SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Reduces public purpose charge for retail electricity consumers within service areas of electric companies and Oregon Community Power. Modifies allocation of funds collected through public purpose charges.

Requires recovery in rates by electric company of funds necessary to plan for and pursue all available energy efficiency resources that are cost effective, reliable and feasible. Allows for credit against amounts recovered in certain circumstances.

Modifies reporting requirements for nongovernmental entity that is paid certain funds as directed by commission.

Requires Public Utility Commission to establish and update metrics for assessing, addressing and creating accountability for environmental justice in expenditure and investment of funds collected for certain purposes and paid to nongovernmental entity. Requires reporting by nongovernmental entity on progress in achieving equity metrics.

Takes effect on 91st day following adjournment sine die.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

Relating to energy; creating new provisions; amending ORS 297.300, 317A.100, 456.587, 757.054, 757.247, 757.365, 757.612, 757.613 and 757.617 and section 1, chapter 63, Oregon Laws 2016; repealing ORS 757.689; and prescribing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

PUBLIC PURPOSE CHARGE

SECTION 1. ORS 757.612 is amended to read:

757.612. (1)(a) There is established an annual public purpose expenditure standard for electric companies and Oregon Community Power to fund [*new cost-effective energy conservation, new market transformation efforts*,]:

(A) The above-market costs of new renewable energy resources and **customer investments in distribution system-connected technologies that support reliability, resilience and the integration of renewable energy resources with the distribution systems of electric companies and Oregon Community Power;**

(B) New low-income weatherization;

(C) **New energy-related investments in schools; and**

(D) **Low-income housing.**

(b) The public purpose expenditure standard shall be funded by the public purpose charge described in subsection (2) of this section.

(2)(a) [*Beginning on the date an electric company or Oregon Community Power offers direct access*

NOTE: Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter [*italic and bracketed*] is existing law to be omitted. New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 *to retail electricity consumers, except residential electricity consumers, the] Until January 1, 2036, an*
2 *electric company or Oregon Community Power shall collect a nonbypassable public purpose charge*
3 **equal to 1.5 percent of the revenues described in paragraph (b) of this subsection, appor-**
4 **tioned as further set forth in subsection (3)(b) of this section. The electric company or**
5 **Oregon Community Power shall collect the public purpose charge** from all of the retail elec-
6 tricity consumers located within the electric company's or Oregon Community Power's service [*area*
7 *until January 1, 2026] territory, including retail electricity consumers served by electricity*
8 **service suppliers.**

9 (b) [*Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, The public purpose charge shall be*
10 *equal to three percent] **The percentages described in paragraph (a) of this subsection and sub-***
11 **section (3)(b) of this section shall be calculated as percentages** of the total revenues collected
12 by the electric company, Oregon Community Power or the electricity service supplier from retail
13 electricity consumers for electricity services, distribution services, ancillary services, metering and
14 billing, transition charges and other types of costs included in electric rates on July 23, 1999.

15 [*(b) For an aluminum plant that averages more than 100 average megawatts of electricity use per*
16 *year, the electric company or Oregon Community Power, whichever serves territory that abuts the*
17 *greatest percentage of the site of the aluminum plant, shall collect from the aluminum company a public*
18 *purpose charge equal to one percent of the total revenue from the sale of electricity services to the*
19 *aluminum plant from any source.]*

20 (3)(a) The Public Utility Commission shall establish rules implementing the provisions of this
21 section relating to electric companies and Oregon Community Power.

22 (b) [*Except as provided in paragraph (e) of this subsection, Funds collected through public purpose*
23 *charges under subsection (2) of this section shall be allocated as follows:] **The public purpose charge***
24 **described in subsection (2)(a) of this section shall be the sum total of the following percent-**
25 **ages of revenues described in subsection (2)(b) of this section, allocated for the following**
26 **purposes:**

27 [(A) *Sixty-three percent for new cost-effective energy conservation and new market transformation*
28 *efforts.]*

29 (A) **0.3 percent of revenues for school districts that are located in the service territory**
30 **of the electric company or Oregon Community Power, as further directed under paragraph**
31 **(e) of this subsection.**

32 (B) [*Nineteen percent for] **As further directed under paragraph (f) of this subsection, 0.51***
33 **percent of revenues for:**

34 (i) The above-market costs of constructing and operating new renewable energy resources with
35 a nominal electric generating capacity, as defined in ORS 469.300, of 20 megawatts or less[.]; **or**

36 (ii) **Customer investments in distribution system-connected technologies that support**
37 **reliability, resilience and the integration of renewable energy resources with the distribution**
38 **system of the electric company or Oregon Community Power.**

39 (C) [*Thirteen percent] **0.55 percent of revenues for new low-income weatherization, as further***
40 **directed under paragraph (g) of this subsection.**

41 (D) [*Five percent] **0.14 percent of revenues for deposit in the Housing and Community Services***
42 **Department Electricity Public Purpose Charge Fund established by ORS 456.587 (1) for the purpose**
43 **of providing grants as described in ORS 458.625 (2).**

44 (c) The costs of administering subsections (1) to [(6)] (5) of this section for an electric company
45 or Oregon Community Power shall be paid out of the funds collected through public purpose

1 charges. The commission may require an electric company or Oregon Community Power to direct
2 funds collected through public purpose charges to state agencies responsible for implementing sub-
3 sections (1) to [(6)] (5) of this section in order to pay the costs of administering subsections (1) to
4 [(6)] (5) of this section.

