SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Renames Office of Emergency Management as Oregon Department of Emergency Management. Establishes department as independent state agency. Directs department to carry out certain functions related to regional and statewide emergency response and preparedness.

Transfers Oregon Emergency Response System from Department of State Police to Oregon Department of Emergency Management, operative July 1, 2025.

Renames office of State Fire Marshal as Department of the State Fire Marshal and establishes department as independent state agency, operative July 1, 2023.

Transfers Oregon Homeland Security Council to Office of Governor. Adds members to and modifies duties of commission.

Establishes Emergency Preparedness Advisory Council to facilitate policy recommendations related to catastrophic disaster. Sunsets council on January 2, 2030.

Establishes Local Government Emergency Management Advisory Council to provide advice and recommendations to Oregon Department of Emergency Management regarding department's emergency preparedness and response functions. Sunsets council on January 2, 2030.

Establishes task force to make recommendations as to whether State Fire Marshal should be made independent state agency or housed within existing state agency, operative immediately. Directs task force to report recommendations by February 1, 2022.

Becomes operative on July 1, 2022, except as specified.

Appropriates moneys from General Fund and increases certain expenditure limitations for various state agencies to carry out provisions of Act.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

**RENAMING AND REORGANIZATION OF
THE OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT**

SECTION 1. (1) The amendments to ORS 401.052, 401.054, 401.062, 401.072, 401.076, 401.082, 401.088 and 401.092 by sections 2 to 9 of this 2021 Act are intended to change the name of the “Office of Emergency Management” to the “Oregon Department of Emergency Management” and to establish that entity as a state agency independent from the Oregon Military Department.

(2) For the purpose of harmonizing and clarifying statutory law, the Legislative Counsel may substitute for words designating the “Office of Emergency Management,” wherever they occur in statutory law, other words designating the “Oregon Department of Emergency Management.”

SECTION 2. ORS 401.052 is amended to read:

401.052. (1) The [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management is established [*in the Oregon Military Department*].

(2) The [office] **department** shall be responsible for:

(a) Coordinating and facilitating private sector and governmental efforts to prevent, prepare for, respond to and recover from emergencies; and

(b) Coordinating exercises and training, planning, preparedness, response, mitigation and recovery activities with state and local emergency services agencies and organizations.

(3) The [office] **department** shall prepare a statewide emergency management plan and update the plan from time to time as necessary.

SECTION 3. ORS 401.054 is amended to read:

401.054. (1) Each of the following agencies, entities and officials shall designate an individual to act as a liaison with the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management:

(a) The Department of Consumer and Business Services;

(e) The Department of Human Services;

(f) The Department of Justice;

23 coordination of the functions of the agency, entity or official that designated the individual that
24 relate to emergency preparedness and response with similar functions of the [Office] **Oregon De-**
25 **partment** of Emergency Management.

26 **SECTION 4.** ORS 401.062 is amended to read:

27 401.062. (1) The [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management is under the super-
28 vision and control of a director, who is responsible for the performance of the duties, functions and
29 powers of the [office] **department**.

30 (2) [The Adjutant General, with the approval of] The Governor[,] shall appoint the Director of the
31 [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management, who holds office at the pleasure of the
32 [Adjutant General.] **Governor. The appointment of the director is subject to confirmation by**
33 **the Senate in the manner prescribed by ORS 171.562 and 171.565.**

34 (3) The director shall be paid a salary as provided by law or, if not so provided, as prescribed
35 by [the Adjutant General, with the approval of] the Governor.

41 dividual to administer each division. The administrator of each division serves at the pleasure of the
42 director and is not subject to the provisions of ORS chapter 240. Each individual appointed under
43 this subsection must be well qualified by technical training and experience in the functions to be
44 performed by the individual.

45 **SECTION 5.** ORS 401.072 is amended to read:

1 401.072. (1) The Director of the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management may,
2 by written order filed with the Secretary of State, appoint a deputy director. The deputy director
3 serves at the pleasure of the director, has authority to act for the director in the absence of the
4 director and is subject to the control of the director at all times.

5 (2) Subject to any applicable provisions of ORS chapter 240, the director shall appoint all sub-
6 ordinate officers and employees of the [Office of Emergency Management] **department**, prescribe
7 their duties and fix their compensation.

8 **SECTION 6.** ORS 401.076 is amended to read:

9 401.076. In accordance with applicable provisions of ORS chapter 183, the Director of the
10 [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management may adopt rules necessary for the admin-

14 401.092. (1) The Director of the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management is re-

17 and organizations, and shall[, *with the approval of the Adjutant General or as directed by the Gover-*
18 *nor*]:

7 considers necessary. The committees may be continuing or temporary. The director shall determine
8 the representation, membership, terms and organization of the committees and shall appoint their
9 members. The director is an ex officio member of each committee.

