## A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

- 1 Encouraging the Pennsylvania Supreme Court to make the
- investigation and disciplinary process of lawyers more
- 3 transparent.
- 4 WHEREAS, Section 10 of Article V of the Constitution of
- 5 Pennsylvania gives authority to regulate the practice of law and
- 6 lawyers to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania; and
- WHEREAS, By court order dated March 21, 1972, the Supreme
- 8 Court established the Disciplinary Board of the Supreme Court of
- 9 Pennsylvania to regulate attorney conduct; and
- 10 WHEREAS, The Disciplinary Board consists of 12 members who
- 11 are appointed by the Supreme Court; and
- 12 WHEREAS, The Disciplinary Board's mission is to protect the
- 13 public, maintain the integrity of the legal profession and
- 14 safeguard the reputation of the courts; and
- 15 WHEREAS, The Supreme Court established, through the Rules of
- 16 Professional Conduct, minimum ethical standards for the practice
- 17 of law that all attorneys must follow; and
- 18 WHEREAS, The Disciplinary Board is empowered to enforce and

- 1 investigate actions of lawyers for failure to abide by the Rules
- 2 of Professional Conduct; and
- 3 WHEREAS, The disciplinary process begins when a formal
- 4 complaint is filed with the Office of Disciplinary Counsel
- 5 (ODC), which initiate an investigation; and
- 6 WHEREAS, The ODC sends a notice of the complaint to the
- 7 respondent and requests a formal statement of the respondent's
- 8 position; and
- 9 WHEREAS, The ODC prepares a document which provides
- 10 justification and a recommended resolution which is provided to
- 11 a review hearing committee member; and
- 12 WHEREAS, The review hearing committee member reviews the
- 13 document and approves or modifies the ODC's recommendation or
- 14 directly dismisses the complaint; and
- 15 WHEREAS, If the initiation of formal charges is approved, the
- 16 ODC prepares a Petition for Discipline, which specifies the
- 17 charges of misconduct, and the respondent is given 20 days to
- 18 file a response; and
- 19 WHEREAS, A hearing is conducted in front of a three-member
- 20 hearing committee where the ODC presents evidence of the alleged
- 21 misconduct, the respondent presents any necessary defense and
- 22 briefs from both sides are filed; and
- 23 WHEREAS, The hearing committee issues a report and
- 24 recommendation, which includes findings of fact, conclusions of
- 25 law and a recommended disposition; and
- 26 WHEREAS, Either party may file a Brief of Exceptions to the
- 27 hearing committee's report with the Disciplinary Board and
- 28 request oral argument, which, if granted, is held before a panel
- 29 of three board members; and
- 30 WHEREAS, The Disciplinary Board adjudicates the matter either

- 1 by issuing an order concluding the matter through dismissal,
- 2 informal admonition, private reprimand or public reprimand; and
- 3 WHEREAS, The Disciplinary Board may also file the report with
- 4 the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania recommending probation, public
- 5 censure, suspension or disbarment; and
- 6 WHEREAS, If the report is filed with the Supreme Court,
- 7 either party may request oral argument and the Supreme Court
- 8 shall adjudicate the matter and issue an order; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Recent concerns have arisen regarding the level of
- 10 public transparency utilized by the Disciplinary Board
- 11 throughout its investigation and discipline of lawyers;
- 12 therefore be it
- 13 RESOLVED (the Senate concurring), That the General Assembly
- 14 encourage the Pennsylvania Supreme Court to make the
- 15 investigation and disciplinary process of lawyers more
- 16 transparent; and be it further
- 17 RESOLVED, That the General Assembly encourage the
- 18 Disciplinary Board of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania to
- 19 provide greater transparency when investigating, adjudicating
- 20 and disciplining lawyers.
