A RESOLUTION

Directing the Joint State Government Commission to conduct a 2 comprehensive study on long-term care facilities in this Commonwealth and issue a report of its findings and 3 recommendations to the General Assembly. 4 5 WHEREAS, More than 80,000 Pennsylvanians live in more than 700 long-term care facilities throughout this Commonwealth; and 6 7 WHEREAS, Long-term care facilities provide 24-hour skilled nursing care to residents who require assistance or supervision 9 to complete daily activities and cannot live in their homes; and 10 WHEREAS, While the Department of Health licenses and conducts annual surveys of these facilities and handles complaints from 11 12 residents and families, there exists a disparity in the level of 13 care provided in facilities across this Commonwealth; and 14 WHEREAS, The Nursing Home Quality Improvement Task Force 15 within the Department of Health was established in 2015 to offer recommendations on enhancing care and improving the safety of 16 17 long-term care facilities and the quality of life of their

- 2 WHEREAS, Despite the findings of the Nursing Home Quality
- 3 Improvement Task Force, reports of inadequate and substandard
- 4 care persist; and
- 5 WHEREAS, An investigation published in November 2018 found
- 6 that care did not improve following a lawsuit against a chain of
- 7 long-term care facilities in this Commonwealth and the promise
- 8 of increased oversight from regulators; and
- 9 WHEREAS, As Pennsylvania's population ages, there is a need
- 10 for a better process to address deficiencies in long-term care
- 11 and a greater focus on person-centered care; therefore be it
- 12 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives direct the Joint
- 13 State Government Commission to conduct a comprehensive study on
- 14 long-term care facilities in this Commonwealth and issue a
- 15 report of its findings and recommendations to the General
- 16 Assembly; and be it further
- 17 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission offer
- 18 legislative and regulatory recommendations to improve the care
- 19 provided to residents in long-term care facilities; and be it
- 20 further
- 21 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission study
- 22 how the following impact the care provided to, and quality of
- 23 life for, residents in long-term care facilities:
- 24 (1) nurse staffing competency and mix, staffing
- 25 requirements and ratios;
- 26 (2) person-centered care and culture change;
- 27 (3) the Department of Health survey process, including
- the training, continuing education and retention of
- 29 surveyors;
- 30 (4) recruitment and retention of long-term care leaders,

- including administrators and directors;
- 2 (5) Medicaid reimbursement rates and the amount of money
- 3 received from the Federal and State governments;
- 4 (6) value-based reimbursement which rewards facilities
- 5 that improve quality control, person-centered care and other
- 6 processes as measured by the Department of Health; and
- 7 (7) the role of the Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program in
- 8 Pennsylvania;
- 9 and be it further
- 10 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission accept
- 11 and review oral or written comments, documents and other
- 12 information from persons seeking to provide input regarding the
- 13 study on long-term care facilities; and be it further
- 14 RESOLVED, That, for the purposes of the study, the Joint
- 15 State Government Commission solicit input from representatives
- 16 of all aspects of care in long-term care facilities, including,
- 17 but not limited to, the following:
- 18 (1) the Department of Aging;
- 19 (2) the Department of Health;
- 20 (3) the Department of Human Services;
- 21 (4) registered nurses, certified nursing assistants,
- licensed practical nurses and other long-term care staff; and
- 23 (5) the Pennsylvania Health Care Association and any
- 24 other private advocacy organizations;
- 25 and be it further
- 26 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission issue a
- 27 report of its findings, along with any statutory or regulatory
- 28 recommendations, to the General Assembly within one year of the
- 29 adoption of this resolution.
