AN ACT

1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8	Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An act relating to the public school system, including certain provisions applicable as well to private and parochial schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," amending provisions relating to school police officers and, school resource officers, AND < SCHOOL SECURITY GUARDS; and imposing powers and duties on the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency.

10	hereby enacts as follows:
11	Section 1. Article XIII-C heading and sections 1301-C, 1302-
12	C, 1303-C, 1305-C, 1306-C, 1309-C, 1311-C, 1313-C and 1314-C of
13	the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public
14	School Code of 1949, added June 22, 2018 (P.L.327, No.44), are

17	SCHOOL [POLICE OFFICERS AND
18	SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS] <u>SECURITY</u>
19	Section 1301-C. Definitions.

1	The following words and phrases when used in this article
2	shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
3	context clearly indicates otherwise:
4	"Commission." The Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and
5	Delinquency.
6	"Department." The Department of Education of the
7	Commonwealth.
8	"Independent contractor." An individual, including a retired
9	Federal agent or retired State, municipal or military police
10	officer or retired sheriff or deputy sheriff, whose
11	responsibilities, including work hours, are established in a
12	written contract with a school entity or a nonpublic school for
13	the purpose of performing school security services.
14	"School entity." A school district, intermediate unit, area
15	vocational-technical school, charter school or private
16	residential rehabilitative institution.
17	"School police officer." Any of the following:
18	(1) A law <u>enforcement</u> officer employed by a school
19	[district] entity or nonpublic school whose responsibilities,
20	including work hours, are established by the school
21	[district] <u>entity or nonpublic school</u> .
22	(2) An independent contractor or an individual provided
23	through a third-party vendor who has been appointed under_
24	section 1302-C.
25	"School resource officer." A law enforcement officer
26	commissioned and employed by a law enforcement agency whose duty
27	station is located in a school entity or nonpublic school and
28	whose stationing is established by an agreement between the law
29	enforcement agency and the school entity[.] or nonpublic school.
30	The term includes an active certified sheriff or deputy sheriff
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whose stationing in the school entity or nonpublic school is 1 established by a written agreement between the county, the 2 sheriff's office and the school entity or nonpublic school. 3 "School security quard." An individual employed by a school 4 entity, nonpublic school or a [third party contractor] third-5 party vendor or an independent contractor who is assigned to a 6 7 school for routine safety and security duties and [is not 8 engaged in programs with students at the school.] has not been_ 9 granted powers under section $\frac{1306-C(2)}{1306-C(3)}$ and $\frac{(3)}{1306-C(3)}$. <---"School security personnel." School police officers, school 10 resource officers and school security quards. 11 12 "Third-party vendor." A company or entity approved by the 13 Office of Safe Schools under section 1302-A(b)(8) or the 14 commission under section 1315-C(2) that provides school security

15 services.

Section 1302-C. School police officers. 16

17 (a) Application to court. -- A school entity or nonpublic 18 school may apply to a judge of the court of common pleas of the 19 county within which the school entity or nonpublic school is 20 situated to appoint a person or persons, as the board of 21 directors of the school entity or the administration of the 22 nonpublic school may designate, to act as a school police 23 officer for the school entity or nonpublic school.

24 (b) Appointment.--

The judge, upon the application, may appoint a (1)26 person or persons, as the judge deems proper, to be the 27 school police officer and shall note the fact of the 28 appointment to be entered upon the records of the court.

29 The judge may, at the request of the school entity (2)or nonpublic school, grant the school police officer [the 30 <---

10 Section 1303-C. Annual report [to department].

A school entity or nonpublic school which employs <u>or</u> <u>contracts for</u> a school police officer shall report annually to the department and the [Office of Safe Schools] <u>commission</u> the following information regarding school police officers receiving training as required under 53 Pa.C.S. Ch. 21 Subch. D (relating to municipal police education and training):

17 (1) The identity of the school entity or nonpublic
18 school and the number of school police officers employed <u>or</u>
19 <u>contracted</u> by the school entity or nonpublic school.

20 (2) The municipalities comprising the school entity or21 in which the nonpublic school is located.

(3) The date and type of training provided to eachschool police officer.

