AN ACT

Designating a bridge on that portion of Pennsylvania Route 100 over the Schuylkill River in Pottstown Borough, Montgomery 2 3 County, as the Newstell Marable, Sr., Memorial Bridge; designating the bridge on Stoughstown Road over Interstate 81 in Cumberland County (bridge number 21-3007-0020-0865) as the Private Raymond Lafayette Naugle Memorial Bridge; designating the bridge on Maple Avenue over the Yellow Breeches Creek in Walnut Bottom Township, Cumberland County (bridge number 21-3009-0012-0000), as the Sergeant Kenneth Lee "Buck" Devor Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge on that portion of U.S. 10 Route 219 South, over U.S. Route 22, also known as the 11 Admiral Peary Highway, in Cambria Township, Cambria County, 12 13 as the PFC Nick Kozorosky Memorial Bridge; DESIGNATING A <--BRIDGE ON THAT PORTION OF PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 286, KNOWN AS 14 WASHINGTON STREET, OVER THE KISKIMINETAS RIVER, BETWEEN 15 SALTSBURG BOROUGH, INDIANA COUNTY, AND LOYALHANNA TOWNSHIP, 16 WESTMORELAND COUNTY, AS THE FIRST SERGEANT ALEXANDER KELLY 17 MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING THE BRIDGE IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE 18 19 KEY 14196 LOCATED ON THAT PORTION OF PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 39, ALSO KNOWN AS LINGLESTOWN ROAD, OVER U.S. ROUTE 22 IN THE 20 CITY OF HARRISBURG, DAUPHIN COUNTY, AS THE SPECIALIST 4 21 22 REUBEN GARNETT, JR., MEMORIAL BRIDGE; designating a portion of Pennsylvania Route 54 in West Mahanoy Township, Schuylkill 23 County, as the Francis V. "Angie" McAndrew Memorial Highway; 2.4 and designating a portion of State Route 2026, in Upper 25 Moreland Township, Montgomery County, as the Corporal Michael 26 27 Dennis Cooke Memorial Highway -; DESIGNATING THE PORTION OF STATE ROUTE 192 FROM THE INTERSECTION WITH STATE ROUTE 477 IN 28 29 MILES TOWNSHIP, CENTRE COUNTY, TO THE INTERSECTION WITH STATE 30 ROUTE 144 IN CENTRE HALL BOROUGH, CENTRE COUNTY, AS THE CENTRAL PENNSYLVANIA VIETNAM VETERANS MEMORIAL HIGHWAY; 31 DESIGNATING THE BRIDGE IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 16385 ON THE 32 PORTION OF STATE ROUTE 4016, ALSO KNOWN AS WEST 38TH STREET, 33

