## A RESOLUTION

- Recognizing the month of March 2022 as "National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, Colorectal cancer is a type of cancer that starts in
- 4 the colon or rectum, both of which are parts of the large
- 5 intestine and the body's digestive system; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Colorectal cancer often begins as an abnormal growth
- 7 called a polyp, which may form on the inner wall of the colon or
- 8 rectum; and
- 9 WHEREAS, In addition to colorectal polyps, risk factors of
- 10 colorectal cancer include increasing age, family history,
- 11 certain genetic mutations, excessive alcohol use, obesity,
- 12 physical inactivity, cigarette smoking and history of
- 13 inflammatory bowel disease; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Symptoms of developing colorectal cancer include
- 15 changes in bowel habits, rectal bleeding, stomach pains or
- 16 cramps, weakness and unexplained weight loss; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of

- 1 cancer-related death in the United States, with more than 50,000
- 2 Americans dying every year; and
- 3 WHEREAS, Unprecedented progress has been made in the last
- 4 decade in reducing colorectal cancer incidence and death rates,
- 5 largely due to prevention and early detection through screening;
- 6 and
- WHEREAS, In May 2021, the recommended age to initiate
- 8 screening was lowered from age 50 to 45 because of the rising
- 9 number of cases in younger people; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Screening may begin earlier than age 45 for
- 11 individuals with a family history of colon polyps or colorectal
- 12 cancer; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Since 2000, March has been celebrated as "National
- 14 Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month" by advocacy groups, public
- 15 officials, health care providers and patients; and
- 16 WHEREAS, During this month, participants generate widespread
- 17 awareness about colorectal cancer by wearing blue, holding
- 18 fundraising and education events, talking to family and friends
- 19 about screening and so much more; therefore be it
- 20 RESOLVED, That the Senate recognize the month of March 2022
- 21 as "National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania;
- 22 and be it further
- 23 RESOLVED, That the Senate join advocates nationwide in urging
- 24 the residents of this Commonwealth to follow preventative
- 25 measures such as:
- 26 (1) Increasing the intensity and amount of physical
- 27 activity.
- 28 (2) Maintaining a healthy weight.
- 29 (3) Quitting smoking.
- 30 (4) Limiting alcohol intake.

- 1 (5) Eating healthy fruits, vegetables and whole grains.
- 2 (6) Reducing the intake of red meat and avoiding
- 3 processed meat.
- 4 (7) Beginning regular screenings at 45 years of age and earlier for those individuals at higher risk.
- 6 (8) Consulting with a doctor about tests for detecting
- 7 cancer and precancer, such as a colonoscopy, virtual
- 8 colonoscopy, flexible sigmoidoscopy, fecal occult blood test,
- 9 fecal immunochemical test and stool DNA test;
- 10 and be it further
- 11 RESOLVED, That the Senate urge its members, the Department of
- 12 Health and health care professionals across this Commonwealth to
- 13 recognize "National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month" in
- 14 Pennsylvania to increase awareness about the disease and educate
- 15 residents on the important preventative steps that they can
- 16 take.