24 Section 1305-C. [Firearm training] Training.

25 <u>(A) GENERAL RULE.--</u>A school police officer who has been <--</p>
26 granted powers under section [1306-C(2) or (3)] 1306-C(3) or has <--</p>
27 been authorized to carry a firearm must, before entering upon
28 the duties of the office, [successfully] satisfy the following:
29 <u>(1) Successfully</u> complete such annual BASIC training as <--</p>
30 [set forth in] required by the Municipal Police Officers'

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1 Education and Training Commission under 53 Pa.C.S. Ch. 21 Subch. D (relating to municipal police education and 2 training) or [have] has graduated from the Pennsylvania State 3 Police Academy [and have], has been employed as a State 4 trooper with the Pennsylvania State Police and <u>has</u> separated 5 6 from that service in good standing. 7 (2) (i) Successfully complete the Basic School Resource 8 Officer Course of Instruction offered by the National 9 Association of School Resource Officers or an equivalent course of instruction approved by the commission. 10 (ii) A school police officer who is currently 11 12 employed or contracted by a school entity or nonpublic 13 school shall have six months from the effective date of 14 this paragraph to complete the instruction. 15 (B) IN-SERVICE TRAINING. -- NOTWITHSTANDING ANY OTHER <---PROVISION OF LAW, A SCHOOL POLICE OFFICER SHALL ALSO ATTEND 16 17 ANNUAL IN-SERVICE TRAINING APPROVED BY THE MUNICIPAL POLICE 18 OFFICERS' EDUCATION AND TRAINING COMMISSION UNDER 53 PA.C.S. Powers and duties. 21 A school police officer appointed under section 1302-C(b) 22 shall possess and exercise all the following powers and duties: 23 (1)To enforce good order in school buildings, on school 24 buses and on school grounds in the respective school entities 25 or nonpublic schools. For purposes of this paragraph, the 26 term "school bus" shall include a vehicle leased by the 27 school entity or nonpublic school to transport students and a 28 vehicle of mass transit used by students to go to and from 29 school and school activities when the school police officer 30 responds to a report of an incident involving a breach of

2 [(2) If authorized by the court, to exercise the same <-3 powers as exercised under authority of law or ordinance by
4 the police of the municipality in which the school property

6 (3) If authorized by the court, to issue summary
7 citations or to detain individuals <u>IN SCHOOL BUILDINGS, ON</u> <--
8 <u>SCHOOL BUSES AND ON SCHOOL GROUNDS IN THE RESPECTIVE SCHOOL</u>
9 <u>ENTITIES OR NONPUBLIC SCHOOLS</u> until local law enforcement is
10 notified.

11 Section 1309-C. Cooperative police service agreements.

12 (a) General rule.--A school entity or nonpublic school and 13 municipality may enter into a cooperative police service 14 agreement under 42 Pa.C.S. § 8953(e) (relating to Statewide 15 municipal police jurisdiction) and 53 Pa.C.S. § 2303 (relating 16 to intergovernmental cooperation authorized) to authorize the 17 exercise of concurrent jurisdiction with local law enforcement 18 within the municipality where the [school or] school entity or 19 nonpublic school is located or within the municipality in which 20 a school event or activity will take place.

21 (b) Municipalities without municipal police departments.--22 If a school <u>entity or nonpublic school</u> is located (1)23 within a municipality where no municipal police department 24 exists, the school entity or nonpublic school may enter into 25 a cooperative police service agreement under 42 Pa.C.S. § 26 8953(e) and 53 Pa.C.S. § 2303 with a municipality providing 27 full-time or part-time police coverage that is located 28 adjacent to the school entity or nonpublic school.

29 (2) At least 30 days prior to executing a cooperative
 30 police service agreement under this subsection, the school

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entity or nonpublic school shall provide written notice of its intent to enter into the agreement to the municipality where the school <u>entity or nonpublic school</u> is located.

4 (3) A copy of the executed agreement shall be provided 5 to the commanding officer of the Pennsylvania State Police 6 installation that provides primary police services to the 7 municipality where the school <u>entity or nonpublic school</u> is 8 located.

