A RESOLUTION

1 2	Urging the President and Congress of the United States to direct additional humanitarian aid to Haiti.
3	WHEREAS, Haiti, a Caribbean nation of 12 million people,
4	became the world's first independent, Black-led republic and the
5	first independent Caribbean state when the organized revolt of
6	formerly enslaved Haitians and others conquered the French and
7	abolished slavery in the early 1800s; and
8	WHEREAS, Haiti was originally a French colony known as Saint-
9	Domingue until in 1791 where, inspired by the French Revolution
10	and American Revolution, enslaved Haitians staged the world's
11	largest and most successful slave revolt, eventually declaring
12	independence from France; and
13	WHEREAS, Haiti's unique culture and traditions have made
14	important impacts on the world through its innovative
15	literature, art, music and dance as well as its distinctive
16	cuisine, architecture, festivities and history; and
17	WHEREAS, Many renowned Haitians and individuals of Haitian

descent have accomplished impressive personal achievements such 1 2 as the Harvard President Claudine Gay, acclaimed rapper and 3 philanthropist Wyclef Jean, prolific artist Jean-Michel Basquiat, four-time Grand Slam singles tennis champion Naomi 4 5 Osaka, White House Press Secretary Karine Jean-Pierre, sociologist, civil rights activist and author W.E.B. Du Bois, 6 writer, musician and intellectual Frankétienne, author Dany 7 Laferriere, former Philadelphia 76er Samuel Dalembert, former 8 9 Philadelphia Eagle Max Jean-Gilles and former Pittsburgh Penguin 10 Georges Laraque; and

11 WHEREAS, Haiti is undergoing a severe humanitarian crisis due 12 to political instability, food insecurity, widespread violence 13 and illness; and

14 WHEREAS, Currently, Haiti has no democratically elected 15 officials as the country's two parliamentary bodies have not 16 filled any seats since its 10 remaining senators left office; 17 and

18 WHEREAS, Haiti's de facto leader, Prime Minister Ariel Henry, 19 was never officially sworn in, and the country has not had a 20 President since its last, Jovenel Moïse, was assassinated in 21 2021; and

22 WHEREAS, Haiti is facing rampant gang violence, which has 23 displaced more than 150,000 people and forced organizations, 24 such as Doctors Without Borders, to close facilities and 25 relocate staff; and

26 WHEREAS, Haiti's underfunded police officers are unable to 27 combat this violence, and nearly two dozen officers have been 28 killed in 2023; and

29 WHEREAS, A cholera outbreak is estimated to have infected 30 25,000 Haitians since late 2022, and the nation's struggling

1 health care system is unable to serve most people; and

2 WHEREAS, Inflation has sent the price of food and gas in 3 Haiti spiraling; and

4 WHEREAS, Approximately 40% of Haiti's population is facing5 food insecurity; and

6 WHEREAS, Natural disasters, such as hurricanes and 7 earthquakes, have historically devastated the nation, and the 8 most recent natural disasters have kept thousands of schools in 9 Haiti closed; and

10 WHEREAS, Population data indicates that Philadelphia is among 11 the top locations for Haitian immigrants in the United States; 12 and

WHEREAS, Foreign policy decisions by France, the United States and other nations towards Haiti, including crippling trade and military policies, have often been detrimental to the health, safety, democracy and overall prosperity of the nation since Haiti's founding in 1804; and

18 WHEREAS, An influx of firearms has been illegally trafficked over the past few years from Florida to Haiti, which has 19 20 worsened the gang violence occurring in the nation; and 21 WHEREAS, The United States policy toward Haiti under the Biden administration is intended to foster foundational 22 23 institutions and infrastructure necessary for democracy and 24 poverty reduction through sustainable development; and 25 WHEREAS, Both the United States and Haiti benefit when this 26 close neighbor is more prosperous, secure and rooted in democracy, which are the mutual goals of both nations; and 27

28 WHEREAS, With the dire situation in Haiti worsening on 29 several fronts, the help of the United States has never been 30 more critical; therefore be it

1 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 2 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania urge the President and Congress of 3 the United States to direct additional humanitarian aid to Haiti 4 and, with Haitians, the Haitian diaspora and national and 5 international stakeholders and partners, lead a diplomatic 6 solution to the crisis; and be it further 7 RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to

8 the President of the United States and to each member of

9 Congress from Pennsylvania.
