in a format which:

18 1. Sets forth:

the general nature of the improvements to be made, 19 a. the estimated or probable cost of the proposal, 20 b. the area of the proposed district to be assessed, 21 с. d. the proposed method of assessment, and 22 the proposed apportionment of cost, if any, between 23 e. the district and the city at large; and 24

- 1 2. Is signed by:
- a majority of the resident owners of record of 2 a. 3 property liable for assessment under the proposal, or the resident owners of record of more than one-half b. 4 5 (1/2) of the area liable for assessment under the 6 proposal, or the owners of record of more than one-half (1/2) of 7 с. the area liable to be assessed under the proposal, or 8 9 d. in the case of assessments levied against businesses, 10 businesses which are estimated to pay one-half (1/2)of the total assessment to be paid in the district's 11 12 initial year. 13 For area outside the boundary of a city, a petition shall be Β. filed with the city clerk which: 14 Sets forth: 15 1. the general nature of the improvements to be made, 16 a. b. the estimated or probable cost of the proposal, 17 the area of the proposed district to be assessed, 18 с. the proposed method of assessment, 19 d. the proposed apportionment of cost, if any, between 20 e. the district and the city at large; and 21 2. Is signed by: 22 a majority of the resident owners of record of 23 a. property liable for assessment under the proposal, and 24

b. the owners of record of more than one-half (1/2) of
 the area liable for assessment under the proposal; and
 3. States the area is contiguous to, but not within, the
 boundary of the city.

5 C. Whenever Except as provided in subsection F of this section, 6 <u>whenever</u> the governing body, either upon its own initiative or in 7 response to a petition, determines that the creation of the <u>a</u> 8 district is necessary, it may by resolution direct the engineer to 9 prepare preliminary plans and an estimate of cost for the proposed 10 district. The resolution shall:

Describe in general terms the property to be included in the
 district;

13 2. Require the engineer to prepare:

- a. an assessment plat showing the area to be included in
 the improvement district, and
- b. an addendum to the assessment plat showing the amount
 of maximum benefit estimated to be assessed against
 each tract or parcel in the district on a front-foot,
 zone, area or other equitable basis, which basis shall
 be set forth in the resolution; and

21 3. Require the engineer to prepare preliminary plans for one or 22 more types of improvement showing:

a. for each type of curb, gutter, sidewalk, and street, a
typical section of the contemplated improvement, the

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1 type of material to be used and the approximate thickness and width of the material, 2 3 b. for each type of storm sewer or drain, sanitary sewer or water line, the type of material and approximate 4 5 diameter or diameters of any trunk lines, mains, laterals or house connections, or 6 7 с. for each other type of improvement or other major component of the foregoing types of improvements, a 8 9 general description. 10 D. The engineer shall include in the total cost estimate for the district all expenses including but not limited to advertising, 11 12 legal, appraising, engineering, and printing expenses which the 13 engineer deems necessary to pay the complete cost of the improvement. 14 The engineer shall submit to the city clerk the: 15 Е. Assessment plat; 16 1. 2. Preliminary plans of the type of construction; and 17 Estimate of costs for the improvement. 3. 18 Wherever the governing body, either upon its own initiative 19 F. or in response to a petition determines that the creation of a 20 district providing services pursuant to paragraph 14 of Section 39-21 103 of this title is necessary, the following procedures and rules 22 shall apply in lieu of subsections C, D and E of this section. 23 24