BETWEEN SCHAPER AVENUE AND PITTSBURGH AVENUE OVER INTERSTATE 79 IN THE CITY OF ERIE AS THE MAJOR TOM CARR MEMORIAL BRIDGE; 2 DESIGNATING A PEDESTRIAN BRIDGE OVER THAT PORTION OF STATE 3 ROUTE 252, ALSO KNOWN AS PROVIDENCE ROAD, BETWEEN STACKHOUSE 4 LANE AND COPPLES LANE IN NETHER PROVIDENCE TOWNSHIP, DELAWARE 5 COUNTY, AS THE JACK HONTZ MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING THE 7 PORTION OF STATE ROUTE 3011, ALSO KNOWN AS 29TH STREET, BETWEEN MASTER STREET AND THOMPSON STREET, IN THE CITY OF 8 PHILADELPHIA, AS THE FRANK L. OLIVER MEMORIAL HIGHWAY; 9 DESIGNATING A BRIDGE ON THAT PORTION OF STATE ROUTE 4001, 10 ALSO KNOWN AS HENRY AVENUE, OVER THE WISSAHICKON CREEK AND 11 LINCOLN DRIVE IN FAIRMOUNT PARK, PHILADELPHIA COUNTY, AS THE 12 BRIGADIER GENERAL ANNA MAE V. MCCABE HAYS MEMORIAL BRIDGE; 13 DESIGNATING A PORTION OF STATE ROUTE 2050 IN MONTGOMERY 14 15 COUNTY AS THE FIRST LIEUTENANT GEOFFREY LAWRENCE HAM MEMORIAL HIGHWAY; DESIGNATING THE BRIDGE ON STATE ROUTE 641, ALSO 16 KNOWN AS EAST HIGH STREET, OVER THE LETORT SPRING IN CARLISLE 17 BOROUGH, CUMBERLAND COUNTY, AS THE LANCE CORPORAL EDWARD 18 RYKOSKEY MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE ON THAT 19 20 PORTION OF PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 405 OVER NORFOLK SOUTHERN RAILWAY TRACKS, WEST CHILLISOUAQUE TOWNSHIP, NORTHUMBERLAND 21 COUNTY, AS THE H. DONALD WHIPPLE MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING 22 A BRIDGE ON THAT PORTION OF PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 36 OVER THREE 23 SPRINGS RUN, SOUTH WOODBURY TOWNSHIP, BEDFORD COUNTY, AS THE 24 25 MARINE LANCE CORPORAL DARRELL MAGRUDER MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE ON THAT PORTION OF STATE ROUTE 1001 OVER 26 IMLERTOWN RUN, BEDFORD TOWNSHIP, BEDFORD COUNTY, AS THE FIRST 27 LIEUTENANT ERIC FISHER WOOD, JR., MEMORIAL BRIDGE; 28 DESIGNATING A BRIDGE ON U.S. ROUTE 209 OVER THE WEST BRANCH 29 30 SCHUYLKILL RIVER IN POTTSVILLE, SCHUYLKILL COUNTY, AS THE CAPTAIN DAVID A. BORIS MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE 31 ON THAT PORTION OF STATE ROUTE 1010 OVER THE CONESTOGA RIVER, 32 LANCASTER COUNTY, AS THE SERGEANT MELVIN R. WINK MEMORIAL 33 34 BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A PORTION OF PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 563 IN BUCKS COUNTY AS THE PFC JOHN RIVERS WAY; DESIGNATING A BRIDGE 35 ON THAT PORTION OF U.S. ROUTE 219 OVER THE KINZUA CREEK, 36 LAFAYETTE TOWNSHIP, MCKEAN COUNTY, AS THE STAFF SERGEANT CARL 37 ENIS MEMORIAL BRIDGE; DESIGNATING A PORTION OF PENNSYLVANIA 38 ROUTE 339 IN COLUMBIA COUNTY AS THE TURNER MEMORIAL HIGHWAY; 39 40 DESIGNATING THE VIADUCT BRIDGES LOCATED ON INTERSTATE 80, EASTBOUND, SEGMENT NUMBER 1382, OFFSET 0000, AND WESTBOUND, 41 42 SEGMENT NUMBER 1383, OFFSET 0000, IN COOPER TOWNSHIP, 43 CLEARFIELD COUNTY, OVER MOSHANNON CREEK AS THE RICHARD B. WHITEHEAD MEMORIAL BRIDGES; AND DESIGNATING THE BRIDGE TO BE 44 CONSTRUCTED ON THAT PORTION OF PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 88 OVER 45 PETERS CREEK, FINLEYVILLE BOROUGH, WASHINGTON COUNTY, AS THE 46 JOHN EMERICK MEMORIAL BRIDGE. 47

- The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 49 hereby enacts as follows:
- 50 Section 1. Newstell Marable, Sr., Memorial Bridge.
- 51 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
- 52 follows:
- 53 (1) Newstell Marable, Sr., was a native of Birmingham,