5 (d) The commission shall direct the manner in which public purpose charges are collected and
6 spent by an electric company or Oregon Community Power and may require an electric company
7 or Oregon Community Power to expend funds through competitive bids or other means designed to
8 encourage competition, except that funds dedicated for new low-income weatherization shall be di-
9 rected to the Housing and Community Services Department for purposes related to new low-income
10 weatherization, **as further directed in paragraph (g) of this subsection.** The commission may also
11 require funds collected through public purpose charges to be paid to a nongovernmental entity for
12 investment in public purposes described in subsection (1) of this section. [*Notwithstanding any other*
13 *provision of this subsection.*]

14 [(A) *If an electric company collected the funds, at least 80 percent of the funds allocated for new*
15 *cost-effective energy conservation shall be spent within the service area of the electric company; or]*

16 [(B) *If Oregon Community Power collected the funds, at least 80 percent of the funds allocated for*
17 *new cost-effective energy conservation shall be spent within the service area of Oregon Community*
18 *Power.*]

19 (e)(A) [*The first 10 percent of funds collected each year by an electric company or Oregon Com-*
20 *munity Power under subsection (2) of this section shall be distributed to school districts that are located*
21 *in the service territory of the electric company or Oregon Community Power. The]* Funds **allocated**
22 **under subsection (3)(b)(A) of this section** shall be distributed to individual school districts ac-
23 cording to the weighted average daily membership (ADMw) of each school district for the prior fis-
24 cal year as calculated under ORS 327.013. The commission shall establish by rule a methodology for
25 distributing a proportionate share of funds under this paragraph to school districts that are only
26 partially located in the service territory of the electric company or Oregon Community Power.

27 (B) A school district that receives funds under this paragraph shall use the funds first to pay
28 for energy audits for schools located within the school district or for a fleet audit for the school
29 district. To the extent practicable, a school district shall coordinate with the State Department of
30 Energy and incorporate federal funding in complying with this paragraph. Following completion of
31 an audit, the school district may expend funds received under this paragraph to implement the audit.

32 (C) Once an energy audit has been conducted and completely implemented for each school
33 within the school district, the school district may expend funds received under this paragraph for
34 any of the following purposes:

35 (i) Conducting additional energy audits. A school district shall conduct an energy audit prior to
36 expending funds on any other purpose authorized under this paragraph unless the school district has
37 performed an energy audit within the three years immediately prior to receiving the funds.

38 (ii) Weatherizing school district facilities and upgrading the energy efficiency of school district
39 facilities.

40 (iii) Energy conservation education programs.

41 (iv) Purchasing electricity from environmentally focused sources.

42 (v) Investing in renewable energy resources.

43 (D) Once a fleet audit has been conducted for the school district, the school district may expend
44 funds received under this paragraph for any of the following purposes:

45 (i) Purchasing or leasing zero-emission vehicles, as defined in ORS 283.398, including buses.

1 (ii) Purchasing or installing electric vehicle charging stations to provide electricity to zero-
2 emission vehicles.

3 **(f) Of the funds allocated under subsection (3)(b)(B) of this section, 25 percent must be**
4 **used for activities, resources and technologies that serve low and moderate income custom-**
5 **ers, including for technologies that do not have above-market costs.**

6 **(g)(A) Funds collected by an electric company or Oregon Community Power, allocated for**
7 **new low-income weatherization under subsection (3)(b)(C) of this section and directed to the**
8 **Housing and Community Services Department shall be spent within the service territory of**
9 **the electric company or Oregon Community Power from which the funds are collected.**

10 **(B) As further determined by the Housing and Community Services Department, a por-**
11 **tion of the funds described in this paragraph may be used for manufactured housing re-**
12 **placements as a means to deliver energy efficiency, pursuant to a program dedicated to**
13 **manufactured housing replacement.**

14 **(C) For purposes of this paragraph and as further determined by the Housing and Com-**
15 **munity Services Department, purposes related to new low-income weatherization includes**
16 **providing funding for participants in programs by low-income weatherization service provid-**
17 **ers to change energy sources from bulk fuels to electricity service.**

18 *[(f)] (h) The commission may not establish a different public purpose charge than the public*
19 *purpose charge described in subsection (2) of this section.*

20 *[(g) If the commission requires funds collected through public purpose charges to be paid to a*
21 *nongovernmental entity, the entity shall:]*

22 *[(A) Include on the entity's board of directors an ex officio member designated by the commission,*
23 *who shall also serve on the entity's nominating committee for filling board vacancies.]*

24 *[(B) Require the entity's officers and directors to provide an annual disclosure of economic interest*
25 *to be filed with the commission on or prior to April 15 of each calendar year for public review in a*
26 *form similar to the statement of economic interest required for public officials under ORS 244.060.]*

27 *[(C) Require the entity's officers and directors to declare actual and potential conflicts of interest*
28 *at regular meetings of the entity's governing body when such conflicts arise, and require an officer or*
29 *director to abstain from participating in any discussion or voting on any item where that officer or*
30 *director has an actual conflict of interest. For the purposes of this subparagraph, "actual conflict of*
31 *interest" and "potential conflict of interest" have the meanings given those terms in ORS 244.020.]*

32 *[(D) Annually, arrange for an independent auditor to audit the entity's financial statements, and*
33 *direct the auditor to file an audit opinion with the commission for public review.]*

34 *[(E) Annually file with the commission the entity's budget, action plan and quarterly and annual*
35 *reports for public review.*

36 *[(F) At least once every five years, contract for an independent management evaluation to review the*
37 *entity's operations, efficiency and effectiveness, and direct the independent reviewer to file a report with*
38 *the commission for public review.]*

39 *[(h) The commission may remove from the board of directors of a nongovernmental entity an officer*
40 *or director who fails to provide an annual disclosure of economic interest, or who fails to declare an*
41 *actual or potential conflict of interest, as described in paragraph (g)(B) and (C) of this subsection, if*
42 *the failure is connected to the allocation or expenditure of funds collected through public purpose*
43 *charges and paid to the entity.]*