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1	The engineer's report referred to throughout this act shall not
2	be required for the districts. Such districts shall be supported by
3	a management plan which contains:
4	1. A map of the district's exterior boundaries in sufficient
5	detail to allow a business owner to reasonably determine whether a
6	business is located within the district boundaries;
7	2. A description of the kinds of businesses to be included in
8	the district and a list of the businesses to be assessed upon the
9	district's creation including the address of each business;
10	3. A description of the assessment methodology including but
11	not limited to collection and enforcement provisions;
12	4. The specific number of years for which the assessment will
13	be levied including the start and end date;
14	5. A designation of the initial service provider; and
15	6. Any other rules and regulations to be applicable to the
16	district.
17	G. After the governing body examines the assessment plat,
18	preliminary plans, and estimates of cost of improvements or service
19	for the district, the governing body may adopt a resolution which:
20	1. Proposes that the district be created and the improvement to
21	be constructed or provided; and
22	2. Instructs the city clerk or engineer to give notice of a
23	hearing on the proposed district.
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1 SECTION 6. AMENDATORY 11 O.S. 2011, Section 39-107, is amended to read as follows: 2 3 Section 39-107. A. The notice as to creating an improvement district shall: 4 5 1. Contain the time and place when the governing body shall hold a hearing on the resolution to create the district; 6 7 2. Describe the improvement to be constructed or provided and the general location thereof; and 8 9 3. State that any interested person may ascertain in the office of the municipal clerk: 10 11 a. a description of the property or businesses to be 12 assessed, and b. the maximum amount of benefit estimated to be 13 conferred on each tract or parcel of land or business. 14 15 B. Not more than thirty (30) days nor less than ten (10) days before the day of the hearing, the city clerk, his or her deputy or 16 17 the engineer shall mail the notice of the hearing on the proposed district to the owner of the tract or parcel of land or owner of the 18 businesses to be assessed the cost of the improvement at his the 19 last-known address. The name and address of the owner of each tract 20 of land shall be obtained from the records of the county treasurer, 21 and the name and address of the owner of each business shall be 22 obtained from the records of the city. The notice shall contain a 23 preliminary basis for estimating the assessment. Proof of the 24

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mailing is to be made by affidavit of the city clerk, his <u>or her</u> deputy, or the engineer, which shall be filed in the office of the city clerk. Failure of the owner to receive any notice shall not invalidate any of the proceedings authorized in the Improvement District Act.

C. Notice of the hearing shall also be published. The last
publication shall be at least seven (7) days prior to the day of the
hearing. Such service by publication shall be verified by an
affidavit of the publisher which is to be filed in the office of the
city clerk.

11 SECTION 7. AMENDATORY 11 O.S. 2011, Section 39-108, is 12 amended to read as follows:

13 Section 39-108. A. At the hearing of the governing body on the 14 proposed resolution creating a district, any interested person or 15 owner of property <u>or businesses</u> to be assessed for the improvement 16 may file a written protest or objection questioning the:

17 1. Propriety and advisability of constructing <u>or providing</u> the 18 improvement;

19 2. Estimated cost of the improvement;

20 3. Manner of paying for the improvement; and

4. Amount to be assessed against the individual tract or parcel
 of land or business.

B. The governing body may recess the hearing from time to timeso that all protestants may be heard.

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1 C. At the hearing, the governing body may:

Correct any mistake or irregularity in any proceeding
 relating to the improvement;

4 2. Correct an assessment made against any tract or parcel of
5 land or business;

3. In case of any invalidity, reassess the cost of the
7 improvement against an abutting tract or parcel of land <u>or business;</u>
8 4. Delete any tract or parcel of land <u>or business</u>, protested by
9 the owner, from the district; and

10 5. Recess the hearing from time to time.

11 D. Within thirty (30) days after the governing body has 12 concluded the hearing; determined the advisability of providing or constructing the improvement and the type and character of the 13 improvement; and created the improvement district, any person who, 14 during the hearing, filed a written protest with the governing body 15 protesting the construction or provision of the improvement may 16 17 commence an action in district court to correct or set aside the determination of the governing body. After the lapse of thirty (30) 18 days succeeding the determination of the governing body, any action 19 attacking the validity of the proceedings and the amount of benefit 20 to be derived from the improvement is perpetually barred. Provided, 21 however, if the owners of fifty percent (50%) or more in area of the 22 tracts or parcels within the district or a majority of the owners of 23 record of property in the assessment area or businesses which pay 24

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1 more than one-half (1/2) of the estimated annual assessment protest, 2 in writing, the creation of the district, the district shall not be 3 created.

