AN ACT

Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An 1 act relating to the public school system, including certain 2 provisions applicable as well to private and parochial 3 schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the 4 laws relating thereto," IN PUPILS AND ATTENDANCE, FURTHER 5 <---PROVIDING FOR ACTUAL COST OF TUITION AND MAINTENANCE OF 6 CERTAIN EXCEPTIONAL CHILDREN IN THE FOUR CHARTERED SCHOOLS 7 FOR EDUCATION OF THE DEAF AND THE BLIND; MAKING A REPEAL; AND 8 making editorial changes. 9

10 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

11 hereby enacts as follows:

12 Section 1. Section 502 of the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, <--

13 No.14), known as the Public School Code of 1949, amended October-

- 14 30, 2019 (P.L.460, No.76), is amended to read:
- 15 SECTION 1. SECTIONS 502, 925(F), 923.2-A, 1328, 1338 AND <--
- 16 1376(A) OF THE ACT OF MARCH 10, 1949 (P.L.30, NO.14), KNOWN AS
- 17 THE PUBLIC SCHOOL CODE OF 1949, ARE AMENDED TO READ:
- 18 Section 502. Additional Schools and Departments.--In

1	addition to the elementary public schools, the board of school
2	directors in any school district may establish, equip, furnish,
3	and maintain the following additional schools or departments for
4	the education and recreation of persons residing in said
5	district, and for the proper operation of its schools, namely:
6	High schools,
7	Trade schools,
8	Career and technical schools,
9	Cafeterias,
10	Agricultural schools,
11	Evening schools,
12	Kindergartens,
13	Libraries,
14	Museums,
15	Reading-rooms,
16	Gymnasiums,
17	Playgrounds,
18	Schools for [physically and mentally handicapped] <u>children</u>
19	with physical or mental disabilities,
20	Truant schools,
21	Parental schools,
22	Schools for adults,
23	Public lectures,
24	Such other schools or educational departments as the
25	directors, in their wisdom, may see proper to establish.
26	Said additional schools or departments, when established,
27	shall be an integral part of the public school system in such
28	school district and shall be so administered.
29	No pupil shall be refused admission to the courses in these
30	additional schools or departments, by reason of the fact that

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his elementary or academic education is being or has been
 received in a school other than a public school.

4 1377, 1377.1, 1379, 1502 E(b) and 2108 of the act are amended to
5 read:

6 Section 925. Powers and Duties.--

(f) (1) Any county board of school directors may make 7 8 contracts of insurance with any insurance company, or nonprofit hospitalization corporation, or nonprofit medical service 9 10 corporation, authorized to transact business within the Commonwealth, insuring its employes, their spouses and 11 dependents and retired employes under a policy or policies of 12 13 group insurance covering life, health, hospitalization medical 14 service, or accident insurance, and for such purposes may agree 15 to pay part or all of the premiums or charges for carrying such contracts, and may include the cost of such charges in its 16 17 estimate of the cost of operating and administering classes or 18 schools for [handicapped and institutionalized] children with 19 physical or mental disabilities to be operated by the county board during the ensuing school year. No contract or contracts 20 of insurance authorized by this section shall be purchased from 21 22 or through any person employed by the county board in a teaching 23 or administrative capacity.

(2) The county board of school directors is hereby
authorized to deduct from the employe's pay, salary, or
compensation, such part of the premium as is payable by the
employe and as may be so authorized by the employe in writing.
(3) All contracts procured hereunder shall conform and be
subject to all the provisions of any existing or future laws
concerning group insurance contracts.