10 (2) Members of the committees are not entitled to compensation, but in the discretion of the
11 director may be reimbursed from funds available to the [office] **department** for actual and necessary
12 travel and other expenses incurred by them in the performance of their official duties in the manner
13 and amount provided in ORS 292.495.

21 **SECTION 10.** (1) **The unexpended balances of amounts authorized to be expended by the**
22 **Oregon Military Department for purposes of the Office of Emergency Management for the**
23 **biennium beginning July 1, 2021, from revenues dedicated, continuously appropriated, appro-**
24 **propriated or otherwise made available to the department, are transferred to and are available**
25 **for expenditure by the Oregon Department of Emergency Management for the biennium be-**
26 **ginning July 1, 2021.**

27 (2) **The expenditure classifications, if any, established by Acts authorizing or limiting**
28 **expenditures by the Office of Emergency Management remain applicable to expenditures by**

35 **prosecution involving or with respect to any duties, functions and powers of the Office of**

37 **tion 155 of this 2021 Act, except that the Oregon Department of Emergency Management is**
38 **substituted for the Office of Emergency Management in any such action, proceeding or**

43 **SECTION 12.** (1) **Nothing in the amendments to ORS 401.052, 401.054, 401.062, 401.072,**
44 **401.076, 401.082, 401.088 and 401.092 by sections 2 to 9 of this 2021 Act relieves a person of a**
45 **liability, duty or obligation accruing under or with respect to the duties, functions and pow-**

1 ers conferred by those statutes prior to the operative date specified in section 155 of this 2021
2 Act. The Oregon Department of Emergency Management may undertake the collection or
3 enforcement of any such liability, duty or obligation.

4 (2) The rights and obligations of the Office of Emergency Management legally incurred
5 under contracts, leases and business transactions executed, entered into or begun before the
6 operative date specified in section 155 of this 2021 Act are transferred to the Oregon De-
7 partment of Emergency Management. For the purpose of succession to these rights and ob-
8 ligations, the Oregon Department of Emergency Management is a continuation of the Office
9 of Emergency Management and not a new authority.

14 tive date specified in section 155 of this 2021 Act continue in effect until superseded or re-
15 pealed by rules of the Oregon Department of Emergency Management. References in rules

17 ficer or employee of the Office of Emergency Management are considered to be references
18 to the Oregon Department of Emergency Management or an officer or employee of the
19 Oregon Department of Emergency Management.

20 **SECTION 14.** Whenever, in any statutory law or resolution of the Legislative Assembly
21 or in any rule, document, record or proceeding authorized by the Legislative Assembly, ref-

(Emergency Preparedness Functions)

1 the risk of serious bodily injury or death resulting from rapidly moving landslides:

2 (a) The State Department of Geology and Mineral Industries shall:

3 (A) Identify and map further review areas selected in cooperation with local governments and
4 in coordination with the State Forestry Department, and provide technical assistance to local gov-
5 ernments to facilitate the use and application of this information pursuant to subsection (1)(b) of this
6 section; and

7 (B) Provide public education regarding landslide hazards.

8 (b) The State Forestry Department shall regulate forest operations to reduce the risk of serious
9 bodily injury or death from rapidly moving landslides directly related to forest operations, and assist
10 local governments in the siting review of permanent dwellings on and adjacent to forestlands in
11 further review areas pursuant to subsection (1)(b) of this section.

12 (c) The Land Conservation and Development Commission may take steps under its existing au-
13 thority to assist local governments to appropriately apply the requirements of subsection (1)(c) of
14 this section.

15 (d) The Department of Transportation shall provide warnings to motorists during periods deter-
16 mined to be of highest risk of rapidly moving landslides along areas on state highways with a history

5 the control of perchloroethylene emissions;

7 condensers, or an equivalent;

8 (4) Nothing in ORS 433.441 to 433.452 limits the authority of the Governor to declare a state
9 of emergency under ORS 401.165. If a state of emergency is declared as authorized under ORS
10 401.165, the Governor may implement any action authorized by ORS 433.441 to 433.452.

11 (5) A [*proclamation*] **declaration** of a state of public health emergency expires when terminated
12 by a declaration of the Governor or no more than 14 days after the date the public health emergency
13 is [*proclaimed*] **declared** unless the Governor expressly extends the [*proclamation*] **declaration** for

15 (6) When real or personal property is taken under power granted by this section, the owner of
16 the property shall be entitled to reasonable compensation from the state.

