AN ACT

- 1 Providing for sunscreen and sun-protective measures in schools 2 and youth camps.
- 3 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 4 hereby enacts as follows:
- 5 Section 1. Short title.
- 6 This act shall be known and may be cited as the Reducing UV
- 7 Exposure in Children Act.
- 8 Section 2. Findings and declarations.
- 9 The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:
- 10 (1) It is a high priority to ensure that children use
- 11 sunscreen and sun-protective clothing when outdoors. Children
- 12 are being exposed to UV radiation due to suboptimal sunscreen
- 13 use and high rates of sunburning and are therefore at risk of
- 14 excessive UV exposure which could lead to skin cancer
- development.
- 16 (2) News outlets have reported that some schools do not
- 17 allow children to bring or use sunscreen without a
- 18 prescription due to medication bans and fears of legal

- 1 ramifications.
- 2 (3) The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
- 3 believes that school policies that prohibit hats or student
- 4 possession of sunscreen can create barriers to the use of
- 5 important sun protection methods.
- 6 (4) The United States Preventive Services Task Force
- 7 recommends educating children, adolescents and young adults
- 8 on the dangers of sun exposure to reduce the risk of skin
- 9 cancer.
- 10 (5) It is in the public's interest that schools set
- 11 policies that include education on sun exposure and encourage
- our youths to use sun protection, including sunscreen and
- 13 sun-protective clothing.
- 14 Section 3. Definitions.
- The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
- 16 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
- 17 context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 18 "Operator." The chief administrator or principal of a school
- 19 or youth camp.
- "School." A school in a school district, charter school,
- 21 regional charter school, cyber charter school, intermediate unit
- 22 or career and technical school in this Commonwealth.
- 23 "Youth camp." An entity that exists for the primary purposes
- 24 of providing outdoor living experiences for children and youth
- 25 through an organized program with social, recreational or
- 26 educational objectives.
- 27 Section 4. Sun-protective measures in schools and youth camps.
- 28 (a) School.--A student may possess and use a topical
- 29 sunscreen product while on school property or at a school-
- 30 sponsored event or activity without a physician's note or

- 1 prescription if the product is regulated by the United States
- 2 Food and Drug Administration for over-the-counter use for the
- 3 purpose of limiting ultraviolet light-induced skin damage.
- 4 (b) Youth camp. -- A participant in a youth camp may possess
- 5 and use a topical sunscreen product while attending a youth camp
- 6 without a physician's note or prescription if the product is
- 7 regulated by the United States Food and Drug Administration for
- 8 over-the-counter use for the purpose of limiting ultraviolet
- 9 light-induced skin damage.
- 10 (c) Application. -- A school district or youth camp operator
- 11 may allow school or youth camp personnel to assist students in
- 12 applying a topical sunscreen product with parental permission.
- 13 (d) Liability.--School or youth camp personnel may not be
- 14 held liable in a criminal action or for civil damages for
- 15 application of a topical sunscreen product if the topical
- 16 sunscreen product is available to and used by the student or
- 17 youth camp participant in accordance with this section.
- 18 (e) Sun-protective clothing. -- Each school or youth camp
- 19 shall allow for outdoor use articles of sun-protective clothing,
- 20 including, but not limited to, hats. A school or youth camp may
- 21 set a policy relating to the type of sun-protective clothing,
- 22 including, but not limited to, hats, that will be allowed to be
- 23 used outdoors under this section. Specific clothing and hats
- 24 determined by school or youth camp personnel to be inappropriate
- 25 apparel may be prohibited by the dress code policy.
- 26 Section 5. Sun-Safe Education.
- Notwithstanding any other provision of law, all schools may
- 28 incorporate instruction in the common school grades four through
- 29 twelve utilizing existing, free resources on skin cancer
- 30 prevention. The instruction shall be provided in an age-

- 1 appropriate manner and shall include the following components:
- 2 (1) The basic facts about skin cancer, including the
- 3 negative impact of human exposure to ultraviolet radiation
- 4 obtained through sunburns and indoor tanning.
- 5 (2) A comprehensive set of strategies and behaviors to
- 6 reduce the risk of contracting skin cancer, including the use
- 7 of sunscreen and sun-protective clothing.
- 8 Section 6. Effective date.
- 9 This act shall take effect in 60 days.