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1 Section 923.2-A. Visual Services.--(a) Legislative Finding; Declaration of Policy. [Defects] Impairments in vision are 2 3 health-related. It is today recognized that the diagnosis and evaluation of those [defects] impairments and the rendering of 4 instruction in skills appropriate for the education, safety and 5 independence of children afflicted by visual impairments are 6 7 closely related to their physical, mental and emotional health. Such services can best be rendered upon the premises of the 8 school which the child regularly attends and forcing children to 9 go to other premises in order to have such needed services is 10 11 found by the General Assembly to be both inadequate and harmful. 12 The General Assembly expressly finds and declares diagnostic, 13 evaluative and instructional services for such children to be 14 health services and it is the intention of the General Assembly now to make these available, on a general and even-handed basis 15 to all school children in the Commonwealth. 16

17 (b) Definitions. As used in this section:

18 "Nonpublic school" means any nonprofit school, other than a 19 public school within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, wherein a 20 resident of the Commonwealth may legally fulfill the compulsory 21 school attendance requirements and which meets the requirements 22 of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Public Law 88-352).

23 "Visual services" means diagnostic, evaluative and 24 instructional visual services for children.

(c) Provision of Services. The Secretary of Education, directly or through the intermediate units out of their allocation under section 922.1-A shall have the power and duty to furnish free to nonpublic school students, upon the premises of the nonpublic schools which they regularly attend, services adequate for the diagnosis and evaluation of visual [defects]

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<u>impairments</u> and instruction and training in skills advisable for the education, independence and safety of such children, including but not limited to mobility training, provided that such services are also afforded to public school students by the public school district in which such nonpublic school is located.

7 Section 1328. Compulsory Education of Children with Physical 8 [Defectives] Impairments. -- Every parent, guardian, or other person, having control or charge of any child of compulsory 9 10 school age who is deaf or blind, [or is so crippled,] or whose hearing or vision is so [defective] impaired as to make it 11 impracticable to have such child educated in the public schools 12 13 of the district in which he is a resident, shall allow such 14 child to be sent to some school where proper provision is made for the education of the deaf, or of the blind, [or of crippled 15 16 children,] or shall provide for the tuition of such child by a legally certified private tutor. 17

18 Section 1338. Dependent Children.--In case any child of 19 compulsory school age cannot be kept in school in compliance 20 with the provisions of this act, on account of incorrigibility, 21 truancy, insubordination, or [other bad] inappropriate conduct, or if the presence of any child attending school is detrimental 22 23 to the welfare of such school, on account of incorrigibility, 24 truancy, insubordination, or [other bad] inappropriate conduct, 25 the board of school directors may, by its superintendent, 26 secretary, attendance officer or State, municipal, port authority, transit authority or housing authority police 27 28 officer, under such rules and regulations as the board may 29 adopt, proceed against said child before the juvenile court, or 30 otherwise, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law for

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1 incorrigible, truant, insubordinate, or dependent children. Section 1376. Cost of Tuition and Maintenance of Certain 2 3 Exceptional Children in Approved Institutions. -- (a) When any child between school entry age and twenty-one (21) years of age 4 and resident in this Commonwealth, who is blind or deaf, or has 5 6 cerebral palsy and/or neurological impairment and/or muscular dystrophy and/or is [mentally retarded] intellectually disabled_ 7 8 and/or has a serious emotional [disturbance] disability and/or has autism/pervasive developmental disorder and is enrolled, 9 10 with the approval of the Department of Education, as a pupil in an approved private school approved by the Department of 11 Education, in accordance with standards and regulations 12 promulgated by the State Board of Education, the school district 13 14 in which such child is resident or, for students placed by a 15 charter school, the charter school in which the student was 16 enrolled shall pay the greater of either twenty per centum (20%) of the actual audited cost of tuition and maintenance of such 17 18 child in such school, as determined by the Department of Education, or its "tuition charge per elementary pupil" or its 19 "tuition charge per high school pupil," as calculated pursuant 20 to section 2561, and the Commonwealth shall pay, out of funds 21 appropriated to the department for special education, the 22 23 balance due for the costs of such child's tuition and 24 maintenance, as determined by the department. For the school 25 years 1989-1990, 1990-1991 and 1991-1992, the school district 26 payment shall be no greater than forty percent (40%) of the actual audited costs of tuition and maintenance of such child in 27 28 such school. For the 1992-1993 school year through the 2003-2004 29 school year, the school district or charter school payment shall 30 be the greater of forty percent (40%) of the actual audited