 33 available. In determining what is the best technology available, the department shall consider the
 34 effectiveness, engineering feasibility, technological achievability and cost of the technology.

14 lation or change in the original installation that requires notification to the State Fire Marshal or
15 necessitates further inspection of the installation. The State Fire Marshal shall collect from the in-
16 staller an installation fee of \$50 for each tank installed or for all tanks at the installation if the total
17 combined capacity is 200 gallons or less. The State Fire Marshal or deputies of the fire marshal or
18 assistants shall inspect a reasonable number of the installations and maintain a record of the in-

22 of disclosing the information shall be paid by the agency or university requesting the information.

32 employees. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be disclosed by the Department
33 of Revenue in any manner that would identify an employing unit or employee except to the extent
34 necessary to carry out the department's duties under ORS 293.250 or in auditing or reviewing any
35 report or return required or permitted to be filed under the revenue and tax laws administered by
36 the department. The Department of Revenue may not disclose any information received to any pri-
37 vate collection agency or for any other purpose. If the information disclosed under this paragraph
38 is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the information
39 shall be paid by the Department of Revenue.

23 employee except to the extent necessary to carry out the commission's duties under ORS chapter
24 348 or Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965. If the information disclosed under this para-
25 graph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the infor-
26 mation shall be paid by the commission.

27 (n) Disclose information to the Department of Transportation to assist the Department of
28 Transportation in carrying out the duties of the Department of Transportation relating to collection
29 of delinquent and liquidated debts, including taxes, under ORS 184.610 to 184.665, 184.670 to 184.733
30 and 805.263, ORS chapter 319 and the Oregon Vehicle Code. The information disclosed may include
31 the names and addresses of employers and employees and payroll data of employers and employees.
32 The information disclosed is confidential and may not be disclosed by the Department of Transpor-

21 paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the
22 information shall be paid by the person requesting the information.

23 (r) Disclose to any person the industrial classification code assigned to an employing unit. If the

22 on direct domestic risks, and not theretofore reported, and shall forthwith pay to the director the
23 tax thereon.

31 **gathering and dissemination on subjects associated with the mission.**

32 **(b) Request and receive briefings from state agencies or other entities for development**
33 **of reports and recommendations for the Governor on subjects associated with the mission.**

34 **(c) Facilitate interagency collaboration, cooperation and coordination on operational is-**
35 **ssues associated with the mission.**

36 **(d) Recommend policies to the Emergency Preparedness Advisory Council on subjects**
37 **associated with the mission.**

38 [(2)] **(3) The membership of the council consists of:**

39 (a) Four members from the Legislative Assembly appointed as follows:

15 **SECTION 151.** (1) The Emergency Preparedness Advisory Council is established within
16 the Office of the Governor. The mission of the council is to facilitate policy recommendations
17 for catastrophic disaster preparedness, mitigation and response and recovery planning, pro-
18 cedures and protocols with special emphasis on outreach to representatives of designated
19 state and federal emergency support functions.

20 (2) The council consists of:

21 (a) One member appointed by the Adjutant General to represent the Oregon Military
22 Department;

23 (b) One member appointed by the Director of the Oregon Department of Emergency
24 Management to represent the Oregon Department of Emergency Management;

25 (c) One member appointed by the State Fire Marshal to represent the Department of the
26 State Fire Marshal;

27 (d) One member appointed by the Superintendent of State Police to represent the De-
28 partment of State Police;

29 (e) One member appointed by the Director of the Department of Public Safety Standards
30 and Training to represent the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training;

31 (f) One member appointed by the Director of the Oregon Health Authority to represent
32 the Oregon Health Authority;

33 (g) One member appointed by the Director of Transportation to represent the Depart-
34 ment of Transportation;

35 (h) One member appointed by the Attorney General to represent the Department of
36 Justice;

37 (i) One member appointed by the State Forester to represent the State Forestry De-
38 partment;

39 (j) Seven members appointed by the Governor as follows:

40 (A) One member to represent counties;

41 (B) One member to represent cities;

42 (C) One member with experience in emergency preparedness to represent regional or-
43 ganizations;

44 (D) One member with experience in emergency preparedness to represent local organ-
45 izations;

1 (E) One member representing the private sector;

2 (F) One member representing the nonprofit community with a designated emergency
3 support function responsibility; and

4 (G) One member to represent Indian tribes in Oregon; and

5 (k) Additional members appointed by the Governor as the Governor may deem necessary.

6 (3)(a) The council may research international and national best practices and make
7 formal recommendations to the State Resilience Officer or the Governor as needed, with
8 special emphasis given to connecting statewide policy recommendations with state and fed-
9 eral emergency support function capabilities.

