INTRODUCED AS NONCONTROVERSIAL RESOLUTION UNDER RULE 35, MARCH 10, 2014

A RESOLUTION

Observing the month of March 2014 as "National Colorectal Cancer 1 Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania. 2 WHEREAS, According to the Prevent Cancer Foundation, 3 4 colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death among men and women in the United States; and 5 6 WHEREAS, In its Cancer Facts & Figures 2013 report, the American Cancer Society stated that in 2013 physicians diagnosed 7 142,820 new cases of colorectal cancer in the United States, 8 9 with the diagnoses affecting 73,680 men and 69,140 women 10 nationwide and 7,330 Pennsylvanians; and 11 WHEREAS, The Prevent Cancer Foundation found that in 2013 physicians diagnosed nearly 142,820 new cases of colorectal 12 13 cancer in the United States and that 50,830 people succumbed to

1 the disease; and

2 WHEREAS, According to the National Cancer Institute, if 3 everyone 50 years of age or older would have regular colorectal cancer screening tests, at least 60% of colorectal cancer deaths 4 could be prevented each year because of early detection and 5 treatment, including the removal of polyps, grape-like growths 6 7 on the wall of the intestine, before they become cancerous; and 8 WHEREAS, Prevention of colorectal cancer can be highly dependent on dietary factors, and adopting a healthy diet at a 9 10 young age can significantly reduce the risk of developing 11 colorectal cancer; and

12 WHEREAS, Since 1999, March has been designated as National 13 Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month by the Prevent Cancer 14 Foundation, the American Society for Gastrointestinal Endoscopy, 15 the National Colorectal Cancer Roundtable and the Foundation for 16 Digestive Health and Nutrition; and

WHEREAS, National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month aims to generate widespread awareness about colorectal cancer and to encourage people to learn more about how to prevent the disease through a healthy lifestyle and regular screenings, and education can help inform the public of methods of prevention and symptoms of early detection; and

23 WHEREAS, Colorectal cancer can almost always be cured if 24 detected in its early stages; and

25 WHEREAS, Regular screening tests detect colon polyps before 26 they become cancerous, save lives and reduce mortality by both 27 decreasing incidents and detecting a higher proportion of cancer 28 at early, more treatable stages; therefore be it

29 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives observe the month 30 of March 2014 as "National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month" in

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Pennsylvania and urge its residents to follow these actions to
 prevent colorectal cancer by:

3 (1) Being physically active for at least 30 minutes a
4 day, at least five days a week.

(2) Maintaining a healthy weight.

6 (3) Quitting smoking.

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7 (4) Having not more than one drink a day for women and
8 two drinks a day for men.

9 (5) Eating fruits, vegetables and whole grains to remain 10 healthy and fit.

11 (6) Reducing the intake of red meat and cutting out 12 processed meat.

13 (7) Beginning regular screening at 50 years of age for 14 colorectal cancer and earlier for those at higher risk. The 15 best time for a screening to occur is when a person has no 16 symptoms.

17 (8) Talking to a doctor about tests for cancer, such as 18 a colonoscopy, virtual colonoscopy, a flexible sigmoidoscopy, 19 a double-contrast barium enema, a stool occult blood test, a 20 stool immunochemical test and a stool DNA test;

RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge its members, the Department of Health and health care professionals across this Commonwealth to promote "National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania to increase awareness about the disease and how to prevent it through a healthy lifestyle and proper screenings.

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
