A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Urging the Congress of the United States to pass the Marketplace Fairness Act during the first session of the 115th Congress to assist state and local governments in the collection of 2 3 revenues due to local governments that are essential to local 4 and regional economic expansion. 5 6 WHEREAS, Many state and local governments rely on the 7 collection of sales and use taxes to support funding to improve needed infrastructure improvements, strengthen local small 8 businesses, create jobs for their residents and fund essential 10 services; and WHEREAS, Local small businesses confront expanded competition 11 12 from the explosion of Internet sales by remote sellers who are 13 unwilling to collect and remit properly assessed sales taxes to 14 state and local governments; and 15 WHEREAS, National studies reveal that state and local 16 governments lose more than \$11 billion each year from uncollected sales taxes from transactions involving remote 17 Internet retailers; and 18

WHEREAS, State and local associations, including the

- 2 Cities, the National Association of Counties, the United States
- 3 Conference of Mayors and the National Governors Association,
- 4 along with partners in the retail community, worked together for
- 5 years to develop a fair and easy system to collect and remit
- 6 these sales taxes, structuring a system of collection based on
- 7 the purchaser's location; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Through this collaborative effort, an effective and
- 9 efficient response in eliminating the competitive disadvantage
- 10 faced by our local small business retailers appeared in 2013
- 11 when the United States Senate passed the Marketplace Fairness
- 12 Act through a bipartisan effort, which would have established a
- 13 fair system for the collection of existing taxes owed to state
- 14 and local governments; and
- 15 WHEREAS, The Marketplace Fairness Act has been stalled
- 16 through inaction by the United States House of Representatives
- 17 and the Committee on the Judiciary of the United States House of
- 18 Representatives, chaired by the Honorable Bob Goodlatte, for
- 19 more than three years; and
- 20 WHEREAS, Time has long passed for continued and inexplicable
- 21 inaction, and 2017 presents the opportunity for the new Congress
- 22 to demonstrate political courage and break the unwarranted and
- 23 unjustified stalemate by moving the Marketplace Fairness Act
- 24 from the Committee on the Judiciary of the United States House
- 25 of Representatives to a vote on the floor of the House of
- 26 Representatives during the first session of the 115th Congress;
- 27 therefore be it
- 28 RESOLVED (the Senate concurring), That the General Assembly
- 29 of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania urge Speaker of the United
- 30 States House of Representatives Paul Ryan, Chairman Bob

- 1 Goodlatte and members of the Committee on the Judiciary of the
- 2 United States House of Representatives to move the Marketplace
- 3 Fairness Act out of the Committee on the Judiciary with a
- 4 recommendation for passage by the United States House of
- 5 Representatives; and be it further
- 6 RESOLVED, That the General Assembly urge the Congress of the
- 7 United States to pass the Marketplace Fairness Act during the
- 8 first session of the 115th Congress and send the clear and
- 9 unequivocal message to states and localities that the Congress
- 10 of the United States supports owners of small businesses who
- 11 create jobs, produce revenues to support essential
- 12 infrastructure improvements and create a stronger and more
- 13 resilient economy for the benefit of all Americans; and be it
- 14 further
- RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to
- 16 The Honorable Paul Ryan, Speaker of the United States House of
- 17 Representatives; The Honorable Bob Goodlatte, Chairman of the
- 18 Committee on the Judiciary of the United States House of
- 19 Representatives; the presiding officers of each house of
- 20 Congress; and each member of Congress from Pennsylvania.
