AN ACT

1 Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An
2 act relating to the public school system, including certain
3 provisions applicable as well to private and parochial
4 schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the
5 laws relating thereto," in books, furniture and supplies,
6 providing for purchase and use of green cleaning products.

7 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
8 hereby enacts as follows:

9 Section 1. The act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known
10 as the Public School Code of 1949, is amended by adding a
11 section to read:

12 Section 801.1. Purchase and Use of Green Cleaning
13 Products.--(a) The board of school directors of each school
14 district shall purchase green cleaning products for use by
15 public schools as is practical and economically feasible. Public
16 schools may exhaust existing cleaning products prior to the
17 purchase of green cleaning products.

18 (b) The board of school directors of each school district
19 shall develop and implement policies on the purchase and use of
20 green cleaning products by the effective date of this

1 subsection. The policies shall:

2 (1) require green cleaning products to be used by public
3 schools;

4 (2) establish purchasing policies of green cleaning products
5 that meet third-party certification standards, including:

6 (i) Green Seal, Green Label, Environmental Choice,
7 TerraChoice or Ecologo; or

8 (ii) any other nationally recognized independent third-party
9 entity that certifies environmentally preferable products that
10 the board of school directors determines to be appropriate;

11 (3) establish green cleaning practices, including storage,
12 application, frequency of use and disposal of supplies to ensure
13 that the occupants of a school building do not suffer any
14 adverse health effects as a result of these practices;

15 (4) provide a clear and accurate description of the
16 functional characteristics or nature of the green cleaning
17 products that are to be purchased; and

18 (5) require training for staff on implementing the policies.

19 (c) Policies developed and implemented according to this
20 section shall not preclude the use, when necessary, of a
21 disinfectant, disinfecting cleaner, sanitizer or another
22 microbial product regulated by the Federal Insecticide,
23 Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (61 Stat. 163, 7 U.S.C. § 136 et
24 seq.).

25 (d) On or before June 30 of each year, a board of school
26 directors that does not purchase green cleaning products for use
27 shall provide written notice of its reasoning to the Department
28 of Education.

29 (e) As used in this section, the following words and phrases
30 shall have the meanings given to them in this subsection unless

1 the context clearly indicates otherwise:

2 "Green cleaning products." Environmentally preferable
3 cleaning and cleaning maintenance products and supplies intended
4 for routine cleaning and cleaning maintenance that, at a
5 minimum, possess positive health and environmental attributes,
6 including biodegradability, low toxicity, low volatile organic
7 compound content, reduced packaging, low life cycle energy use
8 and lesser or reduced effects on human health and the
9 environment when compared to competing products that serve the
10 same purpose. The term includes general purpose cleaners,
11 bathroom cleaners, carpet cleaners, glass cleaners, floor
12 cleaners, floor finishes and floor strippers, wall cleaners,
13 desk cleaners, surface cleaners, window cleaners, whiteboard
14 cleaners and soap. The term does not include room deodorizers,
15 air fresheners, toilet deodorizers and hand cleaners.

16 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