4 SECTION 8. AMENDATORY 11 O.S. 2011, Section 39-109, is 5 amended to read as follows:

Section 39-109. After the governing body creates a district, 6 7 the governing body may proceed, either to make the improvement by force accounting, or call for sealed bids on the proposed 8 9 improvement, or where the district comprises land owned by a single 10 party, developer, or other legal entity that has petitioned for the 11 creation of the district, contract with that single party, developer 12 or other legal entity to make the improvement for future dedication or other conveyance to the city; provided, however, in the case of 13 the districts created pursuant to Section 39-103.1 or paragraph 14 14 15 of Section 39-103 of this title and except as otherwise provided in this section, the governing body may contract for said services 16 without calling for sealed bids or force accounting. The notice 17 shall state the manner of payment to the contractor and whether the 18 contractor will be paid in money, in bonds or in a proportion of 19 money and bonds for making the improvement. The governing body may 20 to the extent that funds are available authorize payments to the 21 contractor during the construction of the improvement provided that 22 the payments do not exceed the amount of work completed and that ten 23 percent (10%) of such payments shall be retained by the city pending 24

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final acceptance by the city of the improvement. The term "improvement" as used in this section and Sections 101 through 136 of Title 61 of the Oklahoma Statutes shall not include any services or maintenance authorized and provided pursuant to Section 39-103.1 <u>or paragraph 14 of Section 39-103</u> of this title.

6 SECTION 9. AMENDATORY 11 O.S. 2011, Section 39-110, is 7 amended to read as follows:

Section 39-110. A. Following a hearing held pursuant to 8 9 Section 39-108 of this title, the governing body shall determine the 10 maximum portion of the total estimated cost of the improvement that 11 shall be assessed against benefited tracts or parcels of land or, if 12 a contract for construction or acquisition of improvements has already been awarded, the portion of the total actual cost of the 13 improvement to be assessed against such tracts or parcels. 14 The maximum annual assessment may include the estimated costs of the 15 administration and collection of assessments and the administration 16 17 of associated bonds or other related funds. The governing body may use funds from any source, public or private, to pay for all or a 18 portion of the assessment or the cost of the improvement. 19 The assessment, including the cost of the improvement at an 20 intersection, shall not exceed the estimated benefit to the tract or 21 parcel of land assessed. Provided, however, the cost per front foot 22 to be assessed against the benefiting property for paving a street, 23 for paving alone, shall not exceed the cost per front foot assessed 24

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1 for paving a street that does not exceed thirty-six (36) feet in
2 width.

B. With the assistance of the engineer, the governing body
shall prepare and cause to be filed in the office of the city clerk
an assessment roll containing, among other things:

1. The name and address of the last-known owner of each tract
or parcel of land to be assessed, or if the name of the owner is
unknown, state "unknown". The name and address of the owner of each
tract of land shall be obtained from the records of the county
treasurer;

11 2. A description of the tract or parcel of land to be assessed; 12 and

The amount of the assessment against each tract or parcel of
 land.

C. After the filing of the assessment roll, the governing body 15 shall, by resolution, set a time and place for the assessment 16 hearing when an owner may object to the amount of the assessment. 17 With regard to a district providing services pursuant to 18 D. paragraph 14 of Section 39-103 of this title, subsections A, B, and 19 C of Section 39-110 of this title shall not apply and the governing 20 body shall provide notices to each business of the assessment 21 methodology. 22

<u>E.</u> Not more than thirty (30) days nor less than ten (10) days
before the day of the hearing, the city clerk, the city clerk's

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1 deputy or the engineer shall mail the notice of the hearing on the 2 assessment roll to the each business or owner of the tract or parcel 3 of land being assessed the cost of the improvement. Proof of the mailing is to be made by affidavit of the city clerk, the city 4 5 clerk's deputy or the engineer, which shall be filed in the office of the city clerk. Failure of the owner to receive any notice shall 6 7 not invalidate any of the proceedings authorized in the Improvement District Act. Notice of the hearing shall also be published. 8 The 9 last publication shall be at least seven (7) days prior to the day 10 of the hearing. Such service by publication shall be verified by an 11 affidavit of the publisher which is to be filed in the office of the 12 city clerk.

