A RESOLUTION

Directing the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee to conduct a study and make recommendations on non-academic barriers students face getting accepted into career and 3 technical education programs and identifying the barriers. 4 5 WHEREAS, Career and technical education is any form of 6 secondary education, given in school or elsewhere, the purpose of which is to fit an individual to pursue effectively a recognized profitable employment, whether pursued for wages or 8 otherwise; and 9 10 WHEREAS, Career and technical education is placed into 11 categories which may include industrial, agricultural, family 12 and consumer science, technical marketing and distributive 13 occupational, business and computer and information technology; 14 and 15 WHEREAS, It is the duty of the Secretary of Education to 16 report the number of approved programs, students enrolled, 17 secondary students enrolled in participating school districts, scheduling patterns, including grades in which programs are 18 offered, and number of hours of instruction per year for each

- 2 WHEREAS, Any school district may establish a career and
- 3 technical school or department and two or more districts may
- 4 establish a joint career and technical school or department; and
- 5 WHEREAS, There are more than 80 career and technical centers,
- 6 plus high school-based programs teaching career and technical
- 7 education to students; and
- 8 WHEREAS, While there is not a one-size-fits-all pathway for
- 9 high school graduates, this Commonwealth has seen a 39% increase
- 10 in career and technical education students since 2015; and
- 11 WHEREAS, There are more than 68,000 students enrolled in
- 12 career and technical education programs, 28% of whom are special
- 13 education students; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Career and technical education in this Commonwealth
- 15 develops critical skills necessary to meet the needs of the
- 16 economy, and workforce development depends on career and
- 17 technical education, pre-apprenticeships, apprenticeships and
- 18 schools-to-work programs; and
- 19 WHEREAS, This Commonwealth is contributing just 9% of career
- 20 and technical education funding and local school districts are
- 21 providing 88%; and
- 22 WHEREAS, The Pennsylvania Association of Career and Technical
- 23 Administrators recently advised the Basic Education Funding
- 24 Commission that the current State funding model does not provide
- 25 schools with the resources needed to expand or update their
- 26 programs, which has resulted in thousands of students each
- 27 school year being turned away due to capacity, poor facilities
- 28 or staffing shortages; therefore be it
- 29 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives direct the
- 30 Legislative Budget and Finance Committee to conduct a study,

- 1 issue a report and make recommendations on the current barriers
- 2 to students being accepted into career and technical education
- 3 programs and schools; and be it further
- 4 RESOLVED, That the report include:
- 5 (1) the number of students placed on wait lists or 6 turned away due to capacity or condition of facilities or 7 staffing, per area of study;
- 8 (2) the number of students without access to career and 9 technical education programming due to a lack of program 10 availability in their home district;
 - (3) the number of students placed on wait lists or turned away due to capacity or condition of facilities or staffing, per career and technical center and high schoolbased program;
- 15 (4) the career and technical areas of study offered at
 16 each career and technical center and high school-based
 17 programs with wait lists or that have turned away students
 18 due to capacity or condition of facilities or staffing;
 - (5) an analysis of the career and technical subsidy formula and the impact of that formula on districts; and
- 21 (6) an evaluation of how other states handle career and 22 technical instructor credentialing to address the current 23 educator workforce shortages;
- 24 and be it further

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- 25 RESOLVED, That the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee
- 26 provide a report of its findings and recommendations in the
- 27 study to the House of Representatives no later than 120 days
- 28 after the adoption of this resolution.
