#### AN ACT

Amending the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.343, No.176), entitled, 1 as amended, "An act relating to the finances of the State 2 government; providing for the settlement, assessment, 3 collection, and lien of taxes, bonus, and all other accounts 4 5 due the Commonwealth, the collection and recovery of fees and other money or property due or belonging to the Commonwealth, 6 or any agency thereof, including escheated property and the proceeds of its sale, the custody and disbursement or other 7 8 disposition of funds and securities belonging to or in the 9 possession of the Commonwealth, and the settlement of claims 10 against the Commonwealth, the resettlement of accounts and 11 appeals to the courts, refunds of moneys erroneously paid to 12 the Commonwealth, auditing the accounts of the Commonwealth 13 and all agencies thereof, of all public officers collecting 14 moneys payable to the Commonwealth, or any agency thereof, 15 and all receipts of appropriations from the Commonwealth, 16 17 authorizing the Commonwealth to issue tax anticipation notes to defray current expenses, implementing the provisions of 18 section 7(a) of Article VIII of the Constitution of 19 Pennsylvania authorizing and restricting the incurring of 20 certain debt and imposing penalties; affecting every 21 department, board, commission, and officer of the State 22 government, every political subdivision of the State, and 23 certain officers of such subdivisions, every person, 24 25 association, and corporation required to pay, assess, or 26 collect taxes, or to make returns or reports under the laws 27 imposing taxes for State purposes, or to pay license fees or 28 other moneys to the Commonwealth, or any agency thereof, 29 every State depository and every debtor or creditor of the Commonwealth," in Department of the Auditor General, further providing for audits of agencies receiving State aid. 30 31

32 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

hereby enacts as follows: 1

2 Section 1. Section 403 of the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.343, No.176), known as The Fiscal Code, is amended to read: 3 4 Section 403. Audits of Agencies Receiving State Aid.--(a) The Department of the Auditor General shall have the power, and 5 its duty shall be, to audit the accounts and records of every 6 person, association, corporation, and public agency, receiving 7 an appropriation of money, payable out of any fund in the State 8 Treasury, or entitled to receive any portion of any State tax 9 for any purpose whatsoever, as far as may be necessary to 10 satisfy the department that the money received was expended or 11 is being expended for no purpose other than that for which it 12 13 was paid. Copies of all such audits shall be furnished to the 14 Governor.

15 (b) If at any time the department shall find that any money received by any person, association, corporation, or public 16 17 agency, has been expended for any purpose other than that for 18 which it was paid, it shall forthwith notify the Governor, and 19 shall decline to approve any further requisition for the payment 20 of any appropriation, or any further portion of any State tax, to such person, association, corporation or public agency, until 21 22 an amount equal to that improperly expended shall have been 23 expended for the purpose for which the money improperly expended 24 was received from the State Treasury.

(c) Any person, association, corporation or public agency 25 being audited under this section shall respond to the Auditor 26 27 General within 120 days of the furnished audit with an audit recommendation implementation plan. Failure to respond to a 28 29 furnished audit within 120 days will result in a suspension of any appropriation to the person, association, corporation or 30 20170SB0550PN0637
