14	AMENDMENT NO. 1. Strike the title, enacting clause, and entire bill and insert:
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17	"An Act relating to professions and occupations; amending 59 O.S. 2021, Section 698.33, which relates
18	to the Oklahoma Veterinary Practice Act; modifying veterinary training program for rural Oklahoma;
19	updating references; and declaring an emergency.
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22	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
23	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 59 O.S. 2021, Section 698.33, is
24	amended to read as follows:

Section 698.33 A. There is hereby established the veterinary training program for rural Oklahoma to be administered by the Oklahoma State University Center for College of Veterinary Health Sciences Medicine. The program shall be developed and implemented in order to provide encouragement, opportunities and incentives for persons pursuing a veterinary medicine degree at Oklahoma State University to locate their veterinary practice in rural Oklahoma communities, and receive specialized training targeted to meet the needs of livestock producers in rural Oklahoma communities.

- B. Subject to available funds, each year the Veterinary Center College may enter into program agreements with up to three first-year five veterinary students or currently practicing large animal veterinarians with qualifying school loans, as determined by the Veterinary Center. Preference shall be given to those students and focused on large animal veterinarians veterinary medicine who are Oklahoma residents and who agree to serve in a community as described in paragraph 3 of subsection D of this section, which is determined by the Veterinary Center College to be an underserved area for the practice of veterinary medicine.
- C. Subject to available funds, each student or large animal veterinarian entering into a program agreement under this section shall receive assistance in an amount not to exceed Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) per year for not more than four (4) years for tuition, books, supplies and other school expenses, and travel and

- training expenses incurred by the student in pursuing a veterinary
  medicine degree. Upon satisfaction of all commitments under the
  provisions of the agreement and the provisions of this section, the
  financial obligations pursuant to this section shall be deemed
  satisfied and forgiven.
  - D. Each program agreement shall require that the person receiving the assistance:

- 1. Complete the veterinary medicine degree program at the Veterinary Center Oklahoma State University;
- 2. Complete all requirements in public health, livestock biosecurity, foreign animal disease diagnosis, regulatory veterinary medicine and zoonotic disease, and an externship and mentoring requirement with a licensed, accredited veterinarian in rural Oklahoma as required by the Veterinary Center College;
- 3. Engage in the full-time practice of veterinary medicine in any community in Oklahoma which has a population not exceeding twenty-five thousand (25,000) as determined by the most recent Federal Decennial Census at the time the person entered into the program agreement for a period of at least twelve (12) continuous months for each separate year a student receives assistance under the program, unless the obligation is otherwise satisfied as provided in this section. If, after the date a program agreement was entered into by the parties, a community no longer meets the maximum population requirements provided in this paragraph, a person

- engaging in the full-time practice of veterinary medicine pursuant to the program agreement shall continue to practice in that designated community; and
  - 4. Commence the full-time practice of veterinary medicine in that community within ninety (90) days after completion of the person's degree program, or if the person enters a postdegree training program, such as a graduate school or internship or residency program, within ninety (90) days after completion of the postdegree training program.
  - E. Upon the failure of a person to satisfy the obligation to engage in the full-time practice of veterinary medicine in accordance with the provisions of this section, that person shall repay to the Veterinary Center College, within ninety (90) days of the failure, the amount equal to the assistance provided to the person less a prorated amount based on any periods of practice of veterinary medicine meeting the requirements of this section, plus interest at the prime rate of interest plus two four percent (2%) (4%) from the date the assistance accrued. The interest shall be compounded annually.
  - F. An obligation to engage in the practice of veterinary medicine in accordance with the provisions of this section shall be postponed during:

- 1. Any period of temporary medical disability during which the person obligated is unable to practice veterinary medicine due to the disability; and
- 2. Any other period of postponement agreed to or determined in accordance with criteria agreed to in the practice agreement.
- G. An obligation to engage in the practice of veterinary medicine in accordance with the provisions of the agreement and this section shall be satisfied:
- 1. If the obligation to engage in the practice of veterinary medicine in accordance with the agreement has been completed;
- 2. If, because of permanent disability, the person obligated is unable to practice veterinary medicine; or
  - 3. The person who is obligated dies.
- H. The Veterinary Center College may adopt additional provisions, requirements or conditions to participate in this program as are practicable and appropriate to accomplish the provisions of the program or may be required for the implementation or administration of the program, and are not inconsistent with the provisions of this section.
- I. The Veterinary Center College shall not enter into any program agreements pursuant to the provisions of this section after July 1, 2025. All agreements entered into prior to such date shall be valid.

AMENDATORY 29 O.S. 2011, Section 3-103, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 24, O.S.L. 2017 (29 O.S. Supp. 14 2020, Section 3-103), is amended to read as follows: 15 Section 3-103. A. The Wildlife Conservation Commission shall 16 constitute an advisory, administrative and policymaking board for 17 the protection, restoration, perpetuation, conservation, 18 supervision, maintenance, enhancement, and management of wildlife in 19 this state as provided in the Oklahoma Wildlife Conservation Code. 20 The Director shall consult with the Commission regarding the 21 administration of the affairs of the Department of Wildlife 22 Conservation. The Commission is authorized and empowered to require 23 from the Director complete reports and information relative to the 24

- 1 affairs of the Department at the time and in the manner the 2 Commission may deem advisable.
- C. The Commission shall meet in regular session at least nine 3 times per year not to exceed one meeting per month with not more 4 5 than two consecutive calendar months between meetings and in special sessions as may be called by the Chair or a majority of the 6 Commission. The Commission may hold any regular or special session 7 at any location within this state. Should a location be chosen 9 other than Commission headquarters in Oklahoma City for a regular or 10 special meeting, notice shall be posted at Commission headquarters in Oklahoma City and advertised in the local newspaper of the city 11 12 in which the meeting is to be held, at least one time during each of the two (2) weeks prior to the meeting. The advertisements shall 13 include time, date, and address of location of the meeting. 14
  - D. In addition to the other powers and duties prescribed by law, the Commission shall:
  - 1. Institute an affirmative action plan for hiring women and minorities throughout the agency;
  - 2. Elect a chair, vice-chair, and secretary, who shall perform the duties required of them by statutes, rules of the Commission, and the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma. The chair, vice-chair, and secretary shall receive no extra compensation;

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- 3. Appoint a Director, and determine the qualifications of the Director and all assistants and employees. A Commissioner shall not be eligible for employment in any position within the Department;
- 4. Prescribe rules and policies for the transaction of its business and the control of the Department;
- 5. Develop and implement a plan to provide step raises for Commission employees so that discrepancies of pay levels within a pay grade are eliminated;
- 6. Acquire by purchase, lease, gift<sub> $\tau$ </sub> or devise, waters, real property<sub> $\tau$ </sub> and personal property incident to the exercise of its functions and to maintain, operate<sub> $\tau$ </sub> and dispose of the same;
- 7. Acquire real property by condemnation only when the Attorney General or other counsel deems it an appropriate means of clearing title from willing or unavailable sellers;
- 8. Acquire land at a price that is no more than the appraised value only after the land has been publicly offered for sale for a minimum of six (6) months at a fair market value;
- 9. Supervise the establishment, extension, improvement, and operation of the wildlife refuges, propagation areas or stations, public hunting areas, public fishing areas, game management areas, and fish hatcheries;
- 9. 10. Prescribe the manner of cooperation with the Oklahoma

  the state, other state agencies, any agency of the federal