44 *[(4)(a) An electric company that satisfies its obligations under this section:]*

45 *[(A) Has no further obligation to invest in new cost-effective energy conservation, new market*

1 *transformation or new low-income weatherization, or to provide a commercial energy conservation ser-*
2 *vices program; and]*

3 *[(B) Is not subject to ORS 469.631 to 469.645 and 469.860 to 469.900.]*

4 *[(b) Oregon Community Power, for any period during which Oregon Community Power collects a*
5 *public purpose charge under subsection (2) of this section:]*

6 *[(A) Has no further obligation to invest in new cost-effective energy conservation, new market*
7 *transformation or new low-income weatherization, or to provide a commercial energy conservation ser-*
8 *vices program; and]*

9 *[(B) Is not subject to ORS 469.631 to 469.645 and 469.860 to 469.900.]*

10 *[(5)(a)]* **(4)(a)** A retail electricity consumer that uses more than one average megawatt of elec-
11 tricity at any site in the prior year shall receive a credit against public purpose charges billed by
12 an electric company or Oregon Community Power for that site. The amount of the credit shall be
13 equal to the total amount of qualifying expenditures for *[new cost-effective energy conservation, not*
14 *to exceed 68 percent of the annual public purpose charges, and]* the above-market costs of new
15 renewable energy resources **and investments in distribution system-connected technologies** in-
16 curred by the retail electricity consumer, not to exceed *[19]* **25.5** percent of the annual public pur-
17 pose charges, less administration costs incurred under this paragraph and paragraphs (b) and (c) of
18 this subsection. The credit may not exceed, on an annual basis, the lesser of:

19 (A) The amount of the retail electricity consumer's qualifying expenditures; or

20 (B) The portion of the public purpose charge billed to the retail electricity consumer that is
21 dedicated to *[new cost-effective energy conservation, new market transformation or]* the above-market
22 costs of new renewable energy resources **and investments in distribution system-connected**
23 **technologies**.

24 (b) To obtain a credit under paragraph (a) of this subsection, a retail electricity consumer shall
25 file with the State Department of Energy a description of the proposed *[conservation project or]* new
26 renewable energy resource **or investment in distribution system-connected technology** and a
27 declaration that the retail electricity consumer plans to incur the qualifying expenditure. The State
28 Department of Energy shall issue a notice of precertification within 30 days of receipt of the filing,
29 if such filing is consistent with paragraph (a) of this subsection. The credit may be taken after a
30 retail electricity consumer provides a letter from a certified public accountant to the State Depart-
31 ment of Energy verifying that the precertified qualifying expenditure has been made.

32 (c) Credits earned by a retail electricity consumer as a result of qualifying expenditures that
33 are not used in one year may be carried forward for use in subsequent years.

34 *[(d)(A) A retail electricity consumer that uses more than one average megawatt of electricity at any*
35 *site in the prior year may request that the State Department of Energy hire an independent auditor to*
36 *assess the potential for conservation investments at the site. If the independent auditor determines there*
37 *is no available conservation measure at the site that would have a simple payback of one to 10 years,*
38 *the retail electricity consumer shall be relieved of 54 percent of its payment obligation for public pur-*
39 *pose charges related to the site. If the independent auditor determines that there are potential conser-*
40 *vation measures available at the site, the retail electricity consumer shall be entitled to a credit against*
41 *public purpose charges related to the site equal to 54 percent of the public purpose charges less the*
42 *estimated cost of available conservation measures.]*

43 *[(B) A retail electricity consumer shall be entitled each year to the credit described in this para-*
44 *graph unless a subsequent independent audit determines that new conservation investment opportunities*
45 *are available. The State Department of Energy may require that a new independent audit be performed*

1 *on the site to determine whether new conservation measures are available, provided that the independ-*
2 *ent audits occur no more than once every two years.]*

3 *[(C) The retail electricity consumer shall pay the cost of the independent audits described in this*
4 *paragraph.]*

5 *[(6)] (5) Electric utilities and retail electricity consumers shall receive a fair and reasonable*
6 *credit for the public purpose expenditures of their energy suppliers. The State Department of Energy*
7 *shall adopt rules to determine eligible expenditures and the method by which such credits are ac-*
8 *counted for and used. The State Department of Energy also shall adopt methods to account for eli-*
9 *gible public purpose expenditures made through consortia or collaborative projects.*

10 *[(7)(a) In addition to the public purpose charge provided under subsection (2) of this section, an*
11 *electric company or Oregon Community Power shall collect funds for low-income electric bill payment*
12 *assistance in an amount determined under paragraph (b) of this subsection.]*

13 *[(b) The commission shall establish the amount to be collected by each electric company from retail*
14 *electricity consumers, and the rates to be charged by each electric company to retail electricity con-*
15 *sumers, so that the forecasted collection by all electric companies in calendar year 2018 is \$20 million.*
16 *In subsequent calendar years, the commission may not decrease the rates below those established for*
17 *calendar year 2018. The commission may temporarily adjust the rates if forecasted collections or actual*
18 *collections are less than \$20 million in any calendar year. A retail electricity consumer may not be*
19 *required to pay more than \$500 per month per site for low-income electric bill payment assistance.]*

20 *[(c) Funds collected through the low-income electric bill payment assistance charge shall be paid*
21 *into the Housing and Community Services Department Low-Income Electric Bill Payment Assistance*
22 *Fund established by ORS 456.587 (2). Moneys deposited in the fund under this paragraph shall be used*
23 *by the Housing and Community Services Department solely for purposes related to low-income electric*
24 *bill payment assistance and for the Housing and Community Services Department's cost of adminis-*
25 *tering this subsection. Funds collected by an electric company or Oregon Community Power under this*
26 *subsection shall be expended in the service area of the electric company or Oregon Community Power*
27 *from which the funds are collected.]*

