AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 24-100a, is amended to read as follows: 14 Section 24-100a. A. This act shall be known and may be cited 15 as the "Healthy and Fit Kids Act of 2004". 16 Beginning September 1, 2004, each public school shall 17 Β. establish a Healthy and Fit School Advisory Committee, to be 18 composed of at least six members. The Advisory Committee may be 19 20 composed of teachers, administrators, parents of students, health care professionals and business community representatives. 21 A public school may combine the Healthy and Fit School Advisory 22 Committee with its Safe School Committee, established pursuant to 23 Section 24-100.5 of this title. 24

C. Each Healthy and Fit School Advisory Committee shall study 1 2 and make recommendations to the school principal regarding: Health education; 3 1. 2. Physical education and physical activity; and 4 5 3. Nutrition and health services. The principal shall give consideration to recommendations of 6 D. the committee. 7 Е. The State Board of Education shall adopt rules for 8 9 monitoring compliance with this section and is authorized to report 10 a school as deficient on the accreditation report for noncompliance with the provisions of this section. 11 70 O.S. 2011, Section 24-100.3, as 12 SECTION 2. AMENDATORY amended by Section 2, Chapter 311, O.S.L. 2013 (70 O.S. Supp. 2018, 13 Section 24-100.3), is amended to read as follows: 14 Section 24-100.3. A. As used in the School Safety and Bullying 15 Prevention Act: 16 "Bullying" means any pattern of harassment, intimidation, 17 1. threatening behavior, physical acts, verbal or unwanted, aggressive 18 behavior committed in person or by electronic communication directed 19 toward a student or group of students: 20 that results in or is reasonably perceived as being 21 a. done with the intent to cause negative educational or 22 physical results for the targeted individual or group 23 and is communicated in such a way as to disrupt or 24

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1 interfere with the school's educational mission or the 2 education of any student, and 3 that involves a real or perceived power imbalance and b. 4 is repeated or is highly likely to be repeated. 5 Bullying actions shall include but not be limited to harassment, intimidation, threatening behavior, spreading rumors, attacking 6 7 someone physically or verbally and excluding someone from a group as 8 a means of causing harm; 9 2. "Power imbalance" means the attempt by a perpetrator to use observed or perceived personal or situational characteristics to 10 11 exert control over a targeted student's behavior or limit a victim's 12 ability to respond or stop the aggression; 3. "At school" means on school grounds, in school vehicles, at 13 school-sponsored activities, or at school-sanctioned events; 14 15 3. 4. "Electronic communication" means the communication of any written, verbal, pictorial information or video content by means of 16 an electronic device, including, but not limited to, a telephone, a 17 mobile or cellular telephone or other wireless telecommunication 18 device, or a computer; and 19 4. 5. "Threatening behavior" means any pattern of behavior or 20 isolated action, whether or not it is directed at another person, 21 that a reasonable person would believe indicates potential for 22 future harm to students, school personnel, or school property. 23

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B. Nothing in this act Section 24-100.1 et seq. of this title
 shall be construed to impose a specific liability on any school
 district.

4 SECTION 3. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 24-100.5, as
5 last amended by Section 2, Chapter 246, O.S.L. 2015 (70 O.S. Supp.
6 2018, Section 24-100.5), is amended to read as follows:

7 Section 24-100.5. A. Every year each public school site shall establish a Safe School Committee to be composed of at least seven 8 9 (7) members. The Safe School Committee shall be composed of 10 teachers, parents of enrolled students, students, and a school 11 official who participates in the investigation of reports of 12 bullying as required by subsection A of Section 24-100.4 of this 13 title and a person not employed by the school district. The Committee may include administrators, school staff, school 14 volunteers, community representatives, and local law enforcement 15 agencies. The Committee shall assist the school board in promoting 16 a positive school climate through planning, implementing and 17 evaluating effective prevention, readiness and response strategies, 18 including the policy required by Section 24-100.4 of this title. 19

B. The Safe School Committee shall study and makerecommendations to the principal regarding:

Unsafe conditions, possible strategies for students, faculty
 and staff to avoid physical and emotional harm at school, student

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1 victimization, crime prevention, school violence, and other issues
2 which prohibit the maintenance of a safe school;

3 2. Student bullying as defined in Section 24-100.3 of this4 title;

5 3. Professional development needs of faculty and staff to recognize and implement methods to decrease student bullying; and 6 Methods to encourage the involvement of the community and 7 4. students, the development of individual relationships between 8 9 students and school staff, and use of problem-solving teams and resources that include counselors and other behavioral health and 10 11 suicide prevention resources within or outside the school system.

In its considerations, the Safe School Committee shall review the district policy for the prevention of bullying and the list of research-based programs appropriate for the prevention of bullying of students at school compiled by the State Department of Education. In addition, the Committee may review traditional and accepted bullying prevention programs utilized by other states, state agencies, or school districts.

19 C. The Safe School Committee may study and make recommendations 20 to the school district board of education regarding the development 21 of a rape or sexual assault response program that may be implemented 22 at the school site.

23 D. Each public school site shall:

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1 1. Publicize information about the Safe School Committee including, but not limited to, meeting dates and times; and 2 3 2. Require the Safe School Committee to meet at least once each 4 semester. 5 The State Department of Education shall: Ε. Develop a model policy and deliver training materials to all 6 1. school districts on the components that should be included in a 7 school district policy for the prevention of bullying; and 8 9 2. Compile and distribute to each public school site, 10 prominently display on the State Department of Education website and annually publicize in print media a list of research-based programs 11 12 appropriate for the prevention of bullying of students. If a school district implements a commercial bullying prevention program, it 13 shall use a program listed by the State Department of Education. 14 15 F. The State Board of Education shall adopt rules for 16 monitoring compliance with this section and is authorized to report a school as deficient on the accreditation report for noncompliance 17 with the provisions of this section. 18 E. G. The provisions of this section shall not apply to 19 technology center schools. 20 SECTION 4. This act shall become effective July 1, 2019. 21 SECTION 5. It being immediately necessary for the preservation 22 of the public peace, health or safety, an emergency is hereby 23 24

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1	declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
2	be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
