A RESOLUTION

1 2	Recognizing gun violence in Pennsylvania as a public health crisis.
3	WHEREAS, Gun violence is a public health crisis that demands
4	a comprehensive response as more than 1,500 residents of this
5	Commonwealth die by a firearm every year and 76% of all
6	homicides in this Commonwealth are carried out with a firearm;
7	and
8	WHEREAS, As of 2018, more residents of this Commonwealth died
9	by firearms than in car accidents, and while the number of
10	deaths in car accidents continues to decline because of safety
11	regulations and public outreach, firearms deaths have increased;
12	and
13	WHEREAS, Firearm violence increased by more than 25% in 2020
14	in Philadelphia; and
15	WHEREAS, Children under 15 years of age in the United States
16	are 12 times more likely to be killed by a gun than children in
17	other industrialized countries and exposure to gun violence can

1 have a lasting traumatic effect on children; and

2 WHEREAS, Sixty-two percent of firearm deaths in this3 Commonwealth are suicides; and

WHEREAS, Suicides are largely impulsive and preventable,
since 71% of individuals who attempt suicide decided to do so
within an hour of making the decision; and

7 WHEREAS, Beyond the human toll and loss of life, gun violence 8 costs the Commonwealth \$8.5 billion every year in health care, 9 lost income and other expenses; and

10 WHEREAS, The same public health approach can be taken with 11 gun violence as the public health approach taken in numerous 12 other areas to promote safety, including vehicle safety and 13 accident prevention and smoking prevention and adverse health 14 impact awareness; and

15 WHEREAS, The American Medical Association has recognized gun 16 violence as a public health crisis and has called on state 17 governments to enact gun safety legislation; and 18 WHEREAS, Gun violence kills and injures thousands of 19 residents of this Commonwealth every year and has a lasting effect on the loved ones of victims who suffer with 20 psychological effects, including high rates of PTSD and 21 22 substance abuse; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the epidemic of gun violence is a public health crisis that requires a comprehensive and urgent public health response to reduce the number of firearm-related incidents.
