- 13 (b) [Stalking.--] <u>Cyber harassment of a child. A person</u>

1	commits the crime of cyber CYBER HARASSMENT OF A CHILD	<
2	(1) A PERSON COMMITS THE CRIME OF CYBER harassment of a	-
3	child if, with intent to harass, he HARASS, ANNOY OR ALARM,	<

- "Emotional distress." A temporary or permanent state of

- 22 "Repeatedly communicates." To convey more than one message
- 23 over a period of time.
- "Seriously disparaging statement or opinion." A statement or
- 25 opinion which is intended to and under the circumstances is
- 26 reasonably likely to cause serious emotional distress to a child
- 27 of the victim's age.
- 28 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
