## AN ACT

1 2 3	Amending Title 35 (Health and Safety) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in Commonwealth services, providing for work-related hazardous duty.
4	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
5	hereby enacts as follows:
6	Section 1. Title 35 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated
7	Statutes is amended by adding a section to read:
8	<u>§ 7309. Work-related hazardous duty.</u>
9	(a) Presumption of work-related hazardous duty
10	Notwithstanding any other provision of this title or any other
11	law or regulation, an individual employed by a life-sustaining
12	business or occupation who is required to work and who
13	contracts, has symptoms of or is otherwise exposed to an
14	infectious disease during the declaration of a disaster
15	emergency under section 7301 (relating to general authority of
16	Governor), the declaration of an epidemic or a public health_
17	emergency in this Commonwealth by the Governor or a pandemic,

1	which results in a period of hospitalization, quarantine,
2	isolation or other control measures due to infection or
3	exposure, shall establish a presumption that the individual's
4	medical condition or inability to work is work-related hazardous
5	<u>duty.</u>
6	(b) Hazardous duty deemed on-duty timeAn individual with
7	an established presumption of work-related hazardous duty under
8	subsection (a) may not be required to use sick time, vacation
9	time, personal time or any other accrued paid time off or
10	contractual time off to cover the period of incapacitation or
11	inability to work.
12	(c) Eligibility for unemployment compensation
13	Notwithstanding any provision of the act of December 5, 1936
14	(2nd Sp.Sess., 1937 P.L.2897, No.1), known as the Unemployment
15	Compensation Law, an individual with an established presumption
16	of work-related hazardous duty under subsection (a) shall be
17	eligible and qualified for unemployment compensation for the
18	duration of the period of incapacitation or inability to work.
19	(d) Eligibility for workers' compensationNotwithstanding
20	any provision of the act of June 2, 1915 (P.L.736, No.338),
21	known as the Workers' Compensation Act, an individual with an
22	established presumption of work-related hazardous duty under
23	subsection (a) shall be eligible and qualified for workers'
24	compensation for all medical costs related to infection or
25	exposure.
26	(e) DefinitionsAs used in this section, the following
27	words and phrases shall have the meanings given to them in this
28	subsection unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:
29	"COVID-19." The novel coronavirus as identified in the
30	Governor's proclamation of disaster emergency issued March 6,
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1	<u>2020, published at 50 Pa.B 1644 (March 21, 2020).</u>
2	"Individual employed by a life-sustaining business or
3	occupation." A front-line employee or other individual who is
4	employed by or under contract with a life-sustaining business or
5	entity and who is required to work during a public health
6	emergency. The term includes:
7	(1) A first responder, including a law enforcement
8	officer, firefighter, emergency medical technician and any
9	other individual who is considered to be a first responder.
10	(2) A corrections officer or other support staff.
11	(3) An emergency services dispatcher.
12	(4) An ambulance driver.
13	(5) A retail worker, including a restaurant, food
14	services or grocery store worker, cashier or other support
15	staff.
16	(6) A food or agriculture worker.
17	(7) A medical, health care or public health worker,
18	including a doctor, nursing professional, physician
19	assistant, paramedic or other support staff.
20	(8) A pharmacist or any cashier or other support staff.
21	(9) A home health care worker.
22	(10) A public utility worker, including a worker engaged
23	in providing telecommunications, energy, water or wastewater
24	services or public works.
25	(11) An employee of State or local government.
26	(12) A trash collector.
27	(13) A warehouse worker.
28	(14) Any other individual who is employed by a life-
29	sustaining business or occupation and who is required to work
30	during a public health emergency.

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1	"Infectious disease." As follows:
2	(1) A disease that is:
3	(i) caused by a microorganism, such as a bacterium,
4	<u>virus or protozoan;</u>
5	(ii) not normally found in the human body; and
6	(iii) capable of causing infection.
7	(2) The term includes COVID-19 or any other novel virus
8	<u>or infectious disease.</u>
9	(3) Some, but not all, infectious diseases are
10	contagious, meaning that they can spread from person to
11	person, including COVID-19 or the coronavirus. Other
12	infectious diseases can spread from animals or insects to
13	humans, but not from person to person.
14	"Life-sustaining business or occupation." A list of
15	businesses or occupations, as designated by the Governor, that
16	perform or conduct a range of vital operations, functions and
17	services that are essential to assisting the Commonwealth and
18	its political subdivisions in protecting people and their
19	communities while ensuring continuity of functions critical and
20	essential to public health and safety, as well as economic and
21	homeland security, and that should continue normal operations,
22	appropriately modified to account for the Centers for Disease
23	Control and Prevention's and the Department of Health's
24	workforce and customer protection guidance, during the
25	declaration of a disaster or public health emergency.
26	"Public health emergency." An emergency declaration by the
27	Governor of an occurrence or imminent threat of a disease or
28	condition of critical public health importance with the
29	following characteristics:
30	(1) Is believed to be caused by any of the following:

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1	(i) The emergence and spread of a novel or
2	previously controlled or eradicated infectious disease.
3	(ii) An infectious disease epidemic in this
4	Commonwealth or a pandemic.
5	(2) Poses a high probability of any of the following in
6	the affected population:
7	<u>(i) Death.</u>
8	(ii) Serious or long-term disabilities.
9	(iii) Widespread exposure to an infectious disease,
1 0	which poses a significant risk of substantial present or
10	
10	future harm to the public health and safety.
