## A RESOLUTION

- Directing the Joint State Government Commission to conduct a 1 comprehensive study of school discipline policies, laws and 2 regulations, to establish an advisory committee and to make a report of its findings and recommendations. 4 5 WHEREAS, 22 Pa. Code § 12.3 authorizes each board of school 6 directors to make reasonable and necessary rules governing the 7 conduct of students in school and requires each board of school directors to adopt a code of student conduct that includes 8 policies governing student discipline; and 10 WHEREAS, Section 1302.1-A of the Public School Code of 1949 required the State Board of Education to promulgate regulations 11 setting forth a model memorandum of understanding between school 12 13 entities and local police departments and establishing protocols for notifying police when certain offenses occur on school 14 15 property and for emergency and nonemergency response by the police, as well as procedures and protocols for the response to 16
- 18 WHEREAS, Section 1303-A of the Public School Code of 1949

and handling of students with disabilities; and

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- 1 requires the chief school administrator of each school entity,
- 2 in consultation with an advisory committee, to enter into a
- 3 memorandum of understanding with police departments having
- 4 jurisdiction over school property which complies with the
- 5 regulations promulgated by the State Board of Education under
- 6 section 1302.1-A of the Public School Code of 1949; and
- 7 WHEREAS, Some school districts have adopted zero-tolerance
- 8 policies which mandate specific disciplinary responses to
- 9 certain student misconduct, regardless of the circumstances
- 10 surrounding the misconduct or the severity of the incident; and
- 11 WHEREAS, It is important to ensure that the Commonwealth's
- 12 school safety laws and regulations support a safe school
- 13 environment while encouraging public schools to appropriately
- 14 tailor disciplinary responses to the specific student misconduct
- 15 or the severity of the incident; and
- 16 WHEREAS, It is important that the student discipline policies
- 17 in effect in public schools throughout this Commonwealth, as
- 18 well as related school safety laws and regulations, be
- 19 thoroughly examined; therefore be it
- 20 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives direct the Joint
- 21 State Government Commission, in consultation with an advisory
- 22 committee, to conduct a comprehensive study of school discipline
- 23 policies, laws and regulations across this Commonwealth and
- 24 nationwide; and be it further
- 25 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives direct the Joint
- 26 State Government Commission to establish an advisory committee
- 27 consisting of a police chief, a juvenile public defender, a
- 28 district attorney, a rural school superintendent, a suburban
- 29 school superintendent, an urban school superintendent, a school
- 30 board member, an individual representing the interests of

- 1 juveniles and of students with disabilities, a representative of
- 2 the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission, a representative of the
- 3 Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Committee of the
- 4 Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency, a
- 5 representative of the Pennsylvania Department of Education and a
- 6 representative of the Pennsylvania State Board of Education; and
- 7 be it further
- 8 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission and
- 9 advisory committee hold public hearings as deemed necessary to
- 10 conduct the comprehensive study required under this resolution;
- 11 and be it further
- 12 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission and
- 13 advisory committee, within six months of the adoption of this
- 14 resolution, issue to the Education Committee of the House of
- 15 Representatives a report which includes, at a minimum, the
- 16 following:
- 17 (1) a general description of the types of school
- 18 discipline policies in place in public schools throughout
- 19 this Commonwealth with specific attention to zero-tolerance
- 20 policies, and analysis of the prevalence of each type of
- 21 policy and its effects on students, including students with
- 22 disabilities and students who are under 12 years of age;
- 23 (2) a general description of the types of memoranda of
- 24 understanding between school entities and police departments
- in place throughout this Commonwealth, including a general
- 26 description of the types of protocols for immediate and
- discretionary notification of police departments set forth in
- those memoranda of understanding, and an analysis of those
- 29 types of memoranda of understanding which provide for
- immediate notification of police departments with respect to

offenses in addition to those requiring immediate notification under applicable law; and

- (3) an analysis of laws and regulations related to student discipline in this Commonwealth and other states, including discussion of whether any states have in place laws or regulations addressing zero-tolerance policies;
- (4) a study of alternative school discipline approaches at the elementary and secondary education levels, including diversion programs and possible alternatives to suspension, expulsion and referral to law enforcement; and
- 11 (5) recommendations for new legislation, regulations and 12 policies related to school discipline.

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