28 *[(d)(A) The Housing and Community Services Department shall determine the manner in which*
29 *funds collected under this subsection will be allocated by the Housing and Community Services De-*
30 *partment to energy assistance program providers for the purpose of providing low-income bill payment*
31 *and crisis assistance.]*

32 *[(B) The Housing and Community Services Department, in consultation with electric companies,*
33 *shall investigate and may implement alternative delivery models to effectively reduce service discon-*
34 *nections and related costs to retail electricity consumers and electric utilities.]*

35 *[(C) Priority assistance shall be directed to low-income electricity consumers who are in danger of*
36 *having their electricity service disconnected.]*

37 *[(D) The Housing and Community Services Department shall maintain records and provide those*
38 *records upon request to an electric company, Oregon Community Power and the Citizens' Utility Board*
39 *established under ORS chapter 774 on a quarterly basis. Records maintained must include the num-*
40 *bers of low-income electricity consumers served, the average amounts paid to low-income electricity*
41 *consumers and the type of assistance provided to low-income electricity consumers. Electric companies*
42 *and Oregon Community Power shall, if requested, provide the Housing and Community Services De-*
43 *partment with aggregate data relating to low-income electricity consumers served on a quarterly basis*
44 *to support program development.]*

45 *[(e) Interest on moneys deposited in the Housing and Community Services Department Low-Income*

1 *Electric Bill Payment Assistance Fund established by ORS 456.587 (2) may be used to provide bill*
2 *payment and crisis assistance to electricity consumers whose primary source of heat is not electricity.]*

3 *[(f) Notwithstanding ORS 757.310, the commission may allow an electric company or Oregon*
4 *Community Power to provide reduced rates or other bill payment or crisis assistance or low-income*
5 *program assistance to a low-income household eligible for assistance under the federal Low Income*
6 *Home Energy Assistance Act of 1981, as amended and in effect on July 23, 1999.]*

7 [(8)] (6) For purposes of this section, “retail electricity consumers” includes any direct service
8 industrial consumer that purchases electricity without purchasing distribution services from the
9 electric utility.

10 [(9)] (7) For purposes of this section, funds collected by Oregon Community Power through
11 public purpose charges are not considered moneys received from electric utility operations.

13 **COST-EFFECTIVE ENERGY EFFICIENCY**

14
15 **SECTION 2.** ORS 757.054 is amended to read:

16 757.054. (1) As used in this section[,]:

17 (a) “Electric company” has the meaning given that term in ORS 757.600.

18 (b) **“Retail electricity consumer” means a retail electricity consumer, as defined in ORS**
19 **757.600, that is located in Oregon.**

20 (2) The Legislative Assembly finds and declares that:

21 (a) Energy efficiency programs promote lower energy bills, protect the public health and safety,
22 improve environmental benefits, stimulate sustainable economic development, create new employ-
23 ment opportunities and reduce reliance on imported fuels; and

24 (b) Demand response resources result in more efficient use of existing resources and reduce the
25 need for procuring new power generating resources, which, in turn, reduces energy bills, protects
26 the public health and safety and improves environmental benefits.

27 (3) For the purpose of ensuring prudent investments by an electric company in energy efficiency
28 and demand response before the electric company acquires new generating resources, and in order
29 to produce cost-effective energy savings, reduce customer demand for energy, reduce overall elec-
30 trical system costs, increase the public health and safety and improve environmental benefits, each
31 electric company serving customers in this state shall:

32 (a) Plan for and pursue all available energy efficiency resources that are cost effective, reliable
33 and feasible; and

34 (b) As directed by the Public Utility Commission by rule or order, plan for and pursue the ac-
35 quisition of **available** cost-effective demand response resources.

36 (4) **All funds necessary to plan for and pursue cost-effective energy efficiency resources**
37 **pursuant to subsection (3)(a) of this section must be collected in the rates of an electric**
38 **company through charges paid by all retail electricity consumers, including those retail**
39 **electricity consumers receiving electricity from electricity service suppliers subject to the**
40 **limitations set forth in section 3 of this 2021 Act. The commission may require that a portion**
41 **of all of the funds collected under this subsection be paid to a nongovernmental entity to**
42 **make expenditures consistent with this section.**

43 (5)(a) **A retail electricity consumer that uses more than one average megawatt of elec-**
44 **tricity at any site in the prior year shall receive a credit against the amount charged in rates**
45 **pursuant to subsection (4) of this section for that site for qualifying expenditures for energy**

1 efficiency resources made by the retail electricity consumer. The amount of the credit may
2 not exceed the lesser of:

3 (A) The amount charged to the retail electricity consumer in rates; or

4 (B) The total amount of qualifying energy efficiency expenditures described in subsection
5 (3)(a) of this section made by the retail electricity consumer for that site, less administration
6 costs incurred under this subsection.

7 (b) The State Department of Energy shall adopt by rule procedures and other provisions
8 necessary for a retail electricity consumer to obtain a credit under this subsection.

9 **SECTION 3.** (1) As used in this section:

10 (a) "Single contiguous area" includes an area of land crossed by a public or railroad right
11 of way, but does not include infrastructure facilities located within the public or railroad
12 right of way for purposes of determining whether the single contiguous area of land consti-
13 tutes a site.