- 1 Alabama, and a graduate of Alabama A&M University.
- 2 (2) Mr. Marable served in the United States Army from
- 3 1953 through 1955.
- 4 (3) Mr. Marable joined and served the Pottstown NAACP
- 5 Branch #2288 from 1960 until his death in 2015.
- 6 (4) During his 30-year tenure as president of the
- 7 Pottstown NAACP Branch #2288, Mr. Marable handled 107
- 8 complaints.
- 9 (5) Mr. Marable was a passionate advocate for equal
- 10 opportunity and employment for all races and genders.
- 11 (6) In 1985, Mr. Marable led the combined efforts of the
- 12 NAACP and many churches and organizations to fight for the
- rightful employment of two African Americans to the local
- 14 fire company.
- 15 (7) Mr. Marable was a key advocate for equality and was
- instrumental in closing the Boyertown School District and
- 17 Pottsgrove School District for observance of the Martin
- 18 Luther King, Jr., holiday celebrations.
- 19 (8) Mr. Marable was a proud and longstanding member of
- the Bethel A.M.E. Church in Pottstown where he served on
- 21 multiple boards and held many positions.
- 22 (b) Designation. -- The bridge on that portion of Pennsylvania
- 23 Route 100 over the Schuylkill River in Pottstown Borough,
- 24 Montgomery County, is designated as the Newstell Marable, Sr.,
- 25 Memorial Bridge.
- 26 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
- 27 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
- 28 traffic in both directions on the bridge.
- 29 Section 2. Private Raymond Lafayette Naugle Memorial Bridge.
- 30 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as

- 1 follows:
- 2 (1) Private Raymond Lafayette Naugle, a native of
- 3 Carlisle, enlisted in the United States Army on July 17,
- 4 1917.
- 5 (2) While serving with G Company, 2nd Battalion, 112th
- 6 Infantry Regiment, 28th Infantry Division, Private Naugle was
- 7 killed in action on November 8, 1918, in France.
- 8 (b) Designation. -- The bridge on Stoughstown Road in
- 9 Cumberland County over Interstate 81 (bridge number 21-3007-
- 10 0020-0865) is designated the Private Raymond Lafayette Naugle
- 11 Memorial Bridge.
- 12 (c) Signs. -- The Department of Transportation shall erect and
- 13 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
- 14 traffic in both directions on the bridge.
- 15 Section 3. Sergeant Kenneth Lee "Buck" Devor Memorial Bridge.
- 16 (a) Findings. -- The General Assembly finds and declares as
- 17 follows:
- 18 (1) Sergeant Kenneth Lee "Buck" Devor, a native of
- 19 Carlisle, was drafted into the United States Army on December
- 20 2, 1966.
- 21 (2) While serving with Troop C, 3rd Squadron, 4th
- 22 Cavalry Regiment, 25th Infantry Division (Tropic Lightning
- Division), during the Tet Offensive, Sergeant Devor was
- killed in action on February 10, 1968.
- 25 (3) Sergeant Devor was awarded the Bronze Star medal,
- the Purple Heart, the Combat Infantryman's Badge and the
- 27 Republic of Vietnam Military Merit Medal.
- 28 (b) Designation. -- The section of Maple Avenue over the
- 29 Yellow Breeches Creek in Walnut Bottom Township, Cumberland
- 30 County (bridge number 21-3009-0012-0000), is designated the

- 1 Sergeant Kenneth Lee "Buck" Devor Memorial Bridge.
- 2 (c) Signs. -- The Department of Transportation shall erect and
- 3 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
- 4 traffic in both directions on the bridge.
- 5 Section 4. PFC Nick Kozorosky Memorial Bridge.
- 6 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
- 7 follows:
- 8 (1) PFC Nick Kozorosky, a native of Nanty Glo Borough,
- 9 served his country in the United States Army, 101st Airborne
- 10 Division, 506th Parachute Infantry Regiment during World War
- 11 II.
- 12 (2) On May 4, 1945, PFC Kozorosky was killed in action
- 13 near Berchtesgaden, Germany, where Nazi leaders were planning
- 14 a last stand.
- 15 (3) PFC Nick Kozorosky was posthumously awarded the
- 16 Purple Heart.
- 17 (b) Designation. -- The bridge located on U.S. Route 219
- 18 South, over U.S. Route 22, also known as the Admiral Peary
- 19 Highway, in Cambria Township, Cambria County, is designated as
- 20 the PFC Nick Kozorosky Memorial Bridge.
- 21 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
- 22 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to