9 (4) A cooperative police service agreement entered into 10 under this subsection shall only pertain to actions taken on 11 school property under the agreement and shall not affect the 12 jurisdiction of the Pennsylvania State Police.

13 Section 1311-C. Independent contractors and third-party

14

<u>vendors</u>.

15 [Notwithstanding section 1310-C, a school entity or nonpublic 16 school may contract with individuals who are retired Federal 17 agents or retired State, municipal or military police officers 18 or sheriffs to provide services under this article. The 19 individuals shall be considered independent contractors of the 20 school entity or nonpublic school and shall be compensated by the school entity or nonpublic school on an hourly basis and 21 receive no other compensation or fringe benefits from the school 22 23 entity or nonpublic school.]

24 (a) General rule.--Notwithstanding section 1310-C, a school

25 <u>entity or nonpublic school may contract with an independent</u>

26 <u>contractor or third-party vendor to provide school police</u>

27 officer or school security guard services under this article.

(b) School police officer services.--[The school entity or nonpublic school shall ensure that the independent contractors comply with all of the following :]

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1	(1) [Completed such annual training as is required by
2	the Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training
3	Commission under 53 Pa.C.S. Ch. 21 Subch. D (relating to
4	municipal police education and training)] Prior to performing
5	services for a school entity or nonpublic school, an
6	independent contractor or an individual provided through a
7	third-party vendor shall complete the training required under
8	section 1305-C.
9	(2) [Satisfied] Prior to performing services for a
10	school entity or nonpublic school, an independent contractor
11	or an individual provided through a third-party vendor shall
12	<u>satisfy</u> the requirements of [section] <u>sections</u> 111 <u>and 111.1</u>
13	and 23 Pa.C.S. § 6344 (relating to employees having contact
14	with children; adoptive and foster parents).
15	(3) [In the case of a school entity, indemnified by the
16	school entity under 42 Pa.C.S. § 8548 (relating to
17	indemnity).] If provided in the written contract, an
18	independent contractor of a school entity shall be treated as
19	an employee of a local agency under 42 Pa.C.S. Ch. 85 Subch.
20	<u>C (relating to actions against local parties).</u>
21	(4) An independent contractor of a nonpublic school
22	shall be insured by the nonpublic school for any liability
23	arising from the performance of the independent contractor's
24	<u>duties.</u>
25	(c) School security guard services
26	(1) Prior to performing services for a school entity or
27	nonpublic school, an independent contractor or an individual
28	provided through a third-party vendor shall complete the
29	training required under section 1314-C(b), if applicable.
30	(2) Prior to performing services for a school entity or

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1 nonpublic school, an independent contractor or an individual_ 2 provided through a third-party vendor shall satisfy the requirements of sections 111 and 111.1 and 23 Pa.C.S. § 6344. 3 (3) If provided in the written contract, an independent 4 5 contractor of a school entity shall be treated as an employee of a local agency under 42 Pa.C.S. Ch. 85 Subch. C. 6 (4) An independent contractor of a nonpublic school 7 8 shall be insured by the nonpublic school for any liability 9 arising from the performance of the independent contractor's 10 duties. Section 1313-C. School resource officers. 11 12 (a) Powers and duties. -- A school entity or nonpublic school 13 may confer the following powers and duties upon school resource 14 officers: 15 To assist in the identification of physical changes (1)16 in the environment which may reduce crime in or around the 17 school. 18 (2)To assist in developing school policy which addresses crime and to recommend procedural changes. 19 20 To develop and educate students in crime prevention (3) and safety. 21 22 To train students in conflict resolution, (4) 23 restorative justice and crime awareness. 24 (5) To address crime and violence issues, gangs and drug 25 activities affecting or occurring in or around a school. 26 To develop or expand community justice initiatives (6) 27 for students. (a.1) Training.--28 29 (1) Prior to entering upon the duties of the office, a school resource officer shall successfully complete the Basic 30

