SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Requires Oregon Health Authority to study implementation of Ballot Measure 110 (2021). Directs authority to submit findings to interim committees of Legislative Assembly related to health not later than September 15, 2024.]

Requires local planning committees for alcohol and drug prevention and treatment services to coordinate with local Behavioral Health Resource Networks.

Establishes policy of state to encourage treatment and recovery for people struggling with substance use.

Removes four percent cap on amounts from Drug Treatment and Recovery Services Fund that Oregon Health Authority may use for administrative expenses to administer provisions of Ballot Measure 110 (2020).

Modifies appointment of members to Oversight and Accountability Council and staggers terms of members of council. Increases responsibility of authority in processing applications for grants made by council. Modifies requirements for networks to receive grants.

Modifies requirements for Secretary of State audit of uses by grantees of moneys from fund.

Requires community mental health programs to provide guidance and assistance to networks for joint development of programs and activities to increase access to treatment.

Allows authority, with approval of council after July 1, 2025, to implement education campaign to inform public about networks, statewide hotline and other information authority believes will benefit public in accessing behavioral health services.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

Relating to drugs; creating new provisions; and amending ORS 153.043, 153.062, 430.342, 430.383, 430.384, 430.387, 430.388, 430.389, 430.390, 430.391, 430.392 and 430.630.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. ORS 430.342 is amended to read:

430.342. (1) The governing body of each county or combination of counties in a mental health administrative area, as designated by the Alcohol and Drug Policy Commission, shall:

(a) Appoint a local planning committee for alcohol and drug prevention and treatment services;

or

(b) Designate an already existing body to act as the local planning committee for alcohol and drug prevention and treatment services.

(2) The committee shall **coordinate with local Behavioral Health Resource Networks, described in ORS 430.389, to** identify needs and establish priorities for alcohol and drug prevention and treatment services that best suit the needs and values of the community and shall report its findings to the Oregon Health Authority, the governing bodies of the counties served by the committee and the budget advisory committee of the commission.

(3) Members of the local planning committee shall be representative of the geographic area and

1 shall be persons with interest or experience in developing alcohol and drug prevention and treat-
2 ment services. The membership of the committee shall include a number of minority members which
3 reasonably reflects the proportion of the need for prevention, treatment and rehabilitation services
4 of minorities in the community.

5 **SECTION 2.** ORS 430.383 is amended to read:

6 430.383. (1)(a) The people of Oregon find that drug addiction and overdoses are a serious prob-
7 lem in Oregon and that Oregon needs to expand access to drug treatment.

8 (b) The people of Oregon further find that a health-based approach to addiction and overdose is
9 more effective, humane and cost-effective than criminal punishments. Making people criminals be-
10 cause they suffer from addiction is expensive, ruins lives and can make access to treatment and
11 recovery more difficult.

12 (2)(a) The purpose of the Drug Addiction Treatment and Recovery Act of 2020 is to make
13 screening, health assessment, treatment and recovery services for drug addiction available to all
14 those who need and want access to those services and to adopt a health approach to drug addiction
15 by removing criminal penalties for low-level drug possession.

16 (b) It is the policy of the State of Oregon:

17 (A) That screening, health assessment, treatment and recovery services for drug addiction are
18 available to all those who need and want access to those services; **and**

19 (B) **To encourage treatment and recovery for people struggling with substance use.**

20 (3) The provisions of [*chapter 2, Oregon Laws 2021*] **430.383 to 430.390**, shall be interpreted
21 consistently with the findings, purposes and policy objectives stated in this section and shall not be
22 limited by any policy set forth in Oregon law that could conflict with or be interpreted to conflict
23 with the purposes and policy objectives stated in this section.

24 (4) **As used in ORS 430.383 to 430.390, “recovery” means a process of change through**
25 **which individuals improve their health and wellness, live a self-directed life and strive to**
26 **reach their full potential.**

27 **SECTION 3.** ORS 430.384 is amended to read:

28 430.384. (1) The Drug Treatment and Recovery Services Fund is established in the State Treas-
29 ury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. Interest earned by the Drug Treatment and Re-
30 covery Services Fund shall be credited to the fund.