- 23 traffic on the bridge.
- 24 SECTION 5. FIRST SERGEANT ALEXANDER KELLY MEMORIAL BRIDGE.
- 25 (A) FINDINGS.--THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FINDS AND DECLARES AS
- 26 FOLLOWS:
- 27 (1) ALEXANDER KELLY WAS BORN APRIL 7, 1840, IN
- 28 SALTSBURG, PENNSYLVANIA.
- 29 (2) DURING THE CIVIL WAR, HE ENLISTED AS A SUBSTITUTE IN
- 30 THE UNION ARMY AND SERVED AS A FIRST SERGEANT WITH COMPANY F

- 1 OF THE 6TH UNITED STATES COLORED TROOPS.
- 2 (3) FIRST SERGEANT KELLY WAS AWARDED THE MEDAL OF HONOR
- 3 FOR HIS ACTIONS ON SEPTEMBER 29, 1864, DURING THE BATTLE OF
- 4 CHAPIN'S FARM IN VIRGINIA, WHERE HE GALLANTLY SEIZED THE
- 5 COLORS, WHICH HAD FALLEN NEAR THE ENEMY'S LINES OF ABATIS,
- 6 RAISED THEM AND RALLIED THE MEN AT A TIME OF CONFUSION AND IN
- 7 A PLACE OF THE GREATEST DANGER.
- 8 (4) FIRST SERGEANT KELLY'S ACTIONS DURING THE BATTLE OF
- 9 CHAPIN'S FARM ARE DEPICTED IN THE PAINTING TITLED THREE
- 10 MEDALS OF HONOR BY AMERICAN ARTIST DON TROIANI.
- 11 (5) FIRST SERGEANT KELLY WAS MUSTERED OUT OF THE
- 12 MILITARY SEPTEMBER 20, 1865, AND MOVED TO PITTSBURGH.
- 13 (6) FIRST SERGEANT KELLY DIED JUNE 19, 1907, AT THE AGE
- 14 OF 67 AND WAS INTERRED AT SAINT PETERS CEMETERY IN
- 15 PITTSBURGH.
- 16 (B) DESIGNATION.--THE BRIDGE LOCATED ON THAT PORTION OF
- 17 PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 286, KNOWN AS WASHINGTON STREET, OVER THE
- 18 KISKIMINETAS RIVER, BETWEEN SALTSBURG BOROUGH, INDIANA COUNTY,
- 19 AND LOYALHANNA TOWNSHIP, WESTMORELAND COUNTY, IS DESIGNATED THE
- 20 FIRST SERGEANT ALEXANDER KELLY MEMORIAL BRIDGE.
- 21 (C) SIGNS.--THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION SHALL ERECT AND
- 22 MAINTAIN APPROPRIATE SIGNS DISPLAYING THE NAME OF THE BRIDGE TO
- 23 TRAFFIC IN BOTH DIRECTIONS ON THE BRIDGE.
- 24 SECTION 6. SPECIALIST 4 REUBEN GARNETT, JR., MEMORIAL BRIDGE.
- 25 (A) FINDINGS.--THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FINDS AND DECLARES AS
- 26 FOLLOWS:
- 27 (1) REUBEN GARNETT, JR., WAS BORN JULY 22, 1942, IN
- 28 STEELTON.
- 29 (2) HE ENLISTED IN THE UNITED STATES ARMY AT THE AGE OF
- 30 17 AND HELD THE RANK OF SPECIALIST 4.