14 (b) "Site" means:

15 (A) Buildings and related structures that are interconnected by facilities owned by a
16 single retail electricity consumer and that are served through a single electric meter;

17 (B) A single contiguous area of land containing buildings or other structures within
18 which each building or structure is no more than 1,000 feet from at least one other building
19 or structure, if the buildings and structures and the land containing and connecting the
20 buildings and structures are all owned by a single retail electricity consumer, either directly
21 or through a wholly owned subsidiary, that is billed for electricity use at the buildings and
22 structures; or

23 (C) For any single retail electricity consumer, each account of the retail electricity con-
24 sumer that has exceeded 4,000 kilowatts at least twice within the most recent 13-month pe-
25 riod and for which the retail electricity consumer maintains a load factor of 80 percent or
26 greater, if the combined electricity usage across all of the accounts described in this sub-
27 paragraph, in the aggregate, equals 100 average megawatts or more in a calendar year.

28 (2) For the period beginning on the effective date of this 2021 Act and ending December
29 31, 2025, a retail electricity consumer that uses more than one average megawatt of elec-
30 tricity at any site in the prior year may not be charged an amount in rates pursuant to ORS
31 757.054 (4) that exceeds 1.7 percent of the total revenue received from the sale of electricity
32 services to the site from any source.

33 (3) For the period beginning January 1, 2026, and ending December 31, 2035, the combined
34 annual amount charged under ORS 757.054 and 757.612 to a retail electricity consumer that
35 uses more than one average megawatt and less than 10 average megawatts of electricity at
36 any site in the prior year may not exceed \$250,000.

37 (4)(a) For the period beginning January 1, 2026, and ending December 31, 2030, the com-
38 bined annual amount charged under ORS 757.054 and 757.612 to a retail electricity consumer
39 that uses more than 10 average megawatts of electricity at any site in the prior year may
40 not exceed \$4 million.

41 (b) For the period beginning January 1, 2031, and ending December 31, 2035, the combined
42 annual amount charged under ORS 757.054 and 757.612 to a retail electricity consumer that
43 uses more than 10 average megawatts of electricity at any site in the prior year may not
44 exceed \$4.5 million.

45 **SECTION 4.** Section 3 of this 2021 Act is repealed on January 2, 2036.

1 **SECTION 5.** ORS 757.613 is amended to read:

2 757.613. (1) If an electric company [*or Oregon Community Power*] invests moneys collected **under**
3 **ORS 757.054** [*as a public purpose charge under ORS 757.612*] on new cost-effective local energy
4 conservation, or if the nongovernmental entity described in [*ORS 757.612 (3)(g)*] **section 9 of this**
5 **2021 Act** invests moneys paid to the nongovernmental entity under [*ORS 757.612 (3)(d)*] **ORS 757.054**
6 on new cost-effective local energy conservation, and if the investment involves updating the energy
7 efficiency of a residential or nonresidential building, the electric company, Oregon Community
8 Power or the nongovernmental entity may make those investments by conducting a whole building
9 assessment of the energy efficiency of the building and, in consideration of the whole building as-
10 sessment, by maximizing the overall energy efficiency of the building. For purposes of this sub-
11 section, a “whole building assessment” means a single assessment of savings opportunities, as
12 identified by the Public Utility Commission by rule or order.

13 (2) An investment described in subsection (1) of this section must be limited to an investment
14 in a single project, as authorized by the commission by rule or order.

15
16 **APPLICABILITY OF CERTAIN ENERGY CONSERVATION PROGRAM**
17 **REQUIREMENTS TO ELECTRIC COMPANIES**

18
19 **SECTION 6.** Section 7 of this 2021 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 757.

20 **SECTION 7.** Notwithstanding the specific requirements imposed on an electric company
21 by ORS 469.631 to 469.645 and 469.860 to 469.900, an electric company meets the requirements
22 of ORS 469.631 to 469.645 and 469.860 to 469.900 if the electric company:

23 (1) Meets the public purpose expenditure standard established under ORS 757.612; and

24 (2) Plans for and pursues cost-effective energy efficiency and demand response resources
25 as required under ORS 757.054.

26
27 **REQUIREMENTS RELATED TO NONGOVERNMENTAL ENTITIES**
28 (Generally)

29
30 **SECTION 8.** Section 9 of this 2021 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 757.

31 **SECTION 9.** (1) If the Public Utility Commission requires funds collected pursuant to
32 ORS 757.054, through natural gas tariffs or through public purpose charges pursuant to ORS
33 757.612 to be paid to a nongovernmental entity, the entity shall:

34 (a) Include on the entity’s board of directors an ex officio member designated by the
35 commission, who shall also serve on the entity’s nominating committee for filling board va-
36 cancies.

37 (b) Require the entity’s officers and directors to provide an annual disclosure of economic
38 interest to be filed with the commission on or prior to April 15 of each calendar year for
39 public review in a form similar to the statement of economic interest required for public
40 officials under ORS 244.060.

41 (c) Require the entity’s officers and directors to declare actual and potential conflicts of
42 interest at regular meetings of the entity’s governing body when such conflicts arise, and
43 require an officer or director to abstain from participating in any discussion or voting on any
44 item where that officer or director has an actual conflict of interest. For the purposes of this
45 paragraph, “actual conflict of interest” and “potential conflict of interest” have the meanings

1 given those terms in ORS 244.020.

2 (d) Annually, arrange for an independent auditor to audit the entity's financial state-
3 ments, and direct the auditor to file an audit opinion with the commission for public review.

4 (e) With public utilities, jointly develop public utility-specific budgets, action plans and
5 agreements that detail the entity's public utility-specific planned activities, resources and
6 technologies pursuant to ORS 757.054 and 757.612 (3)(b)(B), including coordinated activities
7 that require joint investment and deployment. Each action plan must reflect stakeholder
8 feedback gathered through a public process managed by the entity and the relevant public
9 utility as overseen by the commission.