31 (2) The Drug Treatment and Recovery Services Fund shall consist of:

32 (a) Moneys deposited into the fund pursuant to ORS 305.231;

33 (b) Moneys appropriated or otherwise transferred to the fund by the Legislative Assembly;

34 (c) Moneys allocated from the Oregon Marijuana Account, pursuant to ORS 475C.726 (3)(b);

35 (d) Moneys allocated from the Criminal Fine Account pursuant to ORS 137.300 (4); and

36 (e) All other moneys deposited into the fund from any source.

37 (3) Moneys in the fund shall be continuously appropriated to the Oregon Health Authority for
38 the purposes set forth in ORS 430.389.

39 (4)(a) Pursuant to subsection (2)(b) of this section, the Legislative Assembly shall appropriate
40 or transfer to the fund an amount sufficient to fully fund the grants program required by ORS
41 430.389.

42 (b) The total amount deposited and transferred into the fund shall not be less than \$57 million
43 for the first year [*chapter 2, Oregon Laws 2021, is*] **ORS 430.383 to 430.390 are** in effect.

44 (c) In each subsequent year, the minimum transfer amount set forth in paragraph (b) of this
45 subsection shall be increased by not less than the sum of:

1 (A) \$57 million multiplied by the percentage, if any, by which the monthly averaged U.S. City
2 Average Consumer Price Index for the 12 consecutive months ending August 31 of the prior calendar
3 year exceeds the monthly index for the fourth quarter of the calendar year 2020; and

4 (B) The annual increase, if any, in moneys distributed pursuant to ORS 475C.726 (3)(b).

5 **SECTION 4.** ORS 430.387 is amended to read:

6 430.387. The Oregon Health Authority shall cause the moneys in the Drug Treatment and Re-
7 covery Services Fund to be distributed as follows:

8 [(1)(a)] (1) An amount necessary for **the** administration of ORS 430.388 to 430.390 [*not to exceed*
9 *four percent of the moneys deposited into the fund in any biennium.*]

10 [(b)] *The amounts necessary for administration described in paragraph (a) of this subsection do not*
11 *include expenditures*, **excluding amounts necessary** to establish and maintain the telephone
12 hotline described in ORS 430.391 (1).

13 (2) After the distribution set forth in subsection (1) of this section, the remaining moneys in the
14 fund shall be distributed to the grants program as set forth in ORS 430.389.

15 **SECTION 5.** ORS 430.388 is amended to read:

16 430.388. [(1)(a)] (1) The [*Director of the Oregon Health Authority shall establish an*] Oversight and
17 Accountability Council **is established** for the purpose of [*determining how funds will be distributed*
18 *to grant applicants and to oversee*] **overseeing** the implementation of the Behavioral Health Resource
19 Networks pursuant to ORS 430.389. [*The council shall be formed on or before February 1, 2021.*]

20 [(b)] (2) The [*council*] **members of the council** shall [*consist of*] **be** qualified individuals with
21 experience in substance use [*disorder*] treatment and other addiction services[. *The council shall*]
22 **and** consist of:

23 (a) At least one member from each of the following categories [*only*] **appointed by the**
24 **director**:

25 (A) A representative of the Oregon Health Authority, Health Systems Division Behavioral
26 Health Services as a nonvoting member;

27 (B) Three members of communities that have been disproportionately impacted by arrests,
28 prosecution or sentencing for conduct that has been classified or reclassified as a Class E violation;

29 (C) A physician specializing in addiction medicine;

30 (D) A licensed clinical social worker;

31 (E) An evidence-based substance use [*disorder*] **treatment** provider;

32 (F) A harm reduction services provider;

33 (G) A person specializing in housing services for people with substance use [*disorder*] or a di-
34 agnosed mental health condition;

35 (H) An academic researcher specializing in drug use or drug policy;

36 (I) At least two people who suffered or suffer from substance use [*disorder*];

37 (J) At least two recovery peers;

38 (K) A mental or behavioral health care provider;

39 (L) A representative of a coordinated care organization; **and**

40 (M) A person who works for a nonprofit organization that advocates for persons who experience
41 or have experienced substance use [*disorder*]; and

42 [(N)] (b) The Director of the Alcohol and Drug Policy Commission or the director's designated
43 staff person, as [*a*] **an ex officio** nonvoting member.