- 1 (3) ON JULY 8, 1965, HE WAS DEPLOYED TO VIETNAM WHERE HE
- 2 SERVED AS AN INFANTRYMAN WITH A COMPANY, 1ST BATTALION, 327TH
- 3 INFANTRY, 101ST AIRBORNE DIVISION.
- 4 (4) ON MARCH 4, 1966, AT THE AGE OF 23, SPECIALIST 4
- 5 REUBEN GARNETT, JR., WAS KILLED BY HOSTILE SMALL ARMS FIRE
- 6 DURING A COMBAT OPERATION IN PHU YEN PROVINCE, SOUTH VIETNAM.
- 7 (5) HE WAS AWARDED THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL, COMBAT
- 8 INFANTRY BADGE, PURPLE HEART, NATIONAL DEFENSE MEDAL, VIETNAM
- 9 SERVICE MEDAL AND THE VIETNAM CAMPAIGN MEDAL.
- 10 (B) DESIGNATION. -- THE BRIDGE IDENTIFIED AS BRIDGE KEY 14196
- 11 LOCATED ON THAT PORTION OF PENNSYLVANIA ROUTE 39, ALSO KNOWN AS
- 12 LINGLESTOWN ROAD, OVER U.S. ROUTE 22 IN THE CITY OF HARRISBURG,
- 13 DAUPHIN COUNTY, IS DESIGNATED AS THE SPECIALIST 4 REUBEN
- 14 GARNETT, JR., MEMORIAL BRIDGE.
- 15 (C) SIGNS.--THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION SHALL ERECT AND
- 16 MAINTAIN APPROPRIATE SIGNS DISPLAYING THE NAME OF THE BRIDGE TO
- 17 TRAFFIC IN BOTH DIRECTIONS ON THE BRIDGE.
- 18 Section 5 7. Francis V. "Angie" McAndrew Memorial Highway.

- 19 (a) Findings. -- The General Assembly finds and declares as
- 20 follows:
- 21 (1) Francis V. "Angie" McAndrew lived a life of service
- 22 to the residents of Schuylkill County and to the Commonwealth
- of Pennsylvania.
- 24 (2) Born December 29, 1944, in Shenandoah, he was a 1962
- 25 graduate of the former J.W. Cooper High School, Shenandoah,
- and a 1977 graduate of The Pennsylvania State University,
- 27 Schuylkill Campus.
- 28 (3) He was a decorated Army veteran, having served
- 29 during the Vietnam era.
- 30 (4) After his honorable discharge from the Army, he

- graduated from the Pennsylvania State Police Academy,
- 2 Hershey, and became a Pennsylvania State Trooper and State
- 3 Police investigator.
- 4 (5) During his 25-year career with the Pennsylvania 5 State Police, he served in numerous roles as a patrol 6 officer, a Statewide vice and narcotics investigator, a 7 corruption probe investigator and a criminal investigator.
- 8 (6) He received many accolades and commendations for his
 9 work and skills in helping to solve and prosecute numerous
 10 criminal cases and received a special citation in True
 11 Detective Magazine.
- 12 (7) Upon his retirement from the Pennsylvania State
 13 Police, he worked as a detective for the Schuylkill County
 14 District Attorney's Office and was elected Schuylkill County
 15 Sheriff in 1993.
 - (8) He served as county sheriff for 14 years and was instrumental in establishing a central booking office to quickly and efficiently provide fingerprinting and recordkeeping for suspects.
 - (9) He also implemented security at the courthouse, established a prison inmate work detail and revamped procedures for attaining a hunting license in the county.
 - (10) In 2007, he was elected Schuylkill County

 Commissioner, helping the Democratic Party take majority

 control of the county board of commissioners for the first

 time in 37 years. He served as commissioner from 2008 to

 2011.
- 28 (11) During his career, he also served as a commissioner 29 for the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency, a 30 delegate to the Pennsylvania State Troopers Association, a

