A RESOLUTION

- 1 Urging the Department of Health to investigate each entity in 2 this Commonwealth with a permit to open and operate a medical
- 3 cannabis business to determine whether the entity has
- financial ties to Russian businesses and, if so, take steps
- 5 to revoke the permit.
- 6 WHEREAS, On February 24, 2022, the Russian Federation invaded
- 7 Ukraine; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Russian aggression against Ukraine stems back much
- 9 further than this invasion, including when Russia invaded, and
- 10 has since occupied, the Ukrainian territory of Crimea in 2014;
- 11 and
- 12 WHEREAS, As of May 1, 2022, the United Nations High
- 13 Commissioner for Refugees estimates that 5,563,959 Ukrainians
- 14 have been made refugees since the start of the war; and
- 15 WHEREAS, United States Secretary of State Antony J. Blinken
- 16 has stated that Russia has destroyed Ukrainian civilian housing,
- 17 schools, hospitals and shopping centers, many of which are
- 18 clearly identifiable as civilian infrastructure; and

- 1 WHEREAS, As of April 29, 2022, the United Nations Office of
- 2 the High Commissioner for Human Rights reports that 2,899
- 3 Ukrainian civilians are known to have been killed and 3,235
- 4 Ukrainian civilians are known to have been injured since the
- 5 Russian invasion; and
- 6 WHEREAS, The United Nations believes the number of civilian
- 7 casualties in Ukraine to be much higher than currently known due
- 8 to delays in reporting in heavy hostility areas; and
- 9 WHEREAS, In response to the invasion of Ukraine, the United
- 10 States and its allies have imposed a series of heavy sanctions
- 11 on the Russian Federation and closely related businesses and
- 12 people; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Pennsylvania and Ukraine have deep economic and
- 14 cultural ties; and
- 15 WHEREAS, Numerous Ukrainian businesses have made Pennsylvania
- 16 their home; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Pennsylvania is home to the second-highest number of
- 18 people with Ukrainian ancestry in the United States; and
- 19 WHEREAS, As stated by Governor Tom Wolf, Pennsylvania stands
- 20 with Ukraine and will take continuous action to support Ukraine
- 21 as it fights against the Russian invasion; and
- 22 WHEREAS, The medical cannabis industry in Pennsylvania
- 23 totaled more than \$500 million in sales in its first two years
- 24 in operation; and
- 25 WHEREAS, It is important that the revenue from medical
- 26 cannabis in Pennsylvania not benefit in any way those tied to
- 27 the Russian Federation and its war against Ukraine; and
- 28 WHEREAS, It is the responsibility of the Department of Health
- 29 to administer the Medical Marijuana Program, issue permits and
- 30 monitor and regulate the entities licensed to grow, process or

- 1 dispense medical cannabis under the act of April 17, 2016
- 2 (P.L.84, No.16), known as the Medical Marijuana Act; therefore
- 3 be it
- 4 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge the
- 5 Department of Health to investigate each entity in this
- 6 Commonwealth with a permit to open and operate a medical
- 7 cannabis business to determine whether the entity has financial
- 8 ties to Russian businesses, and, if so, take steps to revoke the
- 9 permit.
