AN ACT

1 2 3 4 5	Requiring long-term care nursing facilities to maintain certain nurse aide staffing levels in order to protect the health and safety of residents and employees; providing for powers and duties of the Department of Health; and imposing civil penalties.
6	WHEREAS, This Commonwealth has a large and growing population
7	of senior and disabled persons who require nursing facility
8	care; and
9	WHEREAS, Significant staffing resources are necessary to
10	provide quality care to our senior and disabled citizens who
11	reside in nursing homes; and
12	WHEREAS, Most of the direct care provided to nursing home
13	residents is by nurse aides, and long-term care nursing
14	facilities that receive public money should be required to
15	provide at all times staffing resources to meet the minimum
16	levels necessary to provide quality care to each resident; and
17	WHEREAS, Nursing facilities that receive public money have a
18	responsibility to report to residents, their families and the

1 taxpayers of this Commonwealth the staffing levels that they
2 provide for the residents in their care.

3 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
4 hereby enacts as follows:

5 Section 1. Short title.

6 This act shall be known and may be cited as the Long-term 7 Care Facility Nurse Aide Staffing Act.

8 Section 2. Definitions.

9 The following words and phrases when used in this act shall 10 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the 11 context clearly indicates otherwise:

12 "Department." The Department of Health of the Commonwealth.13 "Facility." A long-term care nursing facility.

14 "Licensed nurse." A registered nurse or licensed practical 15 nurse.

16 "Nurse aide." An individual who provides nursing or nursing-17 related services to residents in a facility. The term does not 18 include an individual who is a licensed health professional or 19 volunteers who provide those services without monetary 20 compensation.

21 Section 3. Minimum staffing standards for nurse aides.

(a) General rule.--Beginning two years after the effective date of this section, the department shall not issue or renew a license of a facility unless that facility employs nursing personnel sufficient in number as set forth in this section to provide continuous 24-hour nursing care and service necessary to meet the needs of each resident in the facility.

(b) Minimum hours.--The department shall establish a minimum
number of hours that nurse aide care shall be provided for a
patient during each 24-hour period. The total number of hours of

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1 nurse aide care provided in a 24-hour period shall, when totaled 2 for the entire facility, be a minimum of at least 2.15 hours of 3 direct care for each resident.

4 (c) Review of Statewide median.--At least once every five 5 years, the department shall review the Statewide median of hours 6 of reported nurse aide care per resident day and may adjust this 7 minimum standard upward depending on the Statewide median. If 8 the department adjusts the minimum standard upward, facilities 9 will have 90 days to comply.

10 (d) Regulations.--The minimum certified nurse aide hours 11 standard does not replace the standard of 2.7 hours of nursing 12 care per resident per day set forth in 28 Pa. Code § 211.12 13 (relating to nursing services).

14 (e) Restrictions on nurse aide services.--No employee 15 designated as a nurse aide shall count any time performing 16 nonnursing services toward the nurse aide minimum hours 17 requirement, including, but not limited to:

18 (1) Food preparation.

19 (2) Housekeeping.

20 (3) Laundry.

21 (4) Maintenance.

22 Section 4. Enforcement.

(a) Civil penalty for staffing violation.--The department shall impose a civil penalty upon any facility that fails to meet the staffing requirements set forth in section 3. The penalty shall be imposed for each day on which the failure occurs.

(b) Amount of penalty.--The amount of penalty undersubsection (a) shall be determined as follows:

30 (1) For deficiencies in staffing that constitute
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immediate jeopardy as determined by the department to resident health or safety and for repeat deficiencies when a monetary penalty has been previously imposed, the amount of the penalty shall be not less than \$3,000 nor more than \$10,000 for each day of the failure.

6 (2) For deficiencies in staffing that do not constitute 7 immediate jeopardy to resident health or safety, the amount 8 of the penalty shall be not less than \$50 nor more than 9 \$3,000 for each day of the failure.

10 (c) Legal presumption.--In addition to the penalties under 11 subsections (a) and (b), in any action brought by or on behalf 12 of a resident of a facility, the resident's heirs, or both, for 13 negligent infliction of harm or lack of adequate care, a failure 14 to meet the staffing requirements of section 3 shall be presumed 15 a contributory cause of an injury sustained by a resident. 16 Section 5. Regulations.

17 The department shall promulgate rules and regulations 18 necessary to administer and enforce this act, which shall 19 include, but not be limited to, the following:

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(1) Minimum nurse aide hours per resident day.

(2) An accessible and confidential system to report the
failure to comply with requirements of this act and public
access to information regarding reports of inspections,
results, deficiencies and corrections under this act.
Section 6. Effective date.

26 This act shall take effect in 60 days.

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
