A RESOLUTION

- 1 Recognizing the week of April 19 through 25, 2015, as "Shaken Baby Syndrome Awareness Week" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, The well-being of this generation and future
- 4 generations depends in great measure upon the ability and
- 5 dedication of those who devote themselves to make the safety,
- 6 welfare and well-being of our precious children their highest
- 7 priority; and
- 8 WHEREAS, In 2012, statistics show that 680,000 children were
- 9 victims of abuse and neglect in the United States and according
- 10 to the Department of Human Services this number includes 3,565
- 11 children in this Commonwealth; and
- 12 WHEREAS, On average, between four and seven children will die
- 13 every day as the result of abuse or neglect in the United
- 14 States; and
- 15 WHEREAS, The leading cause of death and disability among

- 1 abused children under five years of age is infant abusive head
- 2 trauma, including the inflicted trauma known as shaken baby
- 3 syndrome; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Shaken baby syndrome is one of the most severe forms
- 5 of child abuse caused by the violent shaking of an infant with
- 6 or without impact against an object; and
- 7 WHEREAS, Shaken baby syndrome and other inflicted head
- 8 traumas occur when a caregiver loses control and shakes a baby
- 9 or young child, most frequently less than one year of age, but
- 10 in some cases as old as five years of age, resulting in
- 11 blindness, broken bones, cerebral palsy, brain damage, hearing
- 12 loss, paralysis, seizures, mental retardation, speech or
- 13 learning difficulties and death; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Such abuse causes unspeakable pain and suffering to
- 15 our most vulnerable residents, while putting enormous strain on
- 16 families in all communities; and
- WHEREAS, On average across the United States, 750 to 3,750
- 18 infants and young children are diagnosed with shaken baby
- 19 syndrome every year, with medical experts believing that
- 20 thousands of additional cases are misdiagnosed or undetected;
- 21 and
- 22 WHEREAS, Approximately one-third of the victims die as a
- 23 result of direct brain injuries; and
- 24 WHEREAS, Even in milder cases in which babies look normal
- 25 immediately after the shaking, the child may eventually develop
- 26 irreversible damage due to the child's injuries; and
- 27 WHEREAS, The most effective way to end shaken baby syndrome
- 28 is by preventing such abuse and it is clear that minimal costs
- 29 of educational and preventive programs may avert enormous
- 30 medical and disability costs and immeasurable grief for many

- 1 families; and
- 2 WHEREAS, Hospital-based education programs, such as the
- 3 nationally recognized Shaken Baby Syndrome Prevention &
- 4 Awareness Program developed by Dr. Mark Dias of the Penn State
- 5 Hershey Medical Center, provide critically important information
- 6 about shaken baby syndrome to every parent of every child born
- 7 in this Commonwealth; and
- 8 WHEREAS, In 2002, the Shaken Baby Syndrome Education Act was
- 9 enacted, establishing the Shaken Baby Syndrome Education and
- 10 Prevention Program; and
- 11 WHEREAS, The Shaken Baby Syndrome Education and Prevention
- 12 Program partnered with the Department of Health, and in 2006,
- 13 Pennsylvania became the first state in the nation to provide
- 14 consistent hospital-based education in 100% of all birthing and
- 15 children's hospitals in this Commonwealth; and
- 16 WHEREAS, Prevention and awareness efforts are supported by
- 17 national and local organizations, such as the Department of
- 18 Health, the Brain Injury Association of Pennsylvania, the
- 19 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the American Academy
- 20 of Pediatrics, Prevent Child Abuse Pennsylvania, the Cynthia
- 21 Gibbs Foundation, the Skipper Initiative, the National Center on
- 22 Shaken Baby Syndrome, the Children's Defense Fund, the Child
- 23 Welfare League, the Shaken Baby Alliance and the Pennsylvania
- 24 Family Support Alliance, that all work to educate new parents
- 25 and caregivers and increase awareness among the general public
- 26 to encourage increased support for victims and their families in
- 27 the health care and criminal justice systems; and
- 28 WHEREAS, Prevention and awareness has been shown to provide
- 29 critically important information about shaken baby syndrome to
- 30 parents, caregivers, day-care workers, child protection

- 1 employees, law enforcement personnel, health care professionals,
- 2 the general public and representatives of the justice system;
- 3 therefore be it
- 4 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the
- 5 week of April 19 through 25, 2015, as "Shaken Baby Syndrome
- 6 Awareness Week" in Pennsylvania and encourage all residents to
- 7 observe this week with programs and activities that share the
- 8 commitment of prevention, awareness, community support and
- 9 partnerships to protect our children from shaken baby syndrome;
- 10 and be it further
- 11 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives commend those
- 12 advocates, organizations and agencies of national, State, county
- 13 and local governments that work continuously to educate parents,
- 14 caregivers and professionals about the causes, consequences and
- 15 prevention of shaken baby syndrome and other inflicted head
- 16 injuries.