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costs of tuition and maintenance of such child in such school, 1 2 as determined by the Department of Education, or its "tuition 3 charge per elementary pupil" or its "tuition charge per high school pupil," as calculated pursuant to section 2561, and the 4 5 Commonwealth shall pay, out of funds appropriated to the department for approved private schools, the balance due for the 6 7 costs of such child's tuition and maintenance, as determined by 8 the department. For the 2004-2005 school year and each school 9 year thereafter, the school district or charter school payment 10 shall be the greater of forty percent (40%) of the approved tuition rate as established pursuant to subsection (c.3) or 11 (c.5) or the school district or charter school's "tuition 12 13 charges per elementary pupil" or "tuition charges per secondary pupil" as calculated under section 2561, and the Commonwealth 14 15 shall pay out of funds appropriated to the department for 16 approved private schools the balance of the approved tuition rate due for the cost of such child's tuition and maintenance. 17 18 The department will credit the district of residence with average daily membership for such child consistent with the 19 20 rules of procedure developed in accordance with section 2501. If the residence of such child in a particular school district 21 22 cannot be determined, the Commonwealth shall pay the whole cost 23 of tuition and maintenance of such child as established under 24 subsection (c.3) or (c.5).

26 SECTION 2. SECTION 1376.1(B.2) OF THE ACT IS AMENDED BY <--27 ADDING A PARAGRAPH TO READ:

28 SECTION 1376.1. ACTUAL COST OF TUITION AND MAINTENANCE OF 29 CERTAIN EXCEPTIONAL CHILDREN IN THE FOUR CHARTERED SCHOOLS FOR 30 EDUCATION OF THE DEAF AND THE BLIND.--* * *

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1 (B.2) PAYMENTS ARE AS FOLLOWS:

<u>(4)</u> FROM MONEY APPROPRIATED TO THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION
FOR PENNSYLVANIA CHARTERED SCHOOLS FOR DEAF AND BLIND CHILDREN
FOR THE 2022-2023 FISCAL YEAR, THE AMOUNT OF \$1,000,000 SHALL BE
USED FOR CAPITAL-RELATED COSTS AND DEFERRED MAINTENANCE TO BE
DIVIDED EQUALLY BETWEEN EACH CHARTERED SCHOOL FOR EDUCATION OF
THE DEAF AND THE BLIND.

10 SECTION 3. SECTIONS 1377, 1377.1, 1379, 1502-E(B), 2108, 11 2501(11), 2509(B), 2517(E) AND 2541(B)(3) OF THE ACT ARE AMENDED 12 TO READ:

13 Section 1377. Payment of Cost of Tuition and Maintenance of 14 Certain Exceptional Children.--(a) To facilitate payments by 15 the several school districts to the schools or institutions in which children who are deaf or blind, or cerebral palsied and/or 16 17 brain damaged and/or muscular dystrophied, or socially and 18 emotionally [disturbed] disabled or [mentally retarded children] 19 intellectually disabled are enrolled, of amounts due by such 20 districts for their proportion of the cost of tuition and maintenance of such children, the Secretary of Education shall 21 22 withhold from any moneys due to such districts out of any State 23 appropriation for the assistance as reimbursement of school 24 districts, the amounts due by such districts to such schools or 25 institutions for the blind or the deaf, or the cerebral palsied 26 and/or brain damaged and/or muscular dystrophied or the socially 27 and emotionally [disturbed] disabled and/or [mentally retarded] intellectually disabled. Amounts so withheld shall be 28 29 specifically appropriated to the Department of Education. 30 (b) Payments of the Commonwealth's proportion of the cost of