44 (3) **The director shall appoint an executive director who shall report to and be responsible**
45 **for the duties assigned by the director of the division within the authority that is responsible**

1 **for behavioral health in consultation with the council.**

2 [(2)] (4) A quorum consists of *[two-thirds]* a **majority** of the members of the council[, *rounded*
3 *up to the next odd number of members*].

4 [(3)] (5) The term of office for a member of the council is four years. [*Vacancies shall be ap-*
5 *pointed for the unexpired term.*] **Members are eligible for reappointment. If there is a vacancy**
6 **for any cause, the director shall make an appointment to become immediately available for**
7 **the unexpired term plus two years, but not more than a total of four years.**

8 [(4)(a)] (6)(a) To the extent permissible by law, a member of the council performing services for
9 the council may receive compensation from the member's employer for time spent performing ser-
10 vices as a council member.

11 (b) If a member of the council is not compensated by the member's employer as set forth in
12 paragraph (a) of this subsection, that member shall be entitled to compensation and expenses as
13 provided in ORS 292.495.

14 [(5)] (7) Members of the council are subject to and must comply with the provisions of ORS
15 chapter 244, including ORS 244.045 (4), 244.047, 244.120 and 244.130.

16 **SECTION 6. (1) Notwithstanding the terms of office specified in ORS 430.388, eight voting**
17 **members currently serving on the Oversight and Accountability Council shall be reappointed**
18 **for two-year terms at the end of their current terms, including:**

19 (a) **At least one member from each category described in ORS 430.388 (2)(a)(B), (2)(a)(I)**
20 **and (2)(a)(J); and**

21 (b) **Others chosen by lot.**

22 (2) **The successors to the members who are reappointed to two-year terms shall be ap-**
23 **pointed to four-year terms.**

24 **SECTION 7.** ORS 430.389 is amended to read:

25 430.389. (1) The Oversight and Accountability Council shall [*oversee and*] approve grants and
26 funding **provided by the Oregon Health Authority in accordance with this section** to implement
27 Behavioral Health Resource Networks and increase access to community care[, *as set forth below*].
28 A Behavioral Health Resource Network is an entity or collection of entities that individually or
29 jointly provide some or all of the services described in subsection [(2)(d)] (2)(e) of this section.

30 (2)(a) [*The Oversight and Accountability Council, in consultation with*] The [*Oregon Health*]
31 authority[,] shall [*provide*] **establish an equitable:**

32 (A) **Process for applying for** grants and funding [*to*] **by** agencies or organizations, whether
33 government or community based, to establish Behavioral Health Resource Networks for the purposes
34 of immediately screening the acute needs of [*people who use drugs*] **individuals with substance use,**
35 **including those who also have a mental illness,** and assessing and addressing any ongoing needs
36 through ongoing case management, harm reduction, treatment, housing and linkage to other care
37 and services.

38 (B) **Evaluation process to assess the effectiveness of Behavioral Health Resource Net-**
39 **works that receive grants or funding.**

40 (b) Recipients of grants or funding [*to provide substance use disorder treatment or services*] must
41 be licensed, certified or credentialed by the state, including certification under ORS 743A.168 (8),
42 or meet criteria prescribed by rule by the [*Oversight and Accountability Council*] **authority** under
43 ORS 430.390. A recipient of a grant or funding under this subsection may not use the grant or
44 funding to supplant the recipient's existing funding.

45 [(b)] (c) The council and the authority shall ensure that residents of each county have access

1 to all of the services described in paragraph [(d)] (e) of this subsection.