E. F. Any property which shall be owned by the city, town or 13 county, or any board of education or school district, shall be 14 15 treated and considered the same as the property of other owners, and such city, town, county, school district or board of education 16 within such district to be assessed may pay the total assessment 17 against its property without interest within thirty (30) days from 18 the date of the publication of the ordinance levying the assessment, 19 or, in the event the same is not paid in full without interest 20 within said the thirty-day period, such city, town, county, school 21 district or board of education shall annually provide by the levy of 22 taxes a sufficient sum to pay the maturing installments of 23 assessments and interest thereon. 24

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1SECTION 10.AMENDATORY11 O.S. 2011, Section 39-111, is2amended to read as follows:

3 Section 39-111. A. Not later than three (3) days before the date of the hearing on the assessment roll, any owner of a business 4 5 listed in the management plan of the district or a tract or parcel of land which is listed on the assessment roll may file his or her 6 7 specific objections to the amount of the assessment in writing with the city clerk. Unless presented as required in this subsection, 8 9 any objection is deemed waived as to the regularity, validity and 10 correctness of:

11 1. The proceedings;

12 2. The assessment roll;

Each assessment contained on the assessment roll; or
 The amount of the assessment levied against each <u>business or</u>
 tract or parcel of land.

B. At the hearing, the governing body shall hear all objections which have been filed as provided in this section and may recess the hearing from time to time and, by resolution, revise, correct, confirm or set aside any assessment and order another assessment be made de novo.

C. The governing body by ordinance shall by reference to such assessment roll, or assessment roll as modified, if modified, and as confirmed by resolution, levy the assessments contained in the

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1 assessment roll <u>or management plan</u>. The decision, resolution and 2 ordinance of the governing body shall be:

A final determination of the regularity, validity and
 correctness of the proceedings, the assessment roll <u>or management</u>
 <u>plan</u>, each assessment contained on the assessment roll, the amount
 of the assessment levied against each <u>business or</u> tract or parcel of
 land; and

8 2. Conclusive upon the owners of the <u>business or</u> tract or
9 parcel of land assessed.

10 D. Within fifteen (15) days after the publication or posting of 11 the ordinance, any owner who has filed an objection as provided in 12 this section may commence an action in district court to correct or set aside the determination of the governing body. After the lapse 13 of fifteen (15) days after the publication or posting of the 14 ordinance, all actions, which include the defense of confiscation or 15 attack the regularity, validity and correctness of the proceedings, 16 the assessment roll, each assessment contained on the assessment 17 roll, and the amount of the assessment levied against each business 18 or tract or parcel of land, are perpetually barred. 19

20 SECTION 11. AMENDATORY 11 O.S. 2011, Section 39-112, is 21 amended to read as follows:

Section 39-112. A. The governing body may by ordinance:

 Establish the time and terms of paying the assessment or an
 installment on the assessment;

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Set a rate of interest not exceeding ten percent (10%) per
 annum upon deferred payments of the assessment which shall commence
 from the date of publication of the ordinance ratifying the
 assessment;

3. Set interest rates not exceeding ten percent (10%) per annum
upon the outstanding principal amount of bonds issued by a district
pursuant to Section 39-115 of this title; and

8 4. Fix penalties to be charged for delinquent payment of an9 installment on an assessment.

