INTRODUCED BY YAW AND VOGEL, JUNE 11, 2021

REFERRED TO AGRICULTURE AND RURAL AFFAIRS, JUNE 11, 2021

AN ACT

Amending the act of March 4, 1971 (P.L.6, No.2), entitled "An 1 act relating to tax reform and State taxation by codifying 2 and enumerating certain subjects of taxation and imposing 3 taxes thereon; providing procedures for the payment, 4 collection, administration and enforcement thereof; providing 5 for tax credits in certain cases; conferring powers and 6 7 imposing duties upon the Department of Revenue, certain employers, fiduciaries, individuals, persons, corporations 8 and other entities; prescribing crimes, offenses and 9 penalties," in fireworks, further providing for definitions, 10 for use of display fireworks, for sales locations and for 11 fees, granting of licenses and inspections, repealing 12 provisions relating to temporary structures and providing for 13 short-term structures. 14 15 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania 16 hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. Sections 2401, 2404.1, 2407 and 2408 of the act of March 4, 1971 (P.L.6, No.2), known as the Tax Reform Code of 19 1971, are amended to read: Section 2401. Definitions. The following words and phrases when used in this article

22 shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the 23 context clearly indicates otherwise:

24 "APA 87-1." The American Pyrotechnics Association Standard

87-1: Standard for Construction and Approval for Transportation
 of Fireworks, Novelties, and Theatrical Pyrotechnics, 2001
 edition, or any subsequent edition.

4 "Consumer fireworks."

5 Any combustible or explosive composition or any (1)substance or combination of substances which is intended to 6 7 produce visible or audible effects by combustion, is suitable 8 for use by the public, complies with the construction, 9 performance, composition and labeling requirements 10 promulgated by the Consumer Products Safety Commission in 16 11 CFR (relating to commercial practices) or any successor 12 regulation and complies with the provisions for "consumer 13 fireworks" as defined in APA 87-1 or any successor standard, 14 the sale, possession and use of which shall be permitted 15 throughout this Commonwealth.

16 (2) The term does not include devices as "ground and 17 hand-held sparkling devices," "novelties" or "toy caps" in 18 APA 87-1 or any successor standard, the sale, possession and 19 use of which shall be permitted at all times throughout this 20 Commonwealth.

"Display fireworks." Large fireworks to be used solely by professional pyrotechnicians and designed primarily to produce visible or audible effects by combustion, deflagration or detonation. The term includes, but is not limited to:

(1) salutes that contain more than two grains or 130
milligrams of explosive materials;

27 (2) aerial shells containing more than 60 grams of28 pyrotechnic compositions; and

(3) other display pieces that exceed the limits of
 explosive materials for classification as consumer fireworks

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and are classified as fireworks UN0333, UN0334 or UN0335 under 49 CFR 172.101 (relating to purpose and use of hazardous materials table).

4 "Municipality." A city, borough, incorporated town or5 township.

6 "NFPA 1124." The National Fire Protection Association
7 Standard 1124, Code for the Manufacture, Transportation, and
8 Storage of Fireworks and Pyrotechnic Articles, 2006 edition[, or
9 any subsequent edition].

10 "Occupied structure." A structure, vehicle or place adapted 11 for overnight accommodation of persons or for conducting 12 business whether or not a person is actually present.

13 "Outdoor storage unit." A consumer fireworks building, 14 trailer, semitrailer, metal shipping container or magazine 15 meeting the specifications of NFPA 1124.

["Temporary structure." A structure, other than a permanent facility with fixed utility connections, which is in use or in place for a period of 20 consecutive calendar days or less and is dedicated to the storage and sale of consumer fireworks and related items. The term includes temporary retail sales stands, tents, canopies and membrane structures meeting the specifications of NFPA 1124. The term shall not include a

23 facility that is not licensed to sell consumer fireworks under 24 this article.]