2 [(c)] (d) Applicants for grants and funding may apply individually or jointly with other network
3 participants to provide services in one or more counties.

4 [(d)] (e) A network must have the capacity to provide the following services and any other
5 services specified by the [council] authority by rule **but no individual participant in a network**
6 **is required to provide all of the services:**

7 (A) Screening by certified addiction peer support or wellness specialists or other qualified per-
8 sons designated by the council to determine a client's need for immediate medical or other treatment
9 to determine what acute care is needed and where it can be best provided, identify other needs and
10 link the client to other appropriate local or statewide services, including treatment for substance
11 abuse and coexisting health problems, housing, employment, training and child care. Networks shall
12 provide this service 24 hours a day, seven days a week, every calendar day of the year **through a**
13 **telephone line or other means. Networks may rely on the statewide telephone hotline estab-**
14 **lished by the authority under ORS 430.391 for telephone screenings during nonbusiness hours**
15 **such as evenings, weekends and holidays.** Notwithstanding paragraph [(b)] (c) of this subsection,
16 only one grantee in each network within each county is required to provide the screenings described
17 in this subparagraph.

18 (B) Comprehensive behavioral health needs assessment, including a substance use [disorder]
19 screening by a certified alcohol and drug counselor or other credentialed addiction treatment pro-
20 fessional. The assessment shall prioritize the self-identified needs of a client.

21 (C) Individual intervention planning, case management and connection to services. If, after the
22 completion of a screening, a client indicates a desire to address some or all of the identified needs,
23 a case manager shall work with the client to design an individual intervention plan. The plan must
24 address the client's need for substance use [disorder] treatment, coexisting health problems, housing,
25 employment and training, child care and other services.

26 (D) Ongoing peer counseling and support from screening and assessment through implementation
27 of individual intervention plans as well as peer outreach workers to engage directly with
28 marginalized community members who could potentially benefit from the network's services.

29 (E) Assessment of the need for, and provision of, mobile or virtual outreach services to:

30 (i) Reach clients who are unable to access the network; and

31 (ii) Increase public awareness of network services.

32 (F) Harm reduction services and information and education about harm reduction services.

33 (G) Low-barrier substance use [disorder] treatment.

34 (H) Transitional and supportive housing for individuals with substance use [disorders].

35 [(e)] (f) If an applicant for a grant or funding under this subsection is unable to provide all of
36 the services described in paragraph [(d)] (e) of this subsection, the applicant may identify how the
37 applicant intends to partner with other entities to provide the services, and the [Oregon Health]
38 authority and the council may facilitate collaboration among applicants.

39 [(f)] (g) All services provided through the networks must be evidence-informed, trauma-informed,
40 culturally specific, linguistically responsive, person-centered and nonjudgmental. The goal shall be
41 to address effectively the client's substance use and any other social determinants of health.

42 [(g)] (h) The networks must be adequately staffed to address the needs of people with substance
43 use [disorders] within their regions as prescribed by the [council] authority by rule, including, at
44 a minimum, at least one person [qualified by the Oregon Health Authority] in each of the following
45 categories:

1 (A) [*Certified*] Alcohol and drug counselor **certified by the authority** or other credentialed ad-
2 diction treatment professional;

3 (B) Case manager; [*and*]

4 (C) [*Certified*] Addiction peer support [*or*] **specialist certified by the authority;**

5 **(D) Addiction peer** wellness specialist **certified by the authority;**

6 **(E) Recovery mentor, certified by the Mental Health and Addiction Certification Board**
7 **of Oregon or its successor organization; and**

8 **(F) Youth support specialist certified by the authority.**

9 [*h*] (i) Verification of a screening by a certified addiction peer support specialist, wellness
10 specialist or other person in accordance with [*subsection (2)(d)(A) of this section*] **paragraph (e)(A)**
11 **of this subsection** shall promptly be provided to the client by the entity conducting the screening.
12 If the client executes a valid release of information, the entity shall provide verification of the
13 screening to the [*Oregon Health*] authority or a contractor of the authority and the authority or the
14 authority's contractor shall forward the verification to the court, in the manner prescribed by the
15 Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, to satisfy the conditions for dismissal under ORS 153.062 or
16 475.237.