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- 1 board member of the Pennsylvania State Police Camp Cadet
- 2 program and served on numerous other boards and associations.
- 3 (12) He was also a member of Divine Mercy Parish,
- 4 Anthony P. Damato American Legion Post 792, AMVETS Post 7,
- 5 Shenandoah East End Field and Stream Club, Saint Clair Fish
- 6 and Game, Veterans of the Vietnam War Post 29, BPOE Lodge
- 7 1533, Ancient Order of Hibernians in America, John F. Kennedy
- 8 Division 1 and a lifelong member of the former West End Fire
- 9 Company in Lost Creek.
- 10 (13) He died on November 27, 2016.
- 11 (b) Designation.--The portion of Pennsylvania Route 54 in
- 12 West Mahanoy Township, Schuylkill County, is designated as the
- 13 Francis V. "Angie" McAndrew Memorial Highway.
- 14 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
- 15 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
- 16 traffic in both directions on the highway.
- 17 Section 6 8. Corporal Michael Dennis Cooke Memorial Highway. <--
- 18 (a) Findings.--
- 19 (1) Corporal Michael Dennis Cooke was born and raised in
- 20 Upper Moreland Township, Montgomery County.
- 21 (2) Corporal Cooke enlisted in the United States Marine
- Corps in 1987 and served in 3rd Platoon, C Company, 2nd
- 23 Reconnaissance Battalion, Second Marine Division.
- 24 (3) Corporal Cooke died of massive trauma after an
- accidental grenade explosion on February 22, 1991, after
- 26 completing a heroic operation against the enemy serving as
- team scout and photographer during Operation Desert Storm. He
- was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star.
- 29 (b) Designation. -- The section of State Route 2026 in Upper
- 30 Moreland Township, Montgomery County, from Pennsylvania Route

- 1 611 to Pennsylvania Route 63 is designated the Corporal Michael
- 2 Dennis Cooke Memorial Highway.
- 3 (c) Signs. -- The Department of Transportation shall erect and
- 4 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to

- 5 traffic in both directions on the highway.
- 6 SECTION 9. CENTRAL PENNSYLVANIA VIETNAM VETERANS MEMORIAL
- 7 HIGHWAY.
- 8 (A) FINDINGS.--THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FINDS AND DECLARES AS
- 9 FOLLOWS:
- 10 (1) ALTHOUGH THERE WAS NO OFFICIAL DECLARATION OF WAR,
- 11 IT IS WIDELY ACCEPTED THAT THE VIETNAM WAR STARTED ON
- 12 NOVEMBER 1, 1955, AND ENDED ON APRIL 30, 1975, LASTING 19
- 13 YEARS, 180 DAYS.
- 14 (2) ON AUGUST 2, 1964, THE NORTH VIETNAMESE FIRED ON A
- 15 UNITED STATES DESTROYER ANCHORED IN THE GULF OF TONKIN,
- 16 LEADING TO CONGRESS PASSING THE GULF OF TONKIN RESOLUTION,
- 17 AUTHORIZING A FULL-SCALE INTERVENTION IN THE VIETNAM WAR.
- 18 (3) ON MARCH 8, 1965, THE FIRST AMERICAN COMBAT TROOPS,
- 19 THE 9TH MARINE EXPEDITIONARY BRIGADE, LANDED IN DA NANG,
- 20 VIETNAM.
- 21 (4) THE LAST AMERICAN GROUND TROOPS LEFT VIETNAM ON
- 22 MARCH 29, 1973, MORE THAN TWO YEARS BEFORE THE OFFICIAL END
- 23 OF THE WAR WHEN SOUTH VIETNAM SURRENDERED TO NORTH VIETNAM.
- 24 (5) TWO HUNDRED FORTY MEN WERE AWARDED THE MEDAL OF
- 25 HONOR DURING THE VIETNAM WAR.
- 26 (6) IN ALL, APPROXIMATELY 2,700,000 AMERICAN MEN AND
- 27 WOMEN SERVED IN UNIFORM IN VIETNAM, INCLUDING OVER 300,000
- 28 PENNSYLVANIANS.
- 29 (7) FIFTY EIGHT THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED FORTY-EIGHT
- 30 AMERICANS WERE KILLED DURING THE WAR, INCLUDING OVER 3,000

- 1 PENNSYLVANIANS.