25 "Short-term structure." A structure, other than a permanent 26 facility with fixed utility connections, which is in use or in 27 place for a period of 20 consecutive calendar days or less and 28 is dedicated to the storage and sale of consumer fireworks and 29 related items. The term includes temporary retail sales stands, 30 tents, canopies and membrane structures. The term shall not

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1 include a facility that is not licensed to sell consumer

2 fireworks under this article.

3 Section 2404.1. Use of display fireworks.

4 No display fireworks shall be ignited within 300 feet of a
5 facility that meets the requirements of section 2407 or [2410]
6 <u>2410.1</u>.

7 Section 2407. Sales locations.

8 [Except as provided in section 2410] <u>Subject to section</u> 9 <u>2410.1</u>, consumer fireworks shall be sold only from facilities 10 which are licensed by the Department of Agriculture and that 11 meet the following criteria:

12 (1) The facility shall comply with the provisions of the
13 act of November 10, 1999 (P.L.491, No.45), known as the
14 Pennsylvania Construction Code Act.

15 (2) The facility shall be a stand-alone, permanent16 structure.

17 (3) Storage areas shall be separated from wholesale or
18 retail sales areas to which a purchaser may be admitted by
19 appropriately rated fire separation.

20 (4) The facility shall be located no closer than 250
21 feet from a facility selling or dispensing gasoline, propane
22 or other flammable products.

(5) The facility shall be located at least 1,500 feetfrom another facility licensed to sell consumer fireworks.

25 (6) The facility shall have a monitored burglar and fire 26 alarm system.

27 (7) Quarterly fire drills and preplanning meetings shall
28 be conducted as required by the primary fire department.
29 Section 2408. Fees, granting of licenses and inspections.
30 (a) Initial application fees.--

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1 (1)An initial application for a license to sell 2 consumer fireworks shall be submitted to the Department of 3 Agriculture on forms prescribed and provided by the department with a nonrefundable application fee as follows: 4 5 (i) For a facility meeting the requirements of section 2407, the application shall be submitted with a 6 7 nonrefundable application fee of \$2,500. For a facility meeting the requirements of 8 [(ii)] 9 section 2410, the application shall be submitted with a 10 nonrefundable application fee of \$1,000 no later than 60 days prior to the first day of sale.] 11 12 (iii) For a facility meeting the requirements of section 2410.1, the application shall be submitted with a 13 14 nonrefundable application fee of \$1,000 on or before 60 15 days prior to the first day of sale. 16 An application under paragraph (1) shall also be (2) 17 accompanied by the appropriate annual license fee as provided 18 in subsection (b). 19 (b) Annual license fees.--The annual license fee for a 20 facility licensed to sell consumer fireworks shall be as 21 follows: 22 \$7,500 for a location up to 10,000 square feet; (1)23 (2) \$10,000 for a location greater than 10,000 and up to 24 15,000 square feet; 25 \$20,000 for a location greater than 15,000 square (3) 26 feet; and 27 [(4) \$3,000 for a temporary structure.] 28 (5) \$3,000 for a short-term structure. 29 (c) Time limitations and inspections.--30 (1) A facility meeting the requirements of section 2407

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shall be inspected by the Department of Agriculture within 30
 days of receipt of a complete application for a license. The
 Department of Agriculture shall issue or deny a license
 within 14 days of completing the inspection.

5 [(2) The Department of Agriculture shall issue or deny a 6 license for a facility meeting the requirements of section 7 2410 no later than 10 days prior to the first day of sale. 8 The facility shall be available for inspection by the 9 Department of Agriculture for compliance with NFPA 1124 at 10 all times during the licensed selling period.]

11 (3) The Department of Agriculture shall issue or deny a
 12 license for a facility meeting the requirements of section
 13 2410.1 no later than 10 days prior to the first day of sale.

14 <u>The facility shall be available for inspection by the</u>

15 <u>Department of Agriculture or a designee for compliance with</u>

16 <u>applicable regulations at all times during the licensed</u>

17 <u>selling period</u>.

18 (d) Term of license.--A license issued for the sale of 19 consumer fireworks shall be effective for one year from the date 20 the license is issued.

