Senate Bill 409

Sponsored by Senator FERRIOLI (Presession filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Repeals minimum wage increases that have not yet become operative. Authorizes Wasco and Josephine Counties to avoid adjustments for inflation until wage rate is equal to that of nonurban counties.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to the repeal of prospective minimum wage increases; creating new provisions; amending

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4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

5 <u>SECTION 1.</u> ORS 653.025, as amended by section 1, chapter 12, Oregon Laws 2016, is amended 6 to read:

653.025. (1) Except as provided in [subsections (2) and (3)] subsection (2) of this section, ORS
652.020 and the rules of the Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries issued under ORS
653.030 and 653.261, for each hour of work time that the employee is gainfully employed, no em-

(b) From January 1, 2004, to June 30, 2016, a rate adjusted for inflation as calculated by the commissioner.

(b) After June 30, 2017, beginning on July 1 of each year, a rate adjusted annually for inflation as described in subsection (3) of this section.

[(4) The commissioner shall adopt rules for determining an employer's location under subsection
(2) of this section.]

[(5)(a)] (3)(a) The Oregon minimum wage shall be adjusted for inflation as provided in paragraph
(b) of this subsection.

(b) No later than April 30 of each year, beginning in [2023] 2018, the commissioner shall calculate an adjustment of the wage amount specified in [subsection (1)(j)] subsections (1)(d) and (2)(b) of this section based upon the increase, if any, from March of the preceding year to March of the year in which the calculation is made in the U.S. City Average Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers for All Items as prepared by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor or its successor.

(c) The wage amount as adjusted under this subsection shall be rounded to the nearest fivecents.

(d) The wage amount as adjusted under this subsection becomes effective as the new Oregon
minimum wage amount, replacing the minimum wage amount specified in [subsection (1)(j)] subsections (1) and (2) of this section, on July 1 of the year in which the calculation is made.

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SECTION 2. Section 3 of this 2017 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 653.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> Notwithstanding ORS 653.025, an employer located in Josephine or Wasco County shall maintain a minimum wage rate that is equal to the rate in effect on July 1, 2016, without adjustment for inflation, until the date on which the rate in those counties is less than or equal to the rate applicable to counties listed in section 2, chapter 12, Oregon Laws 2016, after which Josephine and Wasco Counties shall maintain a rate equal to nonurban counties as described in section 2, chapter 12, Oregon Laws 2016.

44 <u>SECTION 4.</u> This 2017 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 45 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2017 Act takes effect $\rm SB~409$
