AN ACT

1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8	Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An act relating to the public school system, including certain provisions applicable as well to private and parochial schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," providing for the funding of preschool education for financially needy persons, for educational support services for preschool children and for distribution of books to parents of preschool-age children.
9	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
10	hereby enacts as follows:
11	Section 1. The act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known
12	as the Public School Code of 1949, is amended by adding an
13	article to read:
14	ARTICLE XIII-B
15	PRESCHOOL EDUCATION GRANT PROGRAM
16	Section 1301-B. Legislative findings.
17	The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:
18	(1) Parents are best suited to choose the most
19	appropriate means of education for their preschool-age
20	children, including the selection of preschool programs of

their choice or the selection of in-home care and education.
(2) Enabling parents to be closely involved in the
education of their children at an early age is the most
effective means of promoting school readiness.
(3) Providing diverse educational opportunities for the
children of this Commonwealth is a civic imperative and a
matter of serious public concern.
(4) The importance of providing educational choices that
will meet the needs of parents and the need to maintain and
operate an effective system of education makes it imperative
to provide for the increased availability of diverse
opportunities, including both public and nonpublic programs
of preschool education, to benefit all citizens of this
Commonwealth.
(5) Many disadvantaged preschool-age residents of this
Commonwealth enjoy comparatively fewer educational
opportunities or options than preschool-age residents from
families that possess greater economic means.
(6) The accessibility to families of both public and
nonpublic preschool educational alternatives decreases the
burdens on the Commonwealth and increases the range of
educational choices available to Pennsylvania families, thus
providing a benefit to all citizens of this Commonwealth.
(7) The program of funding and supplemental services for
preschool education provided in this article is one element
of the Commonwealth's overall program of providing funds and
related services to ensure the availability of preschool
educational opportunities for students living in this
Commonwealth.
(8) A program for funding preschool educational choice

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1	and supplemental services must be viewed as an integral part
2	of its overall program of educational funding and not as an
3	isolated individual program.
4	(9) A program of financial assistance and supplemental
5	services to enhance preschool educational choice in this
6	Commonwealth, as one element of the Commonwealth's plan for
7	funding of diverse educational opportunities, will:
8	(i) greatly aid efforts to equalize preschool
9	educational opportunities for the citizens of this
10	<u>Commonwealth;</u>
11	(ii) better prepare Commonwealth citizens to succeed
12	in school and ultimately to compete for employment
13	<u>opportunities;</u>
14	(iii) foster long-term development of a more capable
15	and better-educated work force; and
16	(iv) better enable the Commonwealth to fulfill its
17	obligation of providing children the opportunity of
18	receiving a quality education.
19	Section 1302-B. Definitions.
20	The following words and phrases when used in this article
21	shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
22	context clearly indicates otherwise:
23	"Charter school." A charter school established under the
24	provisions of Article XVII-A.
25	"Child day-care center." A child day-care center that is
26	licensed under Article X of the Public Welfare Code.
27	"Children's institution." A child day-care center that is
28	supervised by the Department of Human Services under Article IX
29	<u>of the Public Welfare Code.</u>
30	"Civil Rights Act." The Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Public Law
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1	<u>88-352, 78 Stat. 241).</u>
2	"Department." The Department of Education of the
3	Commonwealth.
4	"Eligible grant recipient." The parent of a preschool-age
5	child who attends or is about to attend a preschool program in
6	this Commonwealth and who meets the income qualification
7	provisions of section 1303-B.
8	"Grant." A grant awarded in accordance with this article.
9	"Head start." A program funded under the Head Start Act
10	(Public Law 97-35, 42 U.S.C. § 9831 et seq.), established by the
11	Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981 (Public Law 97-35, 95
12	Stat. 357) and carried out by a Head Start agency or delegate
13	agency that provides ongoing comprehensive child development
14	services.
15	"Household income." All income, as defined in section 301 of
16	the act of March 4, 1971 (P.L.6, No.2), known as the Tax Reform
17	Code of 1971, of an eligible grant recipient and any other adult
18	member of the same household.
19	"Library." A library that is eligible to receive State aid
20	under 24 Pa.C.S. Ch. 93 (relating to Public Library Code).
21	"Nonpublic school." A school, other than a public school,
22	located within this Commonwealth, at which a Commonwealth
23	resident may lawfully fulfill the compulsory attendance
24	requirements of this act and which meets the applicable
25	requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act.
26	"Parent." A Commonwealth resident who is a parent or
27	guardian of, or person in parental relation to, a preschool-age
28	child.
29	"Preschool-age child." A resident of this Commonwealth who
30	is at least two and a half years of age as of September 1 of the
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1	school year for which a preschool education grant is sought.
2	"Preschool program." A program of education for preschool-
3	age children that:
4	(1) Meets the requirements of section 1304-B(2).
5	(2) Is operated by a public school district, a charter
6	<u>school, a private academic school, a nonpublic school, a</u>
7	child day-care center, a Head Start program or a children's
8	institution.
9	(3) Meets the applicable requirements of Title VI of the
10	<u>Civil Rights Act.</u>
11	"Program." The Preschool Education Grant Program established
12	by this article.
13	"Public Welfare Code." The act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31,
14	No.21), known as the Public Welfare Code.
15	"Secretary." The Secretary of Education of the Commonwealth.
16	Section 1303-B. Preschool education grants.
17	(a) Program establishedThe Preschool Education Grant
18	Program is established for the purpose of awarding grants for
19	preschool education to persons who qualify as eligible grant
20	recipients, to the extent permitted by annual appropriations
21	made by the General Assembly.
22	(b) Parental qualificationsTo qualify for a preschool
23	education grant a parent must:
24	(1) Be a member of a household that has total household
25	income that does not exceed an amount equal to 235% of the
26	Federal poverty guidelines as reported by the United States
27	Department of Health and Human Services.
28	(2) Make application to the department for a grant on
29	forms developed and distributed by the department.
30	(c) Amounts

