## AN ACT

- 1 Providing for school entity procedures for tick removal, for 2 notification and for duties of the Department of Health and
- 3 the Department of Education.
- 4 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 5 hereby enacts as follows:
- 6 Section 1. Short title.
- 7 This act shall be known and may be cited as the Lyme Disease
- 8 Prevention in Schools Act.
- 9 Section 2. Declaration of policy.
- 10 The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:
- 11 (1) In the last six years, this Commonwealth ranked
- 12 highest in the country in the number of confirmed cases of
- 13 Lyme disease.
- 14 (2) In 2016, Pennsylvania reported 12,200 cases of Lyme
- disease, which translates to 122,000 new cases and about 40%
- of the nation's cases.
- 17 (3) The Department of Environmental Protection published

- a study in 2015 that confirmed a high risk of Lyme disease in
- 2 every county of this Commonwealth and found that all 67
- 3 counties had the blacklegged tick.
- 4 (4) Early clinical diagnosis and appropriate treatment
- of tick-borne diseases can greatly reduce the risks of
- 6 continued, diverse and chronic symptoms that can affect every
- 7 system and organ of the human body and often every aspect of
- 8 an individual's life.
- 9 (5) Residents of this Commonwealth should be aware of
- 10 early disseminated and persistent Lyme disease symptoms and
- should know that a negative test for Lyme disease cannot rule
- 12 out Lyme disease.
- 13 (6) The high burden of tick-borne diseases in this
- 14 Commonwealth requires an urgent and ongoing response.
- 15 Increasing education and prevention in a school setting is a
- specific recommended strategy.
- 17 (7) With children representing the highest risk group,
- schools are an accessible channel to quickly reduce exposures
- 19 and diagnose disease early.
- 20 Section 3. Definitions.
- 21 The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
- 22 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
- 23 context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 24 "Department." The Department of Health of the Commonwealth.
- 25 "School entity." A public school operating within this
- 26 Commonwealth, including a charter school or cyber charter
- 27 school, private school, nonpublic school, intermediate unit or
- 28 area vocational-technical school.
- 29 "School nurse." As defined in section 1401(8) of the act of
- 30 March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code

- 1 of 1949.
- 2 "School physician." As defined in section 1401(4) of the
- 3 Public School Code of 1949.
- 4 Section 4. Duties of school entities.
- 5 (a) General rule. -- In the event a school nurse or school
- 6 physician discovers a tick on a student during the school day,
- 7 the school nurse or school physician shall:
- 8 (1) Remove the tick from the student.
- 9 (2) Store the tick appropriately for a period of seven
- 10 days.
- 11 (3) Label the tick with the date of removal and the name
- of the student.
- 13 (4) Notify the parent or guardian of the student, by
- 14 telephone or e-mail and by letter addressed to the parent or
- 15 quardian that is delivered by the student, on the same day
- the tick is discovered. The notice shall include the
- 17 following:
- 18 (i) The student's name.
- 19 (ii) The date of tick removal.
- 20 (iii) A statement that:
- 21 (A) The school is holding the tick for seven
- days and the parent or guardian may pick up the tick
- for testing for Lyme disease or other tick-borne
- diseases.
- 25 (B) A list of options for tick testing in this
- 26 Commonwealth is available through the department's
- 27 publicly accessible Internet website.
- 28 (b) Tick removal. -- When removing a tick, a school nurse or
- 29 school physician shall act in accordance with guidelines issued
- 30 by the department.

- 1 (c) Unavailability of school nurse and school physician. -- If
- 2 a tick is discovered by an employee of a school entity and a
- 3 school nurse or school physician is not available, the school
- 4 entity shall immediately notify the parent or guardian of the
- 5 student.
- 6 Section 5. Duties of department.
- 7 (a) Guidelines. -- The department shall publish guidelines
- 8 consistent with section 4 on the department's publicly
- 9 accessible Internet website and, in consultation with the
- 10 Department of Education, provide the guidelines to school
- 11 entities.
- 12 (b) Tick testing options. -- The department shall provide on
- 13 its publicly accessible Internet website a list of facilities in
- 14 this Commonwealth where tick testing is available and contact
- 15 information for the facilities.
- 16 Section 6. Regulations.
- 17 The department and the Department of Education shall
- 18 promulgate regulations as necessary to carry out the provisions
- 19 of this act.
- 20 Section 7. Effective date.
- 21 This act shall take effect in 60 days.
