A RESOLUTION

1 2	Designating January 26, 2015, as "Kawasaki Disease Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania.
3	WHEREAS, Kawasaki Disease, also known as Kawasaki Syndrome,
4	is a serious childhood illness that primarily affects the blood
5	vessels of young children and infants; and
6	WHEREAS, Kawasaki Disease is the number one cause of acquired
7	heart disease in children worldwide; and
8	WHEREAS, On January 26, 1961, Dr. Tomisaku Kawasaki
9	discovered a pattern of symptoms that would later be named
10	Kawasaki Disease; and
11	WHEREAS, The first cases of Kawasaki Disease to be recognized
12	in the United States were in Hawaii in the early 1970s; and
13	WHEREAS, Kawasaki Disease is characterized by inflammation of
14	the blood vessels and coronary arteries throughout the body and
15	can lead to heart disease, aneurysms and other serious

1 consequences if left untreated; and

2 WHEREAS, Symptoms of Kawasaki Disease include a fever lasting 3 at least 5 days, red eyes, a rash across the body and swollen 4 hands, feet and lymph nodes; and

5 WHEREAS, As with most illnesses and diseases, timely 6 diagnosis and treatment is highly effective in preventing 7 further and more serious complications from Kawasaki Disease; 8 and

9 WHEREAS, Scientific studies have indicated that genetic 10 inheritance is an important risk factor of Kawasaki Disease; and 11 WHEREAS, Kawasaki Disease is most common in children one to 12 two years of age and is less common in children older than eight 13 years of age; and

14 WHEREAS, Kawasaki Disease is more prevalent in male children 15 than female children; and

16 WHEREAS, Approximately 75% of patients affected with Kawasaki 17 Disease are under five years of age and symptoms are normally 18 present in late winter and early spring; and

WHEREAS, It is estimated that more than 4,200 children in the United States are diagnosed with Kawasaki Disease each year; and WHEREAS, Lack of knowledge of Kawasaki Disease combined with symptoms that can disappear have hampered diagnosis and treatment efforts for those affected; and

24 WHEREAS, The growing prevalence of Kawasaki Disease and the 25 risk of severe, life-threatening consequences expose the need 26 for further education for the general public, parents and 27 healthcare professionals; and

28 WHEREAS, January 26, 2015, marks the 54th anniversary of the 29 discovery of Kawasaki Disease; therefore be it

30 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate January

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1 26, 2015, as "Kawasaki Disease Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania.