17 (3)(a) If moneys remain in the Drug Treatment and Recovery Services Fund after the council
18 has committed grants and funding to establish behavioral health resource networks serving every
19 county in this state, the council shall [*provide*] **authorize** grants and funding to other agencies or
20 organizations, whether government or community based, and to the nine federally recognized tribes
21 in this state and service providers that are affiliated with the nine federally recognized tribes in this
22 state to increase access to one or more of the following:

23 (A) Low-barrier substance use [*disorder*] treatment that is evidence-informed, trauma-informed,
24 culturally specific, linguistically responsive, person-centered and nonjudgmental;

25 (B) Peer support and recovery services;

26 (C) Transitional, supportive and permanent housing for persons with substance use [*disorder*];

27 (D) Harm reduction interventions including, but not limited to, overdose prevention education,
28 access to naloxone hydrochloride and sterile syringes and stimulant-specific drug education and
29 outreach; or

30 (E) Incentives and supports to expand the behavioral health workforce to support the services
31 delivered by behavioral health resource networks and entities receiving grants or funding under this
32 subsection.

33 (b) A recipient of a grant or funding under this subsection may not use the grant or funding to
34 supplant the recipient's existing funding.

35 (4) In awarding grants and funding under subsections [(2)] (1) and (3) of this section, the council
36 shall:

37 (a) Distribute grants and funding to ensure access to:

38 (A) Historically underserved populations; and

39 (B) Culturally specific and linguistically responsive services.

40 (b) Consider any inventories or surveys of currently available behavioral health services.

41 (c) Consider available regional data related to the substance use [*disorder*] treatment needs and
42 the access to culturally specific and linguistically responsive services in communities in this state.

43 (d) Consider the needs of residents of this state for services, supports and treatment at all ages.

44 (5) The council shall require any government entity that applies for a grant to specify in the
45 application details regarding subgrantees and how the government entity will fund culturally spe-

1 cific organizations and culturally specific services. A government entity receiving a grant must
 2 make an explicit commitment not to supplant or decrease any existing funding used to provide ser-
 3 vices funded by the grant.

4 (6) In determining grants and funding to be awarded, the council may consult the comprehensive
 5 addiction, prevention, treatment and recovery plan established by the Alcohol and Drug Policy
 6 Commission under ORS 430.223 and the advice of any other group, agency, organization or individual
 7 that desires to provide advice to the council that is consistent with the terms of this section.

8 (7) Services provided by grantees, including services provided by a Behavioral Health Resource
 9 Network, shall be free of charge to the clients receiving the services. Grantees in each network
 10 shall seek reimbursement from insurance issuers, the medical assistance program or any other third
 11 party responsible for the cost of services provided to a client and grants and funding provided by
 12 the council or the authority under [subsection (2) of] this section may be used for copayments,
 13 deductibles or other out-of-pocket costs incurred by the client for the services.

14 (8) Subsection (7) of this section does not require the medical assistance program to reimburse
 15 the cost of services for which another third party is responsible in violation of 42 U.S.C. 1396a(25).

16 **SECTION 8.** ORS 430.390 is amended to read:

17 430.390. (1)(a) [*On or before September 1, 2021, the Oversight and Accountability Council*] **The**
 18 **Oregon Health Authority** shall adopt rules that establish **a grant application process, a process**
 19 **to appeal the denial of a grant and** general criteria and requirements for the Behavioral Health
 20 Resource Networks and the grants and funding required by ORS 430.389, including rules requiring
 21 recipients of grants and funding to collect and report information necessary for the Secretary of
 22 State to conduct the financial and performance audits required by ORS 430.392.