10 (b) The council shall advise and make policy recommendations to the Oregon Homeland
11 Security Council regarding federal emergency support functions.

12 (4) A majority of the members of the Emergency Preparedness Advisory Council consti-
13 tutes a quorum for the transaction of business.

14 (5) Official action by the council requires the approval of a majority of the members of
15 the council.

16 (6) The council shall elect one of its members to serve as chairperson.

17 (7) If there is a vacancy for any cause, the appointing authority shall make an appoint-
18 ment to become immediately effective.

19 (8) The council shall meet at least once quarterly at the place specified by the call of the
20 chairperson or of a majority of the members of the council.

21 (9) The council may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the council.

22 (10) The Oregon Department of Emergency Management shall provide staff support to
23 the council.

24 (11) Members of the council are not entitled to compensation or reimbursement for ex-
25 penses and serve as volunteers on the council.

26 (12) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, are directed to assist
27 the council in the performance of the duties of the council and, to the extent permitted by
28 laws relating to confidentiality, to furnish information and advice the members of the council
29 consider necessary to perform their duties.

30 SECTION 151a. Section 151 of this 2021 Act is repealed on January 2, 2030.

32 **LOCAL GOVERNMENT EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT ADVISORY COUNCIL**

33
34 SECTION 152. (1) The Local Government Emergency Management Advisory Council is
35 established within the Oregon Department of Emergency Management.

36 (2) The council consists of 11 members appointed by the Governor as follows:

37 (a) One member to represent an organization representing Oregon counties;

38 (b) One member to represent an organization representing Oregon cities;

39 (c) One member to represent emergency medical service providers;

40 (d) One member to represent fire departments;

41 (e) One member to represent a statewide association of emergency managers, emergency
42 responders, government agencies and elected officials committed to minimizing the impact
43 of disasters in Oregon;

44 (f) One member to represent county sheriffs;

45 (g) One member to represent 9-1-1 emergency dispatchers;

1 (h) One member to represent volunteer emergency medical service providers; and

2 (i) Three members with experience relating to emergency preparedness or management
3 to represent the public.

4 (3) The council shall provide advice and recommendations to the Oregon Department of
5 Emergency Management regarding its emergency preparedness and response functions.

6 (4) A majority of the members of the council constitutes a quorum for the transaction
7 of business.

8 (5) Official action by the council requires the approval of a majority of the members of
9 the council.

10 (6) The council shall elect one of its members to serve as chairperson.

11 (7) If there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make an appointment to be-
12 come immediately effective.

13 (8) The council shall meet at times and places specified by the call of the chairperson or
14 of a majority of the members of the council.

15 (9) The council may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the council.

16 (10) The department shall provide staff support to the council.

17 (11) Members of the council are not entitled to compensation or reimbursement for ex-
18 penses and serve as volunteers on the council.

19 (12) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, are directed to assist
20 the council in the performance of the duties of the council and, to the extent permitted by
21 laws relating to confidentiality, to furnish information and advice the members of the council
22 consider necessary to perform their duties.

23 SECTION 152a. Section 152 of this 2021 Act is repealed on January 2, 2030.

24
25 **TASK FORCE ON IMPLEMENTATION**

26
27 SECTION 152b. (1) The Task Force on Implementation is established.

28 (2) The task force consists of the members of the Governor's Fire Service Policy Council
29 created under ORS 476.680. Nonvoting members of the council are nonvoting members of the
30 task force.

31 (3) The task force shall make recommendations as to whether the office of the State Fire
32 Marshal should be made an independent state agency, and, if not, in which existing state
33 agency the office of the State Fire Marshal should be housed. The task force's recommen-
34 dations must describe the rationales for the decisions of the task force.

35 (4) No later than February 1, 2022, the task force shall submit a report on its findings
36 and recommendations, which may include recommendations for legislation, to the standing
37 or interim committees of the Legislative Assembly with subject matter responsibility for
38 veterans and emergency management.

39 (5) A majority of the voting members of the task force constitutes a quorum for the
40 transaction of business.

41 (6) Official action by the task force requires the approval of a majority of the voting
42 members of the task force.

43 (7) The task force shall elect one of its members to serve as chairperson.

44 (8) The task force shall meet at times and places specified by the call of the chairperson
45 or of a majority of the voting members of the task force.

1 (9) The task force may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the task force.

2 (10) The office of the State Fire Marshal shall provide staff support to the task force.

3 (11) Members of the task force are not entitled to compensation or reimbursement for
4 expenses and serve as volunteers on the task force.