10 (f) File with the commission the entity's budget, action plan and quarterly and annual
11 reports for public review. The entity's budget and action plan must include the budget and
12 action plans jointly developed with public utilities under paragraph (e) of this subsection.

13 (g) At least once every five years, contract for an independent management evaluation
14 to review the entity's operations, efficiency and effectiveness, and direct the independent
15 reviewer to file a report with the commission for public review.

16 (2) The commission may remove from the board of directors of a nongovernmental entity
17 an officer or director who fails to provide an annual disclosure of economic interest, or who
18 fails to declare an actual or potential conflict of interest, as described in this section, if the
19 failure is connected to the allocation or expenditure of funds collected pursuant to ORS
20 757.054, through natural gas tariffs or through public purpose charges pursuant to ORS
21 757.612 and paid to the entity.

22
23 (Environmental Justice)
24

25 SECTION 10. Section 11 of this 2021 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 757.

26 SECTION 11. (1) As used in this section, "Environmental justice" means the equal
27 treatment, protection from environmental and health hazards, and meaningful involvement
28 of environmental justice communities in the development, implementation and enforcement
29 of regulations and policies that affect the environment in which people live, work, learn,
30 practice spirituality and play.

31 (2) The Public Utility Commission shall establish, and update no less than once every four
32 years, equity metrics for the purpose of assessing, addressing and creating accountability for
33 environmental justice in the expenditure and investment of funds collected pursuant to ORS
34 757.054, through natural gas tariffs or through public purpose charges pursuant to ORS
35 757.612 and paid to a nongovernmental entity. The equity metrics and each update required
36 by this section must reflect feedback gathered through a public process that is managed by
37 the commission and that, at a minimum, includes representatives of environmental justice
38 communities.

39 (3) Each nongovernmental entity that is paid funds collected pursuant to ORS 757.054,
40 through natural gas tariffs or through public purpose charges pursuant to ORS 757.612 shall,
41 as part of the entity's filings required under section 9 (1)(f) of this 2021 Act, report on the
42 entity's progress in achieving the equity metrics established pursuant to this section.

43 SECTION 12. The equity metrics required to be established under section 11 of this 2021
44 Act shall first be established by the Public Utility Commission no later than December 31,
45 2022.

REPEAL

SECTION 13. ORS 757.689 is repealed.

LOW-INCOME ELECTRIC BILL PAYMENT ASSISTANCE

SECTION 14. Section 15 of this 2021 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 757.

SECTION 15. (1) An electric company, as defined in ORS 757.600, or Oregon Community Power shall collect funds for low-income electric bill payment and crisis assistance in an amount determined by the Public Utility Commission. The commission shall:

(a) Establish the amount to be collected and rates to be charged by each electric company from its customers, including customers receiving electricity from other sources, such that the forecasted collection by all electric companies in a calendar year is at least \$20 million.

(b) Adjust the rates if forecasted collections or actual collections are less than \$20 million in any calendar year but shall not otherwise adjust the rates once set.

(c) Ensure that no customer pays more than \$500 per month per customer site for low-income electric bill payment and crisis assistance.

(2) Funds collected by an electric company or Oregon Community Power under this section shall be:

(a) Paid into the Housing and Community Services Department Low-Income Electric Bill Payment Assistance Fund established by ORS 456.587 (2);

(b) Used by the Housing and Community Services Department solely for purposes related to low-income electric bill payment and crisis assistance and for the Housing and Community Services Department's cost of administering this section; and

(c) Expended in the service area of the electric company or Oregon Community Power from which the funds are collected.

(3) The Housing and Community Services Department shall determine the manner in which funds collected under this subsection are allocated by the department to energy assistance program providers for the purpose of providing low-income electric bill payment and crisis assistance. However, the department shall:

(a) In consultation with electric companies, investigate and may implement alternative delivery models to effectively reduce service disconnections and related costs to customers and electric companies; and

(b) Direct priority assistance to low-income customers who are in danger of having their electricity service disconnected.

(4) The department shall maintain records and provide those records upon request to an electric company, Oregon Community Power and the Citizens' Utility Board established under ORS chapter 774 on a quarterly basis. Records maintained must include the numbers of low-income customers served, the average amounts paid and the type of assistance provided. Electric companies and Oregon Community Power shall, if requested, provide the department with aggregate data relating to low-income customers served on a quarterly basis to support program development.

(5) Interest on moneys deposited in the Housing and Community Services Department Low-Income Electric Bill Payment Assistance Fund established by ORS 456.587 (2) may be

1 used to provide bill payment and crisis assistance to customers whose primary source of heat
2 is not electricity.

3 (6) Notwithstanding ORS 757.310, the commission may allow an electric company or
4 Oregon Community Power to provide reduced rates or other bill payment or crisis assistance
5 or low-income program assistance to a low-income household eligible for assistance under
6 the federal Low Income Home Energy Assistance Act of 1981, as amended and in effect on
7 July 23, 1999.

8 NOTE: Sections 16 and 17 were deleted by amendment. Subsequent sections were not renum-

25 shall:

26 (a) Prescribe the form and manner by which the owner or operator of a solar photovoltaic en-
27 ergy system may apply to participate in the program;

28 (b) Require an owner or operator of a solar photovoltaic energy system applying to participate
29 in the program to submit a plan to complete construction of the solar photovoltaic energy system
30 and begin to generate electricity within one year after being enrolled in the program;

31 (c) Enroll in the program applicants that own or operate solar photovoltaic energy systems
32 qualified to be included in the program;

33 (d) Limit the cumulative nameplate capacity of solar photovoltaic energy systems included in the
34 program that are owned or operated by a single program enrollee, and any business affiliated with
35 the program enrollee, to 35 megawatts; and

36 (e) Close the program to new applicants on the earlier of the following dates:

37 (A) The date on which all solar photovoltaic energy systems included in the program have a
38 cumulative nameplate capacity of 150 megawatts; or

39 (B) January 2, 2017.