10 в. After the publication of the ordinance ratifying an 11 assessment levied as provided in Section 39-111 of this title, the 12 assessment with any interest or penalty accruing on such assessment shall constitute a lien upon the business or tract or parcel of land 13 so assessed. Such lien shall be coequal with the lien for ad 14 valorem taxes and the lien of other improvement districts, and be 15 superior to all other liens, claims and titles. Unmatured 16 installments are not deemed to be within the terms of any general 17 covenant or warranty. All purchasers, mortgagees or encumbrancers 18 of a tract or parcel of land so assessed shall acquire the tract or 19 parcel of land subject to the lien so created. 20

C. Within sixty (60) days after the publication of the ordinance ratifying an assessment roll, the city clerk shall prepare, sign, attest with the municipal seal and record in the

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office of the county clerk a claim of lien for any unpaid amount due
 and assessed against a tract or parcel of land.

D. Any tract or parcel so assessed shall not be relieved from the assessment or lien by the sale of the tract or parcel of land for taxes or any other assessment, subject to the provisions of Section 39-119 of this title. The statute of limitations shall not begin to run against an assessment until after the last installment of the assessment becomes due.

9 E. The fact that an improvement is omitted in front of any 10 tract or parcel of land does not invalidate a lien or assessment 11 made against any other tract or parcel of land.

12 F. A delinquent installment of an assessment shall be foreclosed and the tract or parcel of land concerned be sold in the 13 manner provided by law for foreclosure of mortgages on land. If, at 14 15 the sale, there is no better bidder for the tract or parcel of land 16 the municipality shall bid in the tract or parcel of land for the amount due on the assessment plus any interest, penalties or costs 17 which have accrued against the assessment. Any real estate sold 18 under any order, judgment or decree of court to satisfy the lien may 19 be redeemed by the owner or his or her assignee at any time within 20 one (1) year of the date of sale by paying to the purchaser thereof 21 or assignee the amount paid with interest from the date of purchase 22 at the rate of twelve percent (12%) per annum. 23

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1 G. With regard to a district providing services pursuant to 2 paragraph 14 of Section 39-103, subsections A through F of this 3 section shall not be applicable and the governing body shall provide 4 as part of the management plan procedures related to the collection 5 and enforcement of the assessment. SECTION 12. AMENDATORY 11 O.S. 2011, Section 39-116, is 6 amended to read as follows: 7 Section 39-116. A. Whenever a district has been created and 8 9 bonds have been issued to finance the improvement, a city shall 10 either itself, or acting through a third party administrator: 1. Collect the assessments annually or semiannually 11 12 periodically; 2. Act as trustee for the benefit of the holders of the bonds; 13 provided that, the city may contract with a bank with trust powers 14 15 to act as trustees; 16 3. Annually prepare a statement which shall: be available for inspection in the office of the city 17 a. treasurer, 18 reflect the financial condition of the district, 19 b. list all the delinquencies existing at that time, and 20 с. institute proceedings to foreclose the assessment lien d. 21 against any tract or parcel of land which is 22 delinquent in the payment of the assessment or 23 installment of an assessment for a period of more than 24

1one (1) year. In lieu of the foreclosure of a lien2against any tract or parcel of land which is3delinquent in the payment of an assessment or4installment of an assessment for a period of more than5one (1) year, a city may accept a deed to the property6subject to the lien if the owner of the property7tenders the deed to the municipality.

If more than one district is created, the money from 8 Β. 9 assessments in each district shall be kept in a separate fund and 10 used for the payment of principal and interest of the bonds outstanding against that district. Nothing herein shall prevent the 11 12 appointment and compensation by the district of a registrar, 13 transfer, authenticating, paying or other agents to effect affect the transfer of ownership, change of payee of any bond issued by the 14 district and to maintain books and records relating thereto. 15

16 C. Neither any member of the governing body of a city creating 17 a district nor any person acting on behalf of the city or district, 18 while acting within the scope of his or her authority, shall be 19 subject to any personal liability for any action taken or omitted 20 within that scope of authority.

SECTION 13. This act shall become effective November 1, 2015.