5 (12) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, are directed to assist
6 the task force in the performance of the duties of the task force and, to the extent permitted
7 by laws relating to confidentiality, to furnish information and advice the members of the task
8 force consider necessary to perform their duties.

9 SECTION 152c. Section 152b of this 2021 Act is repealed on January 2, 2023.

10 SECTION 153. The Governor or the following agencies may take any action before the
11 operative date specified in section 155 of this 2021 Act that is necessary for the Governor or
12 agency to exercise, on or after the operative date specified in section 155 of this 2021 Act,
13 all of the duties, functions and powers conferred on the Governor or agency by sections 1,
14 10 to 15, 25a and 148 to 152 of this 2021 Act and the amendments to statutes and session law
15 by sections 2 to 9, 16, 24, 26 to 88h and 108 to 147 of this 2021 Act:

- 16 (1) The Office of Emergency Management;
17 (2) The Oregon Military Department;
18 (3) The office of the State Fire Marshal;
19 (4) The Department of State Police; or
20 (5) The Oregon Homeland Security Council.

21 SECTION 153a. The Governor or the following agencies may take any action before the
22 operative date specified in section 155a of this 2021 Act that is necessary for the Governor
23 or agency to exercise, on or after the operative date specified in section 155a of this 2021 Act,
24 all of the duties, functions and powers conferred on the Governor or agency by sections 89
25 and 91 to 96 of this 2021 Act and the amendments to ORS 476.020 by section 90 of this 2021
26 Act:

- 27 (1) The office of the State Fire Marshal; or
28 (2) The Department of State Police.

29 SECTION 153b. The Governor or the following agencies may take any action before the
30 operative date specified in section 155b of this 2021 Act that is necessary for the Governor
31 or agency to exercise, on or after the operative date specified in section 155b of this 2021 Act,
32 all of the duties, functions and powers conferred on the Governor or agency by the amend-
33 ments to ORS 401.094 by section 16a of this 2021 Act:

- 34 (1) The Oregon Department of Emergency Management; or
35 (2) The Department of State Police.

40 SECTION 155. Sections 1, 10 to 15, 25a and 148 to 152 of this 2021 Act and the amend-
41 ments to statutes and session law by sections 2 to 9, 16, 24, 26 to 88h and 108 to 147 of this
42 2021 Act become operative on July 1, 2022.

43 SECTION 155a. Sections 89 and 91 to 96 of this 2021 Act and the amendments to ORS
44 476.020 by section 90 of this 2021 Act become operative on July 1, 2023.

45 SECTION 155b. The amendments to ORS 401.094 by section 16a of this 2021 Act become

1 operative on July 1, 2025.

2 **SECTION 155c.** Between the operative date specified in section 155 of this 2021 Act and
3 the operative date specified in section 155a of this 2021 Act:

4 (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, statutory references to the Department
5 of the State Fire Marshal shall be construed to mean the office of the State Fire Marshal in
6 the Department of State Police.

7 (2) Duties, functions and powers conferred on the Department of the State Fire Marshal
8 are conferred on the office of the State Fire Marshal in the Department of State Police.

9 (3) Moneys appropriated to the Department of the State Fire Marshal shall be construed
10 as appropriations to the Department of State Police for purposes of the office of the State
11 Fire Marshal.

13 **FISCAL PROVISIONS**
14

15 **SECTION 156.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropri-
16 ation made to the Oregon Military Department by section 1 (3), chapter ___, Oregon Laws
17 2021 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5535), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, for emergency
18 management, is increased by \$3,431,834 for preparing the Office of Emergency Management
19 as a separate state agency.

20 **SECTION 157.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropri-
21 ation made to the Oregon Military Department by section 1 (1), chapter ___, Oregon Laws
22 2021 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5535), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, for administration,
23 is increased by \$1,006,057 for preparing the Office of Emergency Management as a separate
24 state agency.

25 **SECTION 158.** Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on
26 expenditures established by section 2 (4), chapter ___, Oregon Laws 2021 (Enrolled Senate
27 Bill 5535), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, as the maximum limit for payment of ex-
28 penses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and re-
29 imbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds
30 not described in section 2 (4), chapter ___, Oregon Laws 2021 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5535),
31 collected or received by the Oregon Military Department, for community support, is in-
32 creased by \$5,000,000 for state active duty costs.

33 **SECTION 159.** In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-
34 priated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, out of the General
35 Fund, the amount of \$1,807,561, to be allocated to the Department of State Police for pre-
36 paring the office of the State Fire Marshal as a separate state agency.

37 **SECTION 160.** In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-
38 priated to the Office of the Governor, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, out of the
39 General Fund, the amount of \$237,161 to support the work of the Oregon Homeland Security
40 Council.