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tuition and maintenance of pupils who are blind or deaf, or 1 2 cerebral palsied and/or brain damaged and/or muscular 3 dystrophied, or socially and emotionally [disturbed] disabled and/or [mentally retarded pupils] intellectually disabled and 4 are enrolled in schools or institutions for the blind or for the 5 deaf, or for the cerebral palsied and/or brain damaged and/or 6 muscular dystrophied, or for the socially and emotionally 7 8 [disturbed] <u>disabled</u> and of the cost of instruction of parents 9 of blind pupils less than school entry age, as hereinbefore provided, shall be made quarterly, out of moneys appropriated to 10 the Department of Education for special education. Except for 11 12 the provisions of section 1376.1 providing for the actual cost 13 of tuition and maintenance of certain exceptional children in 14 the four chartered schools for education of the deaf and of the 15 blind, in no event shall the total payment for the cost of 16 tuition and maintenance of any such child exceed the rates per year allowed under section 1376. The maximum amount payable for 17 18 the cost of tuition and maintenance of such children shall be 19 subject to review at least once every two years for the purpose 20 of recommending an adjustment thereof.

21 For the purpose of enabling the Department of Education (C) to determine from time to time what amounts are due to schools 22 23 for the blind or for the deaf or for the cerebral palsied and/or 24 brain damaged and/or muscular dystrophied or for the socially 25 and emotionally [disturbed] disabled and/or [mentally retarded] 26 intellectually disabled hereunder, such schools shall forward to the department, at such times and in such form as the department 27 28 shall prescribe, sworn statements setting forth the names, ages, 29 and residences of all pupils enrolled hereunder, specifying the school districts liable for a part of the cost of tuition and 30

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1 maintenance of any such pupils, the per capita cost of and 2 maintenance of pupils, and such other information as the 3 department shall require.

For the purpose of providing adequate administration of the program and to carry out the preaudit functions authorized in section 1376(a), one-half of one percent (.50%) of the total appropriations for approved private schools from all funds shall be allocated to the Department of Education.

When, during the course of the 1982-1983 school year, 9 (d) 10 programs for exceptional children are caused to be transferred 11 from schools or institutions for the blind or deaf, or cerebral palsied or brain damaged or muscular dystrophied or [mentally 12 13 retarded] <u>intellectually disabled</u>, or socially and emotionally 14 [disturbed] disabled, as provided for in sections 1376 and 15 1376.1, to school districts or intermediate units, as provided 16 for in sections 2509 and 2509.1, under unanticipated or 17 emergency circumstances, and when such transfers necessitate the 18 transfer of funds from the appropriation to the Department of 19 Education for special education for approved private schools to 20 the appropriation to the Department of Education for payments on account of special education of exceptional children in public 21 schools, the Secretary of Education shall be empowered so to 22 23 transfer such funds, upon approval of the Secretary of the 24 Budget and written notification to the State Treasurer and the 25 chairmen of the House and Senate Appropriations and Education 26 Committees.

27 Section 1377.1. Transfer of Funds for Transferal Programs.--28 When, during the course of a school year or after the end of a 29 school year, programs for exceptional children are caused to be 30 transferred from schools or institutions for the blind or deaf,

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or cerebral palsied or brain damaged or muscular dystrophied or 1 2 [mentally retarded] intellectually disabled, or socially and emotionally [disturbed] disabled, as provided for in sections 3 1376 and 1376.1, to school districts or intermediate units, as 4 provided for in sections 2509 and 2509.1, and when such 5 transfers necessitate the transfer of funds from the 6 7 appropriation to the Department of Education for special 8 education for approved private schools to the appropriation to the Department of Education for payments on account of special 9 10 education of exceptional children in public schools, the Secretary of Education shall be empowered to transfer such 11 funds, upon approval of the Secretary of the Budget and written 12 13 notification to the State Treasurer and the chairmen of the 14 House and Senate Appropriations and Education Committees. 15 Section 1379. Children Under Six with [Defective] Impaired 16 Hearing; Parent or Guardian Advised of Schools, etc. -- Whenever notified by the Department of Health of the case of a minor 17 18 under six (6) years of age, who is totally deaf or whose hearing 19 is impaired, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, when in 20 his judgment the same is deemed desirable, shall communicate to the parent or quardian the location of any special schools, and 21 also the nearest public school having special classes for the 22 23 instruction of the hard of hearing, with the information 24 concerning the advantages offered by such school or classes, the 25 benefits to accrue to the child from attending such school or 26 classes, and the manner in which the expenses of such instruction will be provided for. 27

