A RESOLUTION

Urging the United States Secretary of Homeland Security to reconsider the resettlement of Syrian refugees in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania until such time as systems are 3 in place to thoroughly conduct security and background checks on Syrian refugees and to send a report detailing the increased measures to the states that are under consideration 6 7 to receive Syrian refugees. WHEREAS, In order to address the migrant crisis in Syria, the 8 Federal Government has indicated that the United States will 10 accept at least 10,000 Syrian refugees during fiscal year 2016; 11 and 12 WHEREAS, The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has an abundant and successful history of embracing immigrants; and 13 14 WHEREAS, The most important responsibility of government is 15 to protect the safety and security of the residents of the 16 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania; and WHEREAS, On November 13, 2015, coordinated terror attacks 17

18 were carried out in Paris, France, killing at least 129 people

- and injuring more than 350 people; and 1
- 2 WHEREAS, On November 14, 2015, the Islamic State (ISIS), a
- 3 deadly terrorist organization based in Ragga, Syria, claimed
- responsibility for the attacks and pledged further attacks 4
- worldwide; and 5
- WHEREAS, According to the French police, a Syrian passport 6
- 7 belonging to a Syrian asylum seeker who entered Europe through
- 8 Greece was found near the body of one suicide bomber; and
- 9 WHEREAS, This raises concerns that the security vetting
- 10 procedures used in addressing the Syrian migrant crisis are
- 11 inadequate; and
- WHEREAS, On February 11, 2015, Francis X. Taylor, Under 12
- 13 Secretary for Intelligence and Analysis for the United States
- Department of Homeland Security, stated, "We are concerned about 14
- any group of people coming to the United States who may be 15
- coming to the United States for nefarious purposes"; and 16
- 17 WHEREAS, Under Secretary Taylor further testified that
- 18 officials "want to make sure that if we are asked to vet
- 19 individuals from any part of the world to come to the United
- States, that we have applied the most rigorous screening that's 20
- available within the U.S. government"; and 21
- 22 WHEREAS, On February 11, 2015, Nicholas J. Rasmussen,
- 23 Director of the National Counterterrorism Center, testified in
- 24 front of the United States House of Representatives' Committee
- 25 on Homeland Security that Syrian refugees are:
- 26 clearly a population of concern and, as Under Secretary 27
- Taylor said, what we want to be able to do is apply the
- 28 full weight of U.S. intelligence community holdings to
- 29 the vetting and screening process so that we can unearth
- 30 any information that we may have in our holdings that
- 31 gives us concern about particular individuals;

- 1 WHEREAS, On February 11, 2015, Michael B. Steinbach,
- 2 Assistant Director, Counterterrorism Division, Federal Bureau of
- 3 Investigation, testified in front of the United States House of
- 4 Representatives' Committee on Homeland Security that:
- You have to have information to vet, so the concern in Syria is that we don't have systems in place on the ground to collect the information to vet. That would be

8 the concern we would be vetting--databases don't hold the

information on those individuals, and that is the

- 12 WHEREAS, Increased security measures are necessary following
- 13 the recent terror attacks in order to protect the security,
- 14 safety and basic freedoms of the residents of the Commonwealth
- 15 of Pennsylvania; therefore be it
- 16 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the
- 17 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania urge the United States Secretary of
- 18 Homeland Security to reconsider the resettlement of Syrian
- 19 refugees in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania until such time as
- 20 systems are in place to thoroughly conduct security and
- 21 background checks on Syrian refugees and to send a report
- 22 detailing the increased measures to the states that are under
- 23 consideration to receive Syrian refugees; and be it further
- 24 RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to
- 25 the United States Secretary of Homeland Security.
