A RESOLUTION

Urging the Governor, Senate, Judiciary and interested stakeholders through the State, counties and local 2 governments to join with the House of Representatives to form 3 a "Justice Reinvestment Initiative III" Working Group in 4 Pennsylvania. 5 6 WHEREAS, The General Assembly recently enacted two pieces of 7 criminal justice legislation focused on targeted system improvements designed to reduce recidivism while lowering costs 8 to taxpayers and enhancing compensation to crime victims; and 10 WHEREAS, Together, these reforms are expected to save \$48 11 million in State corrections spending by 2023; and 12 WHEREAS, These policy changes were the result of our Commonwealth's ongoing participation in the Justice Reinvestment 13 14 Initiative (JRI); and WHEREAS, JRI is a data-driven approach meant to improve 15 16 public safety, examine corrections and related criminal justice 17 spending, manage and allocate criminal justice populations in a more cost-effective manner, and to reinvest savings in 18

strategies that can hold offenders accountable, decrease crime,

- 1 and strengthen neighborhoods; and
- 2 WHEREAS, JRI operates as a public-private partnership between
- 3 participating states, the United States Department of Justice
- 4 Bureau of Justice Assistance, the Council of State Governments
- 5 (CSG) Justice Center and The Pew Charitable Trusts; and
- 6 WHEREAS, States participating in JRI receive intensive
- 7 technical assistance to analyze the factors driving correctional
- 8 populations and costs-information that helps each state identify
- 9 its own set of customized solutions to reduce recidivism and
- 10 improve return on investment; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Pennsylvania launched its first effort at criminal
- 12 justice reform using a JRI approach in 2012 when the
- 13 Pennsylvania Justice Reinvestment Working Group, which included
- 14 officials from all three branches of State government, counties
- 15 and localities, as well as stakeholders in the criminal justice
- 16 field-worked to review Pennsylvania data and develop policy
- 17 options to improve our communities; and
- 18 WHEREAS, The final report of the JRI I Task Force was adopted
- 19 in May 2012 and targeted four main areas for improvement,
- 20 including: training and equipment for law enforcement; expanding
- 21 local resources to counties that maximize probation and other
- 22 options instead of state prison, including alternative
- 23 sentences, improving efficiencies in the parole process and
- 24 increasing accountability of and improving the use of community
- 25 correction centers in Pennsylvania; and
- 26 WHEREAS, Act 122 of 2012 and Act 196 of 2012 subsequently
- 27 were enacted to implement these recommendations and redirect
- 28 savings to be reinvested in supporting victims' services, local
- 29 law enforcement, county probation and parole and other programs
- 30 and services; and

- 1 WHEREAS, In 2015, the Commonwealth embarked on a second round
- 2 of JRI to build on prior efforts and address new challenges
- 3 related to costs, supervision and recidivism; and
- 4 WHEREAS, A JRI II working group soon convened, again
- 5 partnering with CSG Justice Center staff, to analyze
- 6 Pennsylvania's criminal justice data and develop strategies
- 7 based on that data with an overarching goal of developing and
- 8 implementing policies and programs to avert the growth of the
- 9 Commonwealth's prison population while investing in county
- 10 probation supervision, victim compensation and evidence-based
- 11 programs shown to reduce recidivism rates; and
- 12 WHEREAS, In December 2019, JRI II culminated in the enactment
- 13 of Acts 114 and 115 of 2019, which address the high cost of
- 14 incarceration in the state, strengthen support for county
- 15 probation programs, fix inadequate sentencing guidelines and
- 16 reform the post-trial criminal justice system to ensure work
- 17 towards rehabilitation of individuals and preparation to reenter
- 18 society, rather than creating further risks for recidivism; and
- 19 WHEREAS, Despite the successes of JRI I and JRI II in
- 20 Pennsylvania, there are still more areas of the criminal justice
- 21 system that were identified in those initiatives for bipartisan,
- 22 data-driven improvement; and
- 23 WHEREAS, Notably, JRI II included a recommendation that the
- 24 state form a multi-branch task force dedicated to review
- 25 pretrial practices; and
- 26 WHEREAS, This recommendation acknowledged that accelerating
- 27 and improving pretrial practices could simultaneously reduce
- 28 county jail populations held pretrial, thus reducing county
- 29 costs, while enhancing public safety by quickly connecting
- 30 arrestees with programming that can address underlying

- 1 criminogenic behavior; and
- 2 WHEREAS, There is further work that can be done to improve
- 3 Pennsylvania's criminal justice system to enhance public safety
- 4 and improve outcomes for those who are drawn into the system;
- 5 therefore be it
- 6 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urges the
- 7 Governor, the Senate, the Judiciary and interested stakeholders
- 8 throughout State, county and local governments to join with the
- 9 House of Representatives to form a "Justice Reinvestment
- 10 Initiative III" Working Group in Pennsylvania; and be it further
- 11 RESOLVED, That this JRI III Working Group shall be dedicated
- 12 to analyzing and recommending concrete policy options to improve
- 13 pretrial criminal practices to reduce recidivism, lower costs to
- 14 taxpayers and enhance public safety.