28 Section 1502-E. Character education program.

29 * * *

30 (b) Curriculum contents.--The program may include and teach 20210HB0365PN3568 - 11 - 1 the following basic civil values and character traits:

2 (1) Trustworthiness, including honesty, integrity,3 reliability and loyalty.

4 (2) Respect, including regard for others, tolerance and 5 courtesy.

6 (3) Responsibility, including hard work, economic self-7 reliance, accountability, diligence, perseverance and self-8 control.

9 (4) Fairness, including justice, consequences of [bad]
 10 <u>inappropriate</u> behavior, principles of nondiscrimination and
 11 freedom from prejudice.

12 (5) Caring, including kindness, empathy, compassion,13 consideration, generosity and charity.

14 (6) Citizenship, including love of country, concern for
15 the common good, respect for authority and the law and
16 community mindedness.

Section 2108. Qualifications of Principals and Teachers.--The board of public education in each school district of the first class shall prescribe the mode or modes of determining the qualifications of applicants for positions as principals or teachers in the schools of the district, and shall designate the kinds or grades of teachers' certificates which may or shall be used in the district, together with the scholastic,

25 professional, and personal qualifications required for each kind 26 or grade of certificate.

27 No certificate shall be granted to any person who is not of 28 good moral character, or to any person who shall not first have 29 presented a certificate, from a physician recognized by the 30 board of public education as competent for the purpose, setting

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1 forth that said applicant is neither mentally nor physically 2 disqualified by reason of tuberculosis, or any other chronic or 3 acute physical [defect] impairment, from successfully performing 4 the duties of a teacher.

5 Section 3. Section 2501(11) of the act, amended October 30, <--</p> 6 2019 (P.L.460, No.76), is amended to read:

7 Section 2501. Definitions.--For the purposes of this article 8 the following terms shall have the following meanings: 9 * * *

10 (11) "Actual Instruction Expense Per Elementary Teaching Unit, Actual Instruction Expense Per Elementary Teaching Unit in 11 a Laboratory School of a State-owned College, Actual Instruction 12 Expense Per Secondary Teaching Unit, Actual Instruction Expense 13 14 Per Secondary Teaching Unit in a Laboratory School of a State-15 owned College, Actual Instruction Expense Per Joint Elementary 16 Teaching Unit, Actual Instruction Expense Per Joint Secondary 17 Teaching Unit, Actual Instruction Expense Per Area Technical School Teaching Unit." In 1958 in the month of September and 18 19 thereafter annually in the month of September, the Department of 20 Education shall calculate for each school district for the 21 immediately preceding school year the actual instruction expense per elementary teaching unit for elementary pupils educated in 22 the district's public schools, the actual instruction expense 23 per secondary teaching unit for secondary pupils educated in the 24 district's public schools, the actual instruction expense per 25 26 joint elementary teaching unit for elementary pupils educated in elementary schools of jointures of which the district is a 27 28 member, the actual instruction expense per joint secondary 29 teaching unit for secondary pupils educated in secondary schools 30 of jointures of which the district is a member, the actual