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1 School Resource Officer Course of Instruction offered by the 2 National Association of School Resource Officers or an equivalent course of instruction approved by the commission. 3 (2) A school resource officer who is currently employed <--4 by, and whose duty station is located STATIONED in a school <--5 entity or nonpublic school shall have six months from the 6 effective date of this subsection to complete the 7 8 instruction. 9 Intergovernmental agreements for school [security and (b) 10 safety] resource officers.--The board of school directors of a school district 11 (1) 12 may enter into agreements with other political subdivisions 13 to provide for [the safety and security of the] school 14 resource officers, subject to the statutory authority of 15 school resource officers. (2) The board of school directors may use school funds 16 17 to share costs with municipalities and counties for such 18 expenses as benefits and salaries of school resource officers 19 [and probation officers]. 20 School resource officers [and probation officers] (3) 21 are not required to be employees of the school district and 22 may be employees of other political subdivisions. 23 Section 1314-C. School security guards. 24 (a) Scope of services. -- A school security quard may provide 25 the following services as determined by the school entity or 26 nonpublic school: 27 School safety support services. 4	(6) Security functions which improve and maintain school
5	safety.
6	(b) TrainingThe following shall apply:
7	(1) A school security guard shall successfully complete
8	the basic school resource officer course of instruction
9	offered by the National Association of School Resource
10	Officers or an equivalent course of instruction approved by
11	the commission.
12	(2) A school security guard who is currently employed or
13	contracted by a school entity or nonpublic school shall have
14	six months from the effective date of this subsection to
15	complete the instruction.
16	(c) Armed school security guardsA school entity or
17	nonpublic school may employ or contract with an independent
18	<u>contractor or a third-party vendor under section 1311-C for an</u>
19	armed school security guard if all of the following conditions
20	<u>are met:</u>
21	(1) Except as set forth in subsection (d) or (e), the
22	school security guard is licensed under 18 Pa.C.S. Ch. 61
23	Subch. A (relating to Uniform Firearms Act).
24	(2) Except as set forth in subsection (d) or (e), the
25	school security guard has successfully completed and is
26	currently certified under the act of October 10, 1974
27	(P.L.705, No.235), known as the Lethal Weapons Training Act.
28	(3) The school security guard has complied with training
29	requirements under subsection (b).
30	(4) The school security guard has satisfied the

1	requirements under sections 111 and 111.1 and 23 Pa.C.S. §
2	<u>6344 (relating to employees having contact with children;</u>
3	adoptive and foster parents).
4	(d) Active law enforcement officersActive law enforcement_
5	officers shall be exempt from the training requirements for
6	school security guards under subsection (c)(1) and (2) upon
7	presentation to the school entity or nonpublic school of
8	evidence of their completion of the training requirements under
9	53 Pa.C.S. Ch. 21 Subch. D (relating to municipal police
10	education and training).
11	(e) Retired law enforcement officersA retired law
12	enforcement officer shall be exempt from the training_
13	requirements for school security guards under subsection (c)(1)
14	and (2) if the retired officer:
15	(1) complies with section 8.1 of the Lethal Weapons
16	<u>Training Act; or</u>
17	(2) has been issued a firearm training and qualification
18	card under section 5 of the act of December 13, 2005
19	(P.L.432, No.79), known as the Retired Law Enforcement
20	Identification Act.
21	Section 2. The act is amended by adding $\frac{1}{2}$ A SECTION <
22	to read:
23	Section 1315-C. Duties of the commission.
24	The commission shall have the following duties under this
25	<u>article:</u>
26	(1) In conjunction with the department and the
27	Pennsylvania State Police, periodically reassess the training
28	requirements for all school security personnel, including the
29	Basic School Resource Officer Course of Instruction offered
30	by the National Association of School Resource Officers.

1	(2) Establish criteria for certifying approved third-
2	party vendors to provide school security guard services to
3	school entities and nonpublic schools.
4	(3) Publish and post on the commission's publicly
5	accessible Internet website a listing of all approved third-
6	party vendors for school security guard services.
7	(4) Submit an annual report to the General Assembly on
8	school security, including all data collected from school
9	entities and nonpublic schools and recommendations for
10	improvements in school security personnel training
11	requirements.
12	Section 1316-C. Authority to possess a firearm. <
13	This article provides the exclusive means for a school entity
14	or nonpublic school to authorize school security personnel to
15	possess a firearm on school premises.
16	Section 3. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
