A RESOLUTION

1 Designating the month of April 2018 as "Sikh Awareness and  
2 Appreciation Month" in Pennsylvania.

3 WHEREAS, Sikhism is the world's fifth-largest religion, a  
4 monotheistic faith founded in the Punjab region of India  
5 approximately 500 years ago; and

6 WHEREAS, The Sikh religion is based on a belief in one God,  
7 universal equality and basic values of truth, nonviolence,  
8 tolerance and peace; and

9 WHEREAS, Most of the world's 25 million Sikhs live in India,  
10 but more than 500,000 make the United States their home; and

11 WHEREAS, In the 1970s, the Sikhs first entered Pennsylvania;  
12 and

13 WHEREAS, In April 1973, responding to the social and  
14 religious need of a growing population of followers of Hinduism  
15 and other Indic religions, the Sikhs purchased a seven-acre  
16 parcel of land in Monroeville, Pennsylvania, with plans for a

1 Hindu Temple; and

2 WHEREAS, In 1986, the name of the temple was changed from  
3 Hindu Temple to Hindu Jain Temple operated by the Hindu Temple  
4 Society of North America, Pittsburgh; and

5 WHEREAS, In September 1990, the construction work was  
6 completed on the gurdwara, a Sikh center of worship; and

7 WHEREAS, Hindu Jain Temple, the first unified Hindu Jain  
8 Temple in North America, is a unique example of understanding,  
9 tolerance and appreciation of diverse religious practices and  
10 traditions; and

11 WHEREAS, For children and generations to come, the gurdwara  
12 is a link to Sikh roots and a symbol of great Hindu heritage;  
13 and

14 WHEREAS, Pennsylvania's Sikh community endeavors to enhance  
15 understanding and respect among people of different religions by  
16 leading and participating in interfaith thanksgiving prayers at  
17 various places of worship and inviting various faith leaders and  
18 members of their congregations to gurdwaras; and

19 WHEREAS, Pennsylvania stands with the Sikh community in  
20 denouncing hate crimes directed toward any individual based on  
21 their religious beliefs; and

22 WHEREAS, Since September 11, 2001, Sikhs are often mistaken  
23 for Taliban members or followers of Al Qaeda because of the  
24 commonality of their beards and turbans, and are subjected to a  
25 disproportionately high rate of hate crimes; and

26 WHEREAS, The Sikh-American community continues to peacefully  
27 overcome attacks on its identity and practices, whether in the  
28 form of school harassment, employment discrimination or fatal  
29 shootings, including the 1984 Sikh Massacre where thousands of  
30 individuals were killed in India, the murders of six Sikhs

1 during the Oak Creek, Wisconsin, Sikh gurdwara shooting on  
2 August 5, 2012, and the shooting of a Sikh man that occurred in  
3 Kent, Washington, on March 3, 2017; and

4 WHEREAS, The faithful service of the Sikh-American community  
5 to this Commonwealth merits appreciation as an integral thread  
6 in the fabric of American plurality; and

7 WHEREAS, Our nation and this Commonwealth are enriched by the  
8 unparalleled diversity of our residents; therefore be it

9 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate the  
10 month of April 2018 as "Sikh Awareness and Appreciation Month"  
11 in Pennsylvania.