23 [*(b) The council shall from time to time adopt such rules, and amend and revise rules the council*
 24 *has adopted, as the council deems proper and necessary for the administration of chapter 2, Oregon*
 25 *Laws 2021, and the performance of the council's work.*]

26 **(b) When adopting or amending rules under this subsection, the authority shall convene**
 27 **an advisory committee in accordance with ORS 183.333 in which members of the Oversight**
 28 **and Accountability Council compose a majority of the membership.**

29 (2) [*On and after July 1, 2021,*] The council shall have and retain the authority to [*implement*
 30 *and*] oversee the Behavioral Health Resource Networks established under ORS 430.389 and **approve**
 31 the grants and funding under ORS 430.389.

32 (3) The [*Oregon Health*] authority shall administer and provide all necessary support to ensure
 33 the implementation of [*chapter 2, Oregon Laws 2021*] **ORS 430.383 to 430.390**, and that recipients
 34 of grants or funding comply with all applicable rules regulating the provision of behavioral health
 35 services.

36 (4)(a) The authority, in consultation with the council, may enter into interagency agreements to
 37 ensure proper distribution of funds for the grants required by ORS 430.389.

38 (b) The authority shall encourage and take all reasonable measures to ensure that grant recip-
 39 ients cooperate, coordinate and act jointly with one another to offer the services described in ORS
 40 430.389.

41 (c) The authority shall post to the authority's website, at the time a grant or funding is awarded:

42 (A) The name of the recipient of the grant or funding;

43 (B) The names of any subgrantees or subcontractors of the recipient of the grant or funding; and

44 (C) The amount of the grant or funding awarded.

45 (5) The authority shall provide requested technical, logistical and other support to the council

1 to assist the council with the council's duties and obligations.

2 (6) The Department of Justice shall provide legal services to the council if requested to assist
3 the council in carrying out the council's duties and obligations.

4 **SECTION 9.** ORS 430.391 is amended to read:

5 430.391. (1) *[Not later than February 1, 2021,]* The Oregon Health Authority shall establish a
6 Behavioral Health Resource Network statewide telephone hotline to[.]

7 *[(a) Provide screenings under ORS 430.389 (2)(d) to any resident in this state by certified addiction*
8 *peer support or wellness specialists, as defined by the authority by rule, or other qualified persons*
9 *designated by the Oversight and Accountability Council;]*

10 *[(b) Assess a caller's need for immediate medical care or other treatment and determine what acute*
11 *care is needed and where it can be provided;]*

12 *[(c) Identify other needs of the caller; and]*

13 *[(d) Link the caller to other appropriate local or statewide services, including treatment for sub-*
14 *stance abuse and other coexisting health problems, housing, employment, training and child care]*
15 **provide screenings described in ORS 430.389 (2)(e)(A) to any caller who is a resident of this**
16 **state.**

17 (2) The telephone hotline shall be staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week, every calendar day
18 of the year. Following a screening, at the request of a caller, the telephone hotline shall promptly
19 provide the verification set forth in ORS 430.389 [(2)(h)] **(2)(i)**.

20 **SECTION 10.** ORS 430.392 is amended to read:

21 430.392. (1) The Division of Audits of the office of the Secretary of State shall conduct per-
22 formance audits and financial reviews as provided in this section, regarding the uses of the Drug
23 Treatment and Recovery Services Fund and the effectiveness of the fund in achieving the purposes
24 of the fund and the policy objectives of ORS 430.383. Recipients of grants or funds under ORS
25 430.389 shall keep accurate books, records and accounts that are subject to inspection and audit by
26 the division.

27 (2) *[No later than two years after the completion of an audit or financial review,]*The division shall
28 monitor and report on the progress in implementing any recommendations made in the audit or fi-
29 nancial review. The division shall follow up on recommendations as part of recurring audit work or
30 as an activity separate from other audit activity. When following up on recommendations, the divi-
31 sion may request from the appropriate agency evidence of implementation.

32 (3) The audits set forth in this section shall be conducted pursuant to the provisions of ORS

3 (F) Whether there are opportunities to expand collaboration between the council and state
4 agencies.