40 (3)(a) To participate in the program, an owner or operator of a solar photovoltaic energy system
41 must demonstrate to the satisfaction of the department that the solar photovoltaic energy system is
42 qualified to be included in the program. A solar photovoltaic energy system is qualified to be in-
43 cluded in the program if the solar photovoltaic energy system:

44 (A) Is located in this state;

45 (B) Has a nameplate capacity of at least two megawatts;

1 (C) Has a nameplate capacity of no more than 10 megawatts;

2 (D) Has a commercial operations date, as specified in a power purchase agreement, of January
3 1, 2016, or later;

4 (E) Is either directly connected to the electrical system of an investor-owned utility or publicly
5 owned utility, or is indirectly connected to the electrical system of an investor-owned utility or
6 publicly owned utility in a manner that the department determines is acceptable for program
7 enrollees;

8 (F) Has a meter or other device that monitors and measures the quantity of energy generated
9 by the solar photovoltaic energy system; and

10 (G) Meets any other siting, design, interconnection, installation and electric output standards
11 required by the laws of this state.

12 (b) An investor-owned utility or a publicly owned utility that owns a qualified solar photovoltaic
13 energy system is eligible to participate in the program.

14 (4)(a) Subject to paragraphs (b) and (c) of this subsection, for the purpose of incentivizing the
15 generation of electricity derived from solar energy, the department shall make a monthly payment
16 to a program enrollee for a solar photovoltaic energy system that generates electricity for an
17 amount that equals one-half cent per kilowatt hour of electricity generated by the solar photovoltaic
18 energy system during the preceding month. Payments shall continue for five years after the date
19 on which the department makes the initial payment to the program enrollee for energy generated
20 by the solar photovoltaic energy system.

21 (b) Beginning one year after a program enrollee is enrolled in the program, for each month that
22 the program enrollee's solar photovoltaic energy system does not generate electricity, the depart-
23 ment shall reduce by one month the number of monthly payments otherwise required to be paid to
24 the program enrollee under paragraph (a) of this subsection for that solar photovoltaic energy sys-
25 tem.

26 (c) If by two years after a program enrollee is enrolled in the program the program enrollee's
27 solar photovoltaic energy system has not generated electricity, the department shall remove the
28 solar photovoltaic energy system from the program established under this section and the program
29 enrollee may not receive any payments otherwise required to be paid to the program enrollee under
30 paragraph (a) of this subsection for that solar photovoltaic energy system.

31 (5) Before enrolling an applicant as described in subsection (2)(c) of this section, the Oregon
32 Business Development Department shall:

33 (a) Consult with the State Department of Energy to ensure that:

34 (A) A proposed solar photovoltaic energy system is qualified as described in subsection (3) of
35 this section; and

36 (B) The solar photovoltaic energy system, if not generating electricity on the date of application,
37 is likely to begin generating electricity no later than one year after the date on which the owner
38 or operator of the solar photovoltaic energy system applies to be included in the program; and

39 (b) If applicable, consult with the Public Utility Commission to ensure that the costs associated
40 with a solar photovoltaic energy system will be recoverable pursuant to a schedule submitted to and
41 approved by the commission in accordance with ORS 757.205 and 757.210 or pursuant to other ap-
42 plicable provisions of law providing for the recovery of costs borne by investor-owned utilities.

43 (6) The owner of a solar photovoltaic energy system included in the program established under
44 this section:

45 (a) Also owns all renewable energy certificates established under ORS 469A.130 that are asso-

1 ciated with the generation of electricity by the solar photovoltaic energy system; and

2 (b) Is not eligible to receive funds under ORS 757.612 (3)(b)(B) **(2019 Edition)** unless the funds
3 are received pursuant to an agreement entered into before *[the effective date of this 2016 Act]* **March**
4 **16, 2016.**

5 (7) The Oregon Business Development Department may adopt rules to implement this section.

6 (8) The department shall submit a report on implementing this section in the manner provided
7 by ORS 192.245 to an interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to energy no later than
8 September 15 of each odd-numbered year.

9 **SECTION 19.** ORS 297.300 is amended to read:

10 297.300. The records related to any funds collected **pursuant to ORS 757.054, through natural**

- 36 (2) "Cost inputs" means:
- 37 (a) The cost of goods sold as calculated in arriving at federal taxable income under the Internal
38 Revenue Code; or
- 39 (b) In the case of a taxpayer that is engaged in a farming operation, as defined in section 6,
40 chapter 2, Oregon Laws 2020 (first special session) (Enrolled House Bill 4202), and that does not
41 report cost of goods sold for federal tax purposes, the taxpayer's operating expenses excluding labor
42 costs.
- 43 (3) "Doing business" means engaging in any activity, whether legal or illegal, that is conducted

11 (h) Foreign or alien insurance companies, but only with respect to the underwriting profit de-
12 rived from writing wet marine and transportation insurance subject to tax under ORS 731.824 and
13 731.828.

14 (i) Governmental entities.

15 (j) Any person with commercial activity that does not exceed \$750,000 for the calendar year,
16 other than a person that is part of a unitary group as provided in ORS 317A.106 with commercial
17 activity in excess of \$750,000.

18 (k) Hospitals subject to assessment under ORS 414.855, long term care facilities subject to as-
19 sessment under ORS 409.801 or any entity subject to assessment under ORS 414.880 or section 3 or
20 5, chapter 538, Oregon Laws 2017.

