A RESOLUTION

1 2	Recognizing June 14, 2015, as "National Flag Day" in Pennsylvania.
3	WHEREAS, On June 14, 2015, Americans will observe the 238th
4	anniversary of the flag of the United States of America; and
5	WHEREAS, This special day provides a time for the residents
6	of this Commonwealth to reflect on the rich history of our
7	nation's flag and its meaning to Americans and people around the
8	world; and
9	WHEREAS, The Boy Scouts of America are deeply committed to
10	preserving the American tradition of honoring "National Flag
11	Day"; and
12	WHEREAS, The Continental Congress adopted the Stars and

Stripes as the official flag of the United States on June 14,
1777; and

3 WHEREAS, Describing the new flag, the Congress wrote, "White signifies Purity and Innocence; Red, Hardiness and Valor; Blue 4 signifies Vigilance, Perseverance and Justice"; and 5 WHEREAS, Over time, the flag's design evolved to keep pace 6 7 with our nation's development and growth, but its meaning as a 8 symbol of democracy and freedom has remained constant; and 9 WHEREAS, Flag Day was first celebrated throughout the country 10 in 1877; and

11 WHEREAS, As so often happens in our communities, a caring 12 teacher encouraging students to develop a love for learning was 13 the person who sparked renewed interest in the flag; and 14 WHEREAS, Wisconsin school teacher B. J. Cigrand arranged for 15 his pupils in 1885 to observe the 108th anniversary of the 16 flag's official adoption; and

WHEREAS, In magazine and newspaper articles and public addresses in the following years, Cigrand promoted an official national celebration of June 14 as Flag Birthday or Flag Day; and

21 WHEREAS, Groups in Pennsylvania, New York and Illinois took 22 up the cause, and after three decades of state and local 23 celebrations, President Woodrow Wilson officially established 24 Flag Day by proclamation in 1916; and

25 WHEREAS, During World War II, Americans looked to the purity, 26 hardiness, valor, vigilance, perseverance and justice 27 represented by the flag as ideals worthy of the ultimate 28 sacrifice in order to defeat tyranny; and 29 WHEREAS, In celebration of the flag's powerful meaning to 30 Americans and its place in our culture and history, Flag Day

became a national observance by act of Congress in 1949 and 1 2 signed into law by President Harry Truman; and WHEREAS, On August 3, 1949, to commemorate the adoption of 3 the United States flag, Congress, by joint resolution, 4 designated June 14 of each year as Flag Day and requested the 5 president to issue an annual proclamation calling for a national 6 observance and for the display of the flag of the United States 7 8 on all Federal Government buildings; and 9 WHEREAS, In a second joint resolution approved June 9, 1966, 10 Congress requested the president to issue annually a proclamation designating the week during which June 14 falls as 11 "National Flag Week" and called upon all citizens of the United 12 13 States to display the flag during that week; therefore be it 14 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize June 14, 2015, as "National Flag Day" in Pennsylvania. 15
