A RESOLUTION

- Designating the month of September 2020 as "Brain Aneurysm Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, An unruptured brain aneurysm can lead to double
- 4 vision, vision loss, loss of sensation, weakness, loss of
- 5 balance, incoordination and speech problems; and
- 6 WHEREAS, A brain aneurysm is often discovered when it
- 7 ruptures and causes a subarachnoid hemorrhage; and
- 8 WHEREAS, A subarachnoid hemorrhage can lead to brain damage,
- 9 hydrocephalus, stroke and death; and
- 10 WHEREAS, According to the National Institutes of Health, each
- 11 year more than 30,000 people in the United States suffer from
- 12 ruptured brain aneurysms; and
- 13 WHEREAS, As a result, 40% of these people die, with 25% dying
- 14 within 24 hours and an additional 25% dying from complications
- 15 within 6 months; and
- 16 WHEREAS, Annually, between 3,000 and 4,500 people in the
- 17 United States with ruptured brain aneurysms die before reaching

- 1 the hospital; and
- 2 WHEREAS, Early detection can save lives and a number of
- 3 advancements have been made in recent years regarding the
- 4 detection of aneurysms, including the computerized tomography
- 5 scan, the magnetic resonance imaging test and the cerebral
- 6 arteriogram; and
- 7 WHEREAS, Various research studies are currently being
- 8 conducted in the United States to better understand, prevent and
- 9 treat brain aneurysms; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Numerous organizations serve as global leaders for
- 11 brain aneurysm awareness, education, support, advocacy and
- 12 research funding; therefore be it
- 13 RESOLVED, That the Senate designate the month of September
- 14 2020 as "Brain Aneurysm Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.
