## A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1	Commemorating the 200th session of the General Assembly.
2	WHEREAS, The Provincial Assembly of the colony of
3	Pennsylvania first convened on December 4, 1682, in Upland, a
4	settlement on the land area where the Chester Creek entered the
5	Delaware River; and
6	WHEREAS, Operating as a unicameral body, the General Assembly
7	was enshrined in William Penn's 1682 Frame of Government as
8	having lawmaking powers that significantly expanded public
9	administration of the provincial government; and
10	WHEREAS, The Pennsylvania Constitution in 1776 granted
11	legislative power of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to the
12	Pennsylvania Assembly, creating a unicameral House of
13	Representatives; and
14	WHEREAS, The 1790 Constitution of Pennsylvania established a

15 bicameral legislature, providing for a General Assembly

consisting of a Senate and a House of Representatives; and
WHEREAS, The General Assembly met for 102 sessions, annually,
from 1776 through 1878; and

WHEREAS, During that period, as the second colony to ratify the Constitution of the United States and attain statehood on December 12, 1787, in recognition of its notable contributions to the developing Federal Government, Pennsylvania became known as the Keystone State; and

9 WHEREAS, As a result of a new State Constitution in 1874, the 10 General Assembly met for 40 two-year sessions, starting in 1879 11 and lasting until 1958; and

12 WHEREAS, In 1959, the General Assembly, on recommendation by 13 the Commission on Constitutional Revision, amended the Constitution and returned to counting each subsequent calendar 14 15 year, 58 in total, as one distinct legislative session; and 16 WHEREAS, In the span of 200 sessions, the General Assembly has continued its service to the citizens of this great 17 18 Commonwealth through times of peace and war and diverse periods 19 of social, political and institutional change; and

20 WHEREAS, To further ensure the continuity of legislative 21 sessions, the General Assembly has been called to order in town 22 halls, inns, and taverns and convened in sites including the 23 original State House in Philadelphia, now known as Independence 24 Hall, the Lancaster County Courthouse, and the Dauphin County 25 Courthouse, the Redbrick Capitol, Grace United Methodist Church 26 and the Cobb Capitol in the City of Harrisburg; and

27 WHEREAS, The finely appointed chambers, offices, corridors 28 and other public spaces of the present Pennsylvania State 29 Capitol, conceived by architect Joseph Huston as "A Palace of 30 Art," are timelessly suited for the General Assembly's purpose

2 WHEREAS, The 200th session of the General Assembly began on 3 January 5, 2016, when the Senate and the House of 4 Representatives observed the first day of the second year of the 5 2015-2016 legislative session; therefore be it

6 RESOLVED (the House of Representatives concurring), That the 7 General Assembly commemorate the 200th legislative session; and 8 be it further

9 RESOLVED, That the 253 members of the General Assembly, men 10 and women representing all 67 counties of our Commonwealth, 11 reflect on our unique historical influences and proudly note the 12 steadfast and distinguished service of successive generations of 13 lawmakers; and be it further

14 RESOLVED, That the elected representatives of the General 15 Assembly sustain the vital role of our Commonwealth, as the 16 Keystone of our nation, in American history.