21 (L) Manufactured dwelling park nonprofit cooperatives organized under ORS chapter 62.

22 (5) "Financial institution" has the meaning given that term in ORS 314.610, except that "finan-
23 cial institution" does not include a credit union.

24 (6)(a) "FR Y-9" means the consolidated or parent-only financial statements that a holding com-
25 pany is required to file with the Federal Reserve Board pursuant to 12 U.S.C. 1844.

26 (b) In the case of a holding company required to file both consolidated and parent-only financial
27 statements, "FR Y-9" means the consolidated financial statements that the holding company is re-
28 quired to file.

29 (7) "Governmental entity" means:

30 (a) The United States and any of its unincorporated agencies and instrumentalities.

31 (b) Any incorporated agency or instrumentality of the United States wholly owned by the United
32 States or by a corporation wholly owned by the United States.

33 (c) The State of Oregon and any of its unincorporated agencies and instrumentalities.

34 (d) Any county, city, district or other political subdivision of the state.

35 (e) A special government body as defined in ORS 174.117.

36 (f) A federally recognized Indian tribe.

37 (8) "Groceries" means food as defined in 7 U.S.C. 2012(k), but does not include cannabinoid
38 edibles or marijuana seeds.

39 (9)(a) "Hedging transaction" means a hedging transaction as defined in section 1221 of the
40 Internal Revenue Code or a transaction accorded hedge accounting treatment under Financial Ac-
41 counting Standards Board Statement No. 133.

42 (b) "Hedging transaction" does not include a transaction in which an actual transfer of title of
43 real or tangible property to another entity occurs.

44 (10) "Insurer" has the meaning given that term in ORS 317.010.

45 (11) "Internal Revenue Code," except where the Legislative Assembly has provided otherwise,

1 refers to the laws of the United States or to the Internal Revenue Code as they are amended and
2 in effect on December 31, 2018.

3 (12) "Labor costs" means total compensation of all employees, not to include compensation paid
4 to any single employee in excess of \$500,000.

5 (13)(a) "Motor vehicle fuel or any other product used for the propulsion of motor vehicles"
6 means:

7 (A) Motor vehicle fuel as defined in ORS 319.010; and

8 (B) Fuel the use of which in a motor vehicle is subject to taxation under ORS 319.530.

9 (b) "Motor vehicle fuel or any other product used for the propulsion of motor vehicles" does not
10 mean:

11 (A) Electricity; or

12 (B) Electric batteries or any other mechanical or physical component or accessory of a motor
13 vehicle.

14 (14) "Person" includes individuals, combinations of individuals of any form, receivers, assignees,
15 trustees in bankruptcy, firms, companies, joint-stock companies, business trusts, estates, partner-
16 ships, limited liability partnerships, limited liability companies, associations, joint ventures, clubs,
17 societies, entities organized as for-profit corporations under ORS chapter 60, C corporations, S cor-
18 porations, qualified subchapter S subsidiaries, qualified subchapter S trusts, trusts, entities that are
19 disregarded for federal income tax purposes and any other entities.

20 (15) "Retailer" means a person doing business by selling tangible personal property to a pur-
21 chaser for a purpose other than:

22 (a) Resale by the purchaser of the property as tangible personal property in the regular course
23 of business;

24 (b) Incorporation by the purchaser of the property in the course of regular business as an in-
25 gredient or component of real or personal property; or

30 (17)(a) "Taxpayer" means any person or unitary group required to register, file or pay tax under
31 ORS 317A.100 to 317A.158.

32 (b) "Taxpayer" does not include excluded persons, except to the extent that a tax-exempt entity
33 has unrelated business income as described in the Internal Revenue Code.

34 (18)(a) "Unitary business" means a business enterprise in which there exists directly or indi-
35 rectly between the members or parts of the enterprise a sharing or exchange of value as demon-
36 strated by:

37 (A) Centralized management or a common executive force;

38 (B) Centralized administrative services or functions resulting in economies of scale; or

39 (C) Flow of goods, capital resources or services demonstrating functional integration.

20 systems that are permanently installed in this state by retail electricity consumers and that first
21 become operational after the program begins. The cumulative nameplate capacity of the qualifying
22 systems enrolled in all of the pilot programs may not exceed 27.5 megawatts of alternating current.
23 Qualifying systems enrolled in the pilot program may not have nameplate generating capacity

10 (3)(b)(B) (**2019 Edition**) or tax credits under ORS 469B.100 to 469B.118 or 469B.130 to 469B.169.

11 (10) All prudently incurred costs associated with compliance with this section are recoverable
12 in the rates of an electric company.

13 (11) The commission shall advise and assist the owners and operators of qualifying systems in
14 identifying and using grants, incentive moneys, federal funding and other sources of noninvestment
15 financial support for the construction and operation of qualifying systems.

16 (12) The pilot programs described in subsection (1) of this section close to new participants on
17 the earlier of:

18 (a) March 31, 2016; or

19 (b) The date the cumulative nameplate capacity of solar photovoltaic energy systems that have
20 been permanently installed by retail electricity consumers under the pilot programs equals 27.5
21 megawatts of alternating current.

22 (13) The commission shall submit a report to the Legislative Assembly by January 1 of each
23 odd-numbered year. The report must evaluate the effectiveness of the pilot programs described in

30 *to prepare a report to the Legislative Assembly describing proposed modifications to public purpose*
31 *requirements undertaken pursuant to ORS 757.612. The report shall be due on January 1, 2007.*]

32 [(c) *The commission and the department jointly shall select an independent nongovernmental entity*
33 *to prepare a report to the Legislative Assembly recommending whether the public purpose funding re-*