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instruction expense per area technical school teaching unit for 1 2 pupils educated in area technical schools in which the district 3 participates, the actual instruction expense per elementary teaching unit for elementary pupils residing in the district and 4 educated in the public schools of other districts within the 5 Commonwealth, and the actual instruction expense per secondary 6 7 teaching unit for secondary pupils residing in the district and 8 educated in the public schools of other districts within the Commonwealth. In each case, actual instruction expense per 9 10 teaching unit shall be the sum of (i) and (ii) below but in no 11 case shall include expenses for debt service, capital outlay, 12 rentals of capital facilities and equipment, salaries and 13 expenses for school nurses, for medical and dental services, for 14 driver education courses, for reimbursable transportation of pupils, for tuition paid to other school districts, for 15 16 reimbursable board and lodging in lieu of transportation, for salaries of directors and supervisors of special education, 17 18 public school psychologists, principals of special schools and 19 assistants, teachers of approved special classes for [physically 20 and mentally handicapped] children with physical or mental disabilities, clerks and assistants employed in programs for 21 special education, for school district contributions to the 22 23 retirement fund on behalf of directors and supervisors of 24 special education, public school psychologists, principals of 25 special schools and assistants, teachers of approved special 26 classes for [physically and mentally handicapped] children with 27 physical or mental disabilities, clerks and assistants employed in programs for special education, for the cost of textbooks and 28 29 supplies of the second class used in special education classes or schools, for extension schools and classes, for extension 30

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1 recreation activities, for career and technical extension education, or for instruction of homebound children. (i) 2 3 Expenses of general control per teaching unit. Expenses of general control shall include: salaries, supplies and other 4 expenses of the secretary's office; commission or salary of 5 6 treasurer, tax collector, auditors and legal service; expenses 7 of census enumeration and other expenses of business 8 administration; salaries of the superintendent of schools and clerks of the superintendent of schools; expenses of supplies 9 10 and other expenses of the superintendent of schools' office; and 11 other expenses of general control. In the case of computation of 12 actual instruction expense per elementary teaching unit for 13 district pupils educated in the schools of the district and for 14 district pupils educated in the public schools of other 15 districts within the Commonwealth and actual instruction expense 16 per secondary teaching unit for district pupils educated in the 17 schools of the district and for district pupils educated in the 18 public schools of other districts within the Commonwealth, 19 expenses of general control per teaching unit shall be 20 calculated by dividing the foregoing listed expenses of general 21 control of the school district by the number of teaching units based on the number of all pupils who are residents of the 22 23 school district and are in average daily membership in the 24 public schools of the Commonwealth. In the case of computation 25 of actual instruction expense per joint elementary teaching unit 26 and actual instruction expense per joint secondary teaching unit, expenses of general control per teaching unit shall be 27 28 calculated by dividing the foregoing listed expenses of general 29 control of the school district by the number of teaching units based on the number of all pupils who are residents of the 30

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school district and are in average daily membership in the 1 2 public schools of the Commonwealth, and adding thereto the 3 quotient obtained by dividing the foregoing listed expenses of general control of the joint school district by the number of 4 joint teaching units based on the number of pupils who are 5 6 residents of school districts that are members of the joint school district and are in average daily membership in the 7 8 schools of the joint school district. In the case of computation 9 of actual instruction expense per area technical school teaching unit, expenses of general control per teaching unit shall be 10 11 computed by dividing the foregoing listed expenses of general 12 control of the school district by the number of teaching units 13 based on the total number of all pupils who are residents of the 14 school district and are in average daily membership in the 15 public schools of the Commonwealth, and adding thereto the 16 quotient obtained by dividing the foregoing listed expenses of general control of the area technical school by the number of 17 18 area technical school teaching units based on the number of 19 pupils who are residents of districts participating in the area 20 technical school and are in average daily membership in the area technical school. (ii) Expenses of the school district, joint 21 school district, area technical school, or such other school 22 23 district within the Commonwealth in which the districts' pupils 24 are educated, as the case may be, on account of instruction, 25 auxiliary agencies and coordinate activities, operation of 26 school plant, maintenance of school plant, and fixed charges, 27 and each separately for elementary and for secondary schools, 28 per teaching unit, calculated by dividing the sums of (a), (b), 29 (c), (d), and (e) below by the numbers of elementary, secondary, joint elementary, joint secondary, and area technical school 30

