## AN ACT

- 1 Providing for conservation corridors.
- 2 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 3 hereby enacts as follows:
- 4 Section 1. Declaration of policy.
- 5 The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:
- 6 (1) Outdoor recreation is among our nation's largest
- 7 economic sectors. Pennsylvania is a leader in outdoor
- 8 recreation consumer spending, a critical component of our
- 9 tourism industry. The preservation of this Commonwealth's
- 10 natural resources is necessary for our tourism industry to
- 11 continue to thrive.
- 12 (2) Pennsylvania ranks among the top states for
- 13 wildlife-vehicle collisions.
- 14 (3) It is recognized as a public good that habitat
- 15 connectivity, including conservation corridors and habitat

- linkages, be maintained and expanded. It is the policy of the
- 2 Commonwealth to encourage, wherever feasible and practical,
- 3 voluntary steps to protect the functioning of conservation
- 4 corridors through various means, as applicable.
- 5 (4) Areas containing diverse ecological and geological
- 6 characteristics are vital to the preservation and enhancement
- 7 of the natural resources of this Commonwealth and the
- 8 continual health and well-being of the residents of this
- 9 Commonwealth.
- 10 (5) Connectivity between wildlife habitats is important
- to the long-term viability of this Commonwealth's
- 12 biodiversity. Preserving and connecting high-quality habitat
- for wildlife can create habitat strongholds. Increasingly
- fragmented habitats threaten this Commonwealth's wildlife
- 15 species.
- 16 (6) Analysis of this Commonwealth's habitat connectivity
- 17 benefits from the consideration of all relevant data,
- 18 including information from private and public landowners,
- 19 surrounding states and nonprofit organizations.
- 20 (7) Currently, conservation corridors in Pennsylvania
- 21 are managed by different Commonwealth commissions and
- departments. A study that identifies and evaluates
- 23 conservation corridors would be beneficial to all wildlife
- 24 and residents.
- 25 Section 2. Definitions.
- The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
- 27 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
- 28 context clearly indicates otherwise:
- "Conservation corridor." A habitat linkage that joins two or
- 30 more areas of wildlife habitat, allowing for fish passage or the

- 1 movement of wildlife from one area to another.
- 2 "Habitat stronghold." A high-quality habitat where wildlife
- 3 populations are strong and diverse, highly functioning and
- 4 intact.
- 5 "Wildlife." Mammals, birds, fish, reptiles, amphibians and
- 6 plants.
- 7 Section 3. Study.
- 8 (a) Study required. -- The following apply:
- 9 (1) The Legislative Budget and Finance Committee, in
- 10 collaboration with the Pennsylvania Game Commission, the
- 11 Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, the Department of
- 12 Conservation and Natural Resources, the Department of
- 13 Environmental Protection, the Insurance Department and the
- 14 Department of Transportation, shall conduct a study of
- 15 conservation corridors.
- 16 (2) (i) The Legislative Budget and Finance Committee
- may consult with organizations that:
- 18 (A) protect birds and their habitats using
- science, advocacy, education and on-the-ground
- 20 conservation measures;
- 21 (B) provide representation of the
- Commonwealth's 121 State parks and 2.2 million
- acres of forest land or the interests of private
- 24 landowners;
- 25 (C) integrate conservation and economic
- development in a way that strengthens and
- inspires communities;
- 28 (D) collect data on wildlife-vehicle
- 29 collisions; or
- 30 (E) have knowledge of relevant issues.

- 1 (ii) The Legislative Budget and Finance Committee 2 may consult surrounding states and private landowners 3 that have knowledge of relevant issues.
  - (3) The study shall include, at a minimum, the following components:
    - (i) A Return on Environment Study or the demonstration of the economic benefits of conservation corridors attributed to increased opportunity for outdoor recreation, tourism and ecosystem services, including, but not limited to, clean water, flood protection, air pollution removal, mineral resources, agriculture products and marketable timber.
    - (ii) An economic impact analysis of the establishment of conservation corridors and wildlife crossings in key areas on wildlife-vehicle collisions.
    - (iii) Identification of existing and needed conservation corridors, including riparian corridors and potential crossings of transportation arteries.
    - (iv) Identification of voluntary mechanisms, such as easements and cooperative management agreements, that affect conservation corridors. Recommendations concerning any potential changes shall be formulated after an opportunity for public comment.
    - (v) A determination as to whether an advisory task force should be established on a permanent basis to regularly update the study findings.
- (b) Action by commissions and departments.—The Pennsylvania 28 Game Commission, the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, the 29 Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, the Department 30 of Environmental Protection, the Insurance Department and the

- 1 Department of Transportation shall consider conservation
- 2 corridors as identified in the study. Each commission or
- 3 department shall modify, as necessary, the processes for
- 4 issuance, revision or amendment of management plans for lands
- 5 and waters under the commission's or department's administrative
- 6 control.
- 7 (c) Construction. -- Nothing in this section shall be
- 8 construed to permit entrance onto private property for purposes
- 9 described in this section without the express permission of the
- 10 landowner.
- 11 Section 4. Report.
- 12 The Legislative Budget and Finance Committee shall prepare a
- 13 report of the findings and recommendations of the study
- 14 conducted under section 3 and submit the report to the Secretary
- 15 of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House of
- 16 Representatives no later than June 30, 2020.
- 17 Section 5. Effective date.
- 18 This act shall take effect in 60 days.
