1 STATE OF OKLAHOMA 2 1st Session of the 59th Legislature (2023) 3 SENATE RESOLUTION 2 By: Young 4 5 6 AS INTRODUCED 7 A Resolution supporting Washington, D.C.; urging Congress; and directing distribution. 8 9 10 WHEREAS, people living on the land that was eventually 11 designated as the District of Columbia were provided the right to 12 vote for representation in Congress when the U.S. Constitution was 13 ratified in 1788; and 14 WHEREAS, the Organic Act of 1801 placed D.C. under the exclusive 15 authority of Congress and abolished residents' congressional and 16 presidential voting rights, which were not granted to them again 17 until the 1961 passage of the 23rd Amendment; and 18 WHEREAS, U.S. Census data estimates that as of 2021, the 19 District of Columbia's population of approximately 689,545 residents 20 is comparable to the populations of Wyoming (576,851), Vermont 21 (643,077), Alaska (733,391), and North Dakota (779,094); and 22 WHEREAS, D.C. residents are denied full representation in 23 Congress, but share all responsibilities of U.S. citizenship, pay 24 more federal taxes than residents of 22 states, serve on federal

juries, and have defended the U.S. as Armed Forces members in every war since the War for Independence; and

WHEREAS, D.C. residents endorse statehood and passed a District-wide referendum on Nov. 8, 2016, which favored statehood by 86%; and WHEREAS, no other democratic nation denies the right of self-government, including participation in its national legislature, to the residents of its capital; and

WHEREAS, Congress repeatedly interferes with D.C.'s limited self-government by enacting laws that affect expenditure of tax revenue, bar the usage of locally raised revenue, thus violating the principle that state and local governments are best suited to represent the will of their citizens; and

WHEREAS, despite D.C. passing consecutive balanced budgets since fiscal year 1997, it still faces the possibility of being shut down yearly because of congressional deliberations over the federal budget; and

WHEREAS, D.C. Delegate Eleanor Holmes Norton and Delaware U.S. Senator Tom Carper introduced in the 117th Congress H.R. 51 and S. 51, the Washington, D.C. Admission Act, that would provide D.C. all the rights of citizenship as taxpaying American citizens, including two Senators and at least one House member; and

WHEREAS, The United Nations Human Rights Committee has called on Congress to address D.C.'s lack of political equality, and the Organization of American States has declared the disenfranchisement

1	of D.C. residents a violation of its charter agreement, to which the
2	U.S. is a signatory.
3	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE 1ST SESSION

5	THAT the Oklahoma Senate supports admitting Washington, D.C.,
6	into the Union as a state of the United States of America.

10	Oklahoma's Congressional delegation.