11 Health Authority, each community mental health program, subject to the availability of funds, shall
12 provide **guidance and assistance to local Behavioral Health Resource Networks for the joint**
13 **development of programs and activities to increase access to treatment and shall provide** the
14 following basic services to persons with alcoholism or drug dependence, and persons who are alcohol
15 or drug abusers:

16 (a) Outpatient services;

17 (b) Aftercare for persons released from hospitals;

18 (c) Training, case and program consultation and education for community agencies, related
19 professions and the public;

20 (d) Guidance and assistance to other human service agencies for joint development of prevention

10 (j) Prevention of mental or emotional disturbances and promotion of mental health;

11 (k) Consultation with other community agencies;

12 (L) Preventive mental health services for children and adolescents, including primary prevention
13 efforts, early identification and early intervention services. Preventive services should be patterned
14 after service models that have demonstrated effectiveness in reducing the incidence of emotional,
15 behavioral and cognitive disorders in children. As used in this paragraph:

16 (A) "Early identification" means detecting emotional disturbance in its initial developmental
17 stage;

18 (B) "Early intervention services" for children at risk of later development of emotional disturb-
19 ances means programs and activities for children and their families that promote conditions, oppor-
20 tunities and experiences that encourage and develop emotional stability, self-sufficiency and
21 increased personal competence; and

22 (C) "Primary prevention efforts" means efforts that prevent emotional problems from occurring
23 by addressing issues early so that disturbances do not have an opportunity to develop; and

24 (m) Preventive mental health services for older adults, including primary prevention efforts,
25 early identification and early intervention services. Preventive services should be patterned after
26 service models that have demonstrated effectiveness in reducing the incidence of emotional and be-
27 havioral disorders and suicide attempts in older adults. As used in this paragraph:

36 (4) A community mental health program shall assume responsibility for psychiatric care in state

39 (a) The person receiving care is a resident of the county served by the program. For purposes

6 tract with the hospital for the psychiatric care of residents and a representative of the program
7 approves voluntary or involuntary admissions to the hospital prior to admission.

- 10 cluding senior centers, long term care facilities and personal residences.

40 (L) Be delivered collaboratively;

41 (M) Use age-appropriate, research-based quality indicators;

42 (N) Use best-practice innovations; and

43 (O) Be delivered using a community-based, multisystem approach.

44 (h) A local mental health authority shall submit to the Oregon Health Authority a copy of the
45 local plan and revisions adopted under paragraph (b) of this subsection at time intervals established

1 by the Oregon Health Authority.

3 153.043. (1) An enforcement officer issuing a citation for a Class E violation shall provide the
4 person receiving the citation with information concerning how the person may complete a screening,

9 153.062. (1) Notwithstanding ORS 153.018, 153.019 and 153.021, and subject to subsection (2) of
10 this section, a person subject to the penalty for a Class E violation may, in lieu of the fine, complete
11 a screening, as set forth in ORS 430.389 [(2)(d)(A)] **(2)(e)(A)**, or any other equivalent or more in-
12 tensive treatment contact, within 45 days of when the person receives the citation for the Class E
13 violation.

14 (2) Upon receiving verification that the person has obtained a screening through a Behavioral
15 Health Resource Network, including the telephone hotline described in ORS 430.391 (1), or any other
16 equivalent or more intensive treatment contact, within the time period described in subsection (1)
17 of this section, the court shall dismiss the citation.

18 (3) The failure to pay a fine on a Class E violation is not a basis for further penalties or for a

24 **SECTION 17.** **If approved by the Oversight and Accountability Council, the Oregon Health**
25 **Authority may implement an education campaign to inform the public about the availability**
26 **of Behavioral Health Resource Networks, the statewide hotline described in ORS 430.391 and**
27 **any other information the authority believes would benefit the public in accessing behavioral**
28 **health services.**

29 **SECTION 18.** **Section 17 of this 2023 Act becomes operative on July 1, 2025.**