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1	(1) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (2), a	
2	grant shall be awarded in the maximum amount of \$12 per hour	
3	of actual attendance at a preschool program or the actual	
4	hourly charge for a preschool program, whichever is less.	
5	Grants may not be used to pay for more than seven hours of	
6	instruction per day or for more than 180 days per school	
7	<u>year.</u>	
8	(2) At the beginning of each fiscal year, the secretary	-
9	shall increase the maximum amount of the grant by a	
10	percentage factor equal to the percentage increase in the	
11	<u>Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for the</u>	-
12	Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Maryland area, officially	
13	reported by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of	-
14	Labor Statistics, for the fiscal year immediately prior to	
15	the date the adjustment is to take place. The secretary shall	
16	publish the maximum grant amount, as adjusted, as a statement

20	(f) Maximum allowanceThe grants	awarded may be used only
21	for payment of actual charges for atten	<u>dance at a preschool</u>
22	program. The department may reduce the	amount of the grant award
23	to offset any other payments made from	<u>State-appropriated funds</u>
24	to avoid payments in excess of the actu	al charges incurred for
25	attendance at the preschool program.	
26	<u>(g) Grant guidelines</u>	
27	(1) The department shall issue	guidelines for the
28	awarding of grants that shall includ	e:
29	(i) Grant application and a	ward notification dates.
30	<u>(ii) Standards for the veri</u>	fication of income

2	(iii) Confirmation of attendance by eligible grant
3	<u>recipients.</u>
4	(iv) Distribution of information to preschool
5	programs and the general public concerning the program.
6	(v) Restricted endorsement of grant award checks by
7	eligible grant recipients to the preschool program
8	attended by the eligible grant recipient's child.
9	(vi) Transfer of a child between preschool programs.
10	(vii) Disqualification for eligibility for future
11	preschool grant awards for fraud or misrepresentations in
12	connection with the program.
13	(2) The guidelines shall be published as a statement of
14	policy in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and shall be mailed by
15	the department to each preschool program in this
16	Commonwealth.
17	(h) Nontaxable incomeA grant awarded may not be
18	considered taxable income for State or local income tax purposes
19	<u>in this Commonwealth.</u>
20	(i) AttendanceAttendance by a child at a preschool
21	program shall not constitute entry into a school for purposes of
22	section 1326.
23	Section 1304-B. Preschool programs.
24	(a) RequirementsA grant may be awarded for attendance at
25	a preschool program that meets the following requirements:
26	(1) The preschool program shall meet all applicable
27	State and local fire safety and building code requirements
28	and all applicable State laws relating to health and safety
29	that are administered by the Department of Agriculture, the
30	Department of Environmental Protection, the Department of