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teaching units, respectively, based on the number of all pupils 1 2 on an equivalent full-time basis in average daily membership in 3 the public schools of the district, or joint district, or the area technical school, or other school district within the 4 Commonwealth in which pupils of the district are educated, as 5 the case may be; (a) expenses of instruction, to include 6 salaries of supervisors and other expenses of supervisors, 7 8 salaries of principals and principals' clerks, supplies of the principals' offices, other expenses of supervision, teachers' 9 and teacher-librarians, salaries, textbooks, library books, 10 supplies used in instruction including library supplies, 11 12 expenses of attending teachers' institutes, commencement 13 exercise and exhibit expenses, and other expenses of 14 instruction, (b) expenses of auxiliary agencies and coordinate 15 activities, to include salaries, books, repairs, replacements, 16 and other expenses of public libraries, and non-reimbursable 17 transportation and board and lodging in lieu of transportation, 18 and provisions for tubercular and undernourished children, 19 community lectures, social centers and recreation, enforcement 20 of attendance, and other expenses of auxiliary agencies and coordinate activities, (c) expenses of operation of school 21 plant, to include wages of janitors and other employes, fuel, 22 23 water, light, power, janitors' supplies, care of grounds, 24 services other than personal, telephone rental, and other 25 expenses of operation, (d) expenses of maintenance of school 26 plant, to include upkeep of grounds, repair of buildings, repairs and replacements, heating, plumbing, lighting, apparatus 27 28 used in instruction, furniture, and other equipment, (e) 29 expenses of fixed charges, to include payments made to the retirement board, rent, all insurance, and other fixed charges: 30

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Provided, That the actual instruction expense for elementary 1 2 teaching unit for district pupils educated in the elementary 3 grades of a laboratory school of a State-owned college and the actual instruction expenses for secondary teaching unit for 4 district pupils educated in the high school grades of a 5 laboratory school of a State-owned college shall be computed by 6 7 (i) dividing the total amount of money paid to the State-owned 8 college by the resident district for the education of all resident elementary children enrolled in a laboratory school of 9 a State-owned college by the number of such elementary teaching 10 units based on the total number of such resident children in 11 average daily membership in the laboratory school, (ii) dividing 12 13 the total amount of money paid to the State-owned college by the 14 resident district for the education of all resident secondary children enrolled in a laboratory school of a State-owned 15 16 college by the number of such secondary teaching units based on 17 the total number of such resident children in average daily 18 membership in the laboratory school. The teaching units are 19 computed on the basis of thirty (30) equivalent full time 20 elementary children and twenty-two (22) equivalent full time 21 secondary children.

(b) To find the "instruction cost per special class pupil,"
add (1) salaries of directors and supervisors of special
education, public school psychologists, principals of special
schools and assistants, teachers of approved special classes for

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exceptional children, clerks and assistants employed in the 1 2 district's program for special education, (2) the district's 3 contribution to the retirement fund on behalf of directors and supervisors of special education, public school psychologists, 4 5 principals of special schools and assistants, teachers of 6 approved special classes for exceptional children, clerks and assistants employed in the district's program for special 7 8 education, (3) the cost of textbooks and supplies of the second class used in the district's special education classes or 9 10 schools, (4) the cost of telephonic system equipment which enables [handicapped] children with physical or mental 11 12 disabilities to remain in their homes and still participate in 13 classroom activities. Divide the sum of (1), (2), (3), and (4) 14 on that part thereof which is approved by the Department of 15 Education for reimbursement by the total number of pupils, 16 including those pupils who have available for use telephonic system equipment whereby they may remain at home and still 17 18 participate in classroom activities, in average daily membership 19 in the district's approved special classes for exceptional 20 children. The quotient so obtained shall be the "instruction 21 cost per special class pupil."