(e) License renewal and inspections.--License renewal shall be automatic upon payment of the appropriate annual license fee under subsection (b), but each facility shall be subject to annual inspections by the Department of Agriculture and at other times as the department may deem appropriate.

26 (f) Condition.--No license may be issued to a convicted 27 felon or to an entity in which a convicted felon owns a 28 percentage of the equity interest.

29 Section 2. Section 2410 of the act is repealed:

30 [Section 2410. Temporary structures.

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1	(a) ConditionsNotwithstanding section 2407 or any other
2	provision of law, a temporary structure may be licensed by the
3	Department of Agriculture to sell consumer fireworks if the
4	temporary structure meets all of the following requirements:

14	(4) The temporary structure complies with NFPA 1124 as
15	it relates to retail sales of consumer fireworks in temporary
16	structures.
17	(5) The temporary structure is located one of the
18	following distances from a permanent facility licensed to
19	sell consumer fireworks under the former act of May 15, 1939
20	(P.L.134, No.65), referred to as the Fireworks Law, at the
21	time of the effective date of this article:
22	(i) Prior to January 1, 2023, at least five miles.
23	(ii) Beginning January 1, 2023, at least two miles.
24	(6) The temporary structure does not exceed 2,500 square
25	feet.
26	(7) The temporary structure is secured at all times
27	during which consumer fireworks are displayed within the
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28	structure.
28	(8) The temporary structure has a minimum of \$2,000,000

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1	(9) The sales period is limited to June 15 through July
2	8 and December 21 through January 2 of each year.
3	(10) Consumer fireworks not on display for retail sale
4	are stored in an outdoor storage unit.
5	(b) LimitationsThe sale of consumer fireworks from the
6	temporary structure is limited to the following:
7	(1) Helicopter, Aerial Spinner (APA 87-1, 3.1.2.3).
8	(2) Roman Candle (APA 87-1, 3.1.2.4).
9	(3) Mine and shell devices not exceeding 500 grams.]
10	Section 3. The act is amended by adding a section to read:
11	Section 2410.1. Short-term structures.
12	(a) ConditionsNotwithstanding section 2407 or any other
13	provision of law, a short-term structure may be licensed by the
14	Department of Agriculture to sell consumer fireworks if the
15	short-term structure meets all of the following requirements:
16	(1) The short-term structure is located no closer than
17	250 feet from a facility storing, selling or dispensing
18	gasoline, propane or other flammable products.
19	(2) An evacuation plan is posted in a conspicuous
20	location for a short-term structure in accordance with
21	regulations of the Department of Agriculture.
22	(3) The outdoor storage unit, if any, is separated from
23	the wholesale or retail sales area to which a purchaser may
24	be admitted by appropriately rated fire separation.
25	(4) The short-term structure is located one of the
26	following distances from a permanent facility licensed to
27	sell consumer fireworks under the former act of May 15, 1939
28	(P.L.134, No.65), referred to as the Fireworks Law, as of
29	<u>October 30, 2017:</u>
30	(i) Prior to January 1, 2023, at least five miles.

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1	<u>(ii) Beginning January 1, 2023, at least two miles.</u>
2	(5) The short-term structure does not exceed 2,500
3	<u>square feet.</u>
4	(6) The short-term structure is secured at all times
5	during which consumer fireworks are displayed within the
6	<u>short-term structure.</u>
7	(7) The short-term structure has a minimum of \$2,000,000
8	in public and product liability insurance.
9	(8) The sales period is limited to June 15 through July
10	<u>8 and December 21 through January 2 of each year.</u>
11	(9) Consumer fireworks not on display for retail sale
12	<u>shall be stored in an outdoor storage unit.</u>
13	(b) LimitationsThe sale of consumer fireworks from the
14	short-term structure is limited to the following:
15	(1) Helicopter, Aerial Spinner (APA 87-1, 3.1.2.3).
16	(2) Roman Candle (APA 87-1, 3.1.2.4).
17	(3) Mine and shell devices not exceeding 500 grams.
18	Section 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

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