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1	Health, the Department of Human Services, the Department of
2	Labor and Industry, the Department of Transportation and
3	county health departments. The preschool program shall comply
4	with all applicable provisions of section 1517.
5	(2) The preschool program shall comply with all
6	applicable requirements of sections 111 and 111.1 and with
7	all applicable requirements of 23 Pa.C.S. Ch. 63 (relating to
8	child protective services) as to requirements for background
9	checks and certifications for employees or volunteers.
10	(3) The preschool program shall have a director who is
11	at least 21 years of age, has completed a program of
12	instruction in general first aid training, including
13	instruction in childhood injury prevention and infectious
14	diseases, has completed fire safety training and any
15	applicable requirements for training in the recognition and
16	reporting of child abuse and has at least 1,250 hours of
17	employment experience in teaching or working with children.
18	(4) The preschool program shall employ only those
19	individuals who satisfy the applicable provisions of this act
20	for employment as teachers or as aides in the school, child
21	day-care center or children's institution that operates the
22	preschool program.
23	(5) The preschool program shall maintain instructional
24	materials and equipment compatible with the preschool
25	program's philosophy, objectives and teaching methodology and
26	that accommodate the number of children in the preschool
27	program.
28	(6) The program of instruction shall include those
29	motor, creative, manipulative, imaginative, rhythmic,
30	language and science activities and experiences that are

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1	designed to promote the physical, mental, social, emotional
2	and aesthetic development of children of preschool age.
3	Objectives and daily plans shall be kept on file and shall be
4	available to the department or to parents upon request.
5	(7) Learning experiences at the preschool program, both
6	informal and planned, shall include:
7	(i) Free play, which shall include outdoor play,
8	when permitted by weather conditions.
9	<u>(ii) Gross motor skill development.</u>
10	<u>(iii) Fine motor skill development.</u>
11	(iv) Perceptual activities.
12	(v) Language arts activities.
13	(vi) Mathematical activities.
14	(vii) Science activities; expressive arts, including
15	music, art and dramatic play.
16	(viii) Socialization and social development
17	activities.

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- 1 requirements of this article. 2 (2) The Department of Human Services and the Department 3 of Health may make such announced and unannounced inspections as may be necessary to ascertain compliance with each of the 4 5 requirements of this article. (c) Public education.--6 (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of this act, a 7 school district or charter school may establish a reasonable 8 9 charge for attendance at a preschool program operated by the school district or charter school under guidelines to be 10 11 established by the department. 12 (2) A school district may contract for services with 13 another preschool program provided by a school district, 14 charter school, private academic school or nonpublic school that meets the requirements of this article. 15 16 (d) Limitations.--Nothing in this article shall be 17 construed: 18 (1) To empower the Commonwealth or any of its agencies 19 or officers to prescribe the course content or admissions 20 criteria for any religiously affiliated preschool program. 21 (2) To compel any nonpublic preschool program to accept 22 or enroll the child of an eligible grant recipient. 23 (3) To impose any additional requirements on any 24 nonpublic preschool program that are not otherwise authorized 25 under this act. 26 (4) To require any preschool program to accept or retain 27 the child of any eligible grant recipient, if the preschool program does not offer programs or is not structured or 28

2	(e) Grant recipientsA grant awarded to an eligible grant
3	recipient shall not constitute financial assistance or
4	appropriations to the preschool program attended by the eligible
5	grant recipient's child.
6	(f) Fairness of feesNo preschool program may charge a
7	parent who is an eligible grant recipient a higher fee for
8	attendance at the preschool program than the parent would have
9	been charged had the parent not received a grant.
10	Section 1305-B. Educational support services for preschool
11	<u>children.</u>
12	(a) Supplemental grantsTo the extent permitted by annual
13	appropriations made by the General Assembly, the department
14	shall make supplemental grants to parents who are eligible grant
15	recipients for the purposes of obtaining tutorial services in
16	reading, language arts and mathematics from providers who are
17	approved by the department to provide services under Article XV-
18	<u>C or from a library.</u>
19	(b) Grant guidelinesThe department shall issue guidelines
20	prescribing procedures relating to application for and
21	notification of grant awards, restrictive endorsement of grant
22	award checks, grant eligibility, distribution of information to
23	parents and prospective providers and grant amounts.
24	(c) Need-based awardsGrants shall be awarded according to
25	need, utilizing the same percentage guidelines as are prescribed
26	in section 1303-B(d).
27	<u>Section 1306-B. Book distribution.</u>
28	To the extent permitted by annual appropriations of the
29	General Assembly, the department shall establish a program for
30	the distribution of books and other instructional materials to

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1 <u>low-income parents that will provide the parents with</u>

2 instruction in child development and early childhood education,

3 or that are suitable for use by the parents in reading to or

- 4 providing instruction to their preschool-age children. The books
- 5 and instructional materials distributed under this section shall
- 6 be distributed through libraries, schools, community centers and
- 7 other facilities selected by the department.
- 8 Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
