## AN ACT

1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9	Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An act relating to the public school system, including certain provisions applicable as well to private and parochial schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," in school health services, further providing for health services and for vision screening and examinations, providing for eye health and vision examinations and further providing for examinations by examiners of own choice.
10	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
11	hereby enacts as follows:
12	Section 1. Sections 1402(a) and 1403.1(a), (b)(1) and (2)
13	and (d) of the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known as
14	the Public School Code of 1949, are amended to read:
15	Section 1402. Health Services(a) Each child of school
16	age shall be given by methods established by the Advisory Health
17	Board, (1) a hearing test by a school nurse or medical
18	technician, (1.1) a vision screening by school health personnel
19	or a screener or an eye health and vision examination by an
20	ophthalmologist or optometrist, and (2) a measurement of height
21	and weight by a school nurse or teacher, who shall use the

measurement to compute a child's weight-for-height ratio[, (3)
tests for tuberculosis under medical supervision, and (4) such
other tests as the Advisory Health Board may deem advisable to
protect the health of the child]. <u>A vision screening or an eye</u>
<u>health and vision examination shall be performed on an annual</u>
basis.

8 Section 1403.1. Vision Screening and Examinations.--(a) (1) 9 Prior to admission to school for the first time, a parent or 10 legal guardian shall present to the school entity or nonpublic school certification from [a primary care provider or vision 11 screener that the child has passed or failed a vision screening 12 13 performed by a primary care provider or a vision screening 14 conducted by screeners with specific training in vision screening techniques and protocols approved by the Department of 15 16 Health or has completed] an ophthalmologist or optometrist that the child has passed or failed a comprehensive eye health and 17 18 vision exam conducted by an ophthalmologist or optometrist 19 within the previous twelve months.

20 The Advisory Health Board shall promulgate regulations (2)to establish vision screening standards based on instrument-21 based vision screening technologies or visual acuity testing, 22 23 taking into consideration national guidelines from the American 24 Academy of Pediatrics, American Optometric Association and 25 American Association for Pediatric Ophthalmology and Strabismus. 26 [Every] Except as provided under section 1403.2, (b) (1)every school year at a school entity or nonpublic school, until 27 28 a child completes the fifth grade and at least every two years 29 thereafter until the child graduates from the twelfth grade, the 30 child shall have a vision screening performed by school health

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personnel or screeners with specific training in vision
 screening techniques and protocols approved by the Advisory
 Health Board. The results of the vision screening shall be
 supplied to the parent or legal guardian of the child.

5 (2) For a child who fails a required vision screening, a 6 comprehensive eye health and vision examination, performed by an 7 ophthalmologist or optometrist, shall also be required. 8 Notification of the parent or legal guardian of the failed screening shall be accompanied by notification of requirement 9 10 for a comprehensive eve health and vision examination that must be completed within one hundred twenty (120) days or before the 11 12 start of the next school year, whichever comes first, and a list of vision resources compiled by the Department of Health. 13 14 Notification may also include a form, to be completed by the 15 examining ophthalmologist or optometrist, to be used for 16 reporting the results of the examination. The report may 17 include, but not be limited to, the following:

18 (i) Date of report.

19 (ii) Name, address and date of birth of the child.

20 (iii) Name of the child's school.

21 A summary of significant findings, including best (iv) corrected visual acuity, diagnosis, treatment, prognosis and 22 23 whether or not a return visit is recommended and, if so, when. 24 Recommended educational adjustments for the child, if (V) 25 any, which may include preferential seating in the classroom, 26 eyeqlasses for full-time use in school, eyeqlasses for part-time use in school, sight-saving eyeglasses or any other 27 28 recommendations.

29 (vi) Name, address and signature of the examiner.
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1	(d) A school entity or nonpublic school shall not be
2	required to provide comprehensive eye health and vision
3	examinations or held financially responsible for the treatment
4	of a child who fails the required vision screening.

6	Section 2. The act is amended by adding a section to read:
7	Section 1403.2. Eye Health and Vision Examinations(a)
8	Except as provided under subsections (c) and (e), children of
9	school age in this Commonwealth shall be given an eye health and
10	vision examination:
11	(1) upon admission to school;
12	(2) while in the fourth grade;
13	(3) while in the eighth grade;
14	(4) as part of the evaluation of and prior to the student
15	becoming subject to 29 U.S.C. § 794 (relating to
16	nondiscrimination under Federal grants and programs); and
17	(5) as part of the evaluation of and prior to the student's
18	enrollment in a Title I reading program as defined by 20 U.S.C.
19	Ch. 70 Subch. I (relating to improving the academic achievement
20	of the disadvantaged).
21	(b) A school district or joint school board that institutes
22	an eye health and vision examination program under subsection
23	(c) shall be exempt from providing eye health and vision
24	examinations as required under subsection (a).
25	(c) A school district or joint school board may institute an
26	eye health and vision examination program for children of school
27	age. Before a school district or joint school board institutes
28	an eye health and vision examination program under this
29	subsection, the program shall be approved by the Secretary of
30	Health.

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1	(d) The parent or guardian of a child of school age shall
2	submit evidence that the child received an eye health and vision
3	examination in accordance with subsection (a).
4	(e) This section shall apply to a child who is enrolled in a
5	public or nonpublic school.
6	(f) As used in this section, the term "eye health and vision
7	examination" means an evaluation performed by an ophthalmologist
8	or optometrist that includes all of the following:
9	(1) An evaluation of vision history.
10	(2) An external and internal ophthalmic examination.
11	(3) An assessment of vision acuity, ocular alignment and
12	motility and refraction.
13	(4) An assessment of accommodation and binocular vision.
14	Section 3. Section 1407 of the act is amended to read:
15	Section 1407. Examinations by Examiners of Own ChoiceIn
16	lieu of the medical or dental examinations prescribed by this
17	article, any child of school age may furnish the local school
18	officials with a medical or dental report of examination made at
19	his own expense by his family physician [or], family dentist,
20	ophthalmologist or optometrist on a form approved by the
21	Secretary of Health for this purpose. The in lieu examinations
22	shall be made and the report shall be furnished prior to the
23	date fixed for the regularly scheduled examination but no
24	earlier than four months prior to the opening of the school term
25	during which the regular examination is scheduled.
26	Section 4. This act shall take effect in 60 days.

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
