A RESOLUTION

- Designating the week of April 18 through 24, 2021, as "Time to Acknowledge Military Sexual Assault Survivors Week" in
- 3 Pennsylvania.
- WHEREAS, The United States Department of Defense's 2018
- 5 Annual Report on Sexual Assault in the Military revealed that
- 6 20,500 United States Armed Forces members, comprised of 13,000
- 7 women and 7,500 men, were victims of military sexual assault;
- 8 and
- 9 WHEREAS, Shame and stigma create a barrier to reporting
- 10 sexual assault; and
- 11 WHEREAS, On average, only one out of every three sexual
- 12 assault survivors come forward to report the assault; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Even though women make up only 20% of the United
- 14 States Armed Forces members, they are the targets of 63% of
- 15 sexual assaults; and
- 16 WHEREAS, Sexual assault in the military is not only a women's
- 17 issue; and
- 18 WHEREAS, More than 100,000 men have been sexually assaulted

- 1 in the military in recent decades; and
- 2 WHEREAS, In today's military, rape culture is an epidemic and
- 3 military sexual survivors are often forgotten; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Many military sexual assault survivors, prior to
- 5 being assaulted, had dreams of serving for 20 or more years in
- 6 the United States Armed Services and were happy in their
- 7 workplace; and
- 8 WHEREAS, While some military sexual assault survivors may
- 9 choose to stay in the military, the psychological impact of the
- 10 assault and resulting trauma can push survivors out of the
- 11 service and lead to tremendous difficulty readjusting to their
- 12 civilian lives; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Survivors of military sexual assault often decide
- 14 not to report the assault for the reasons of embarrassment, fear
- 15 and shame and professional and personal implications; and
- 16 WHEREAS, The military's culture of duty, teamwork, strength
- 17 and accomplishment conflicts with a military sexual assault
- 18 survivor's needs, resulting in them being stigmatized as weak or
- 19 failing their fellow service members; and
- 20 WHEREAS, The uniqueness of military life causes additional
- 21 anxiety to a sexual assault survivor and complicates the
- 22 survivor's life, which may result in lack of promotion or
- 23 removal from service; and
- 24 WHEREAS, United States Navy veterans Lauren DelRicci and
- 25 Timothy Jones, both from the Pittsburgh area, described their
- 26 sexual assault experiences in the military that resulted in
- 27 personal trauma, suffering and their military careers being cut
- 28 short; and
- 29 WHEREAS, Their personal stories underscore the need for
- 30 meaningful change to provide healing to those affected by

- 1 military sexual assault trauma through adequate medical and
- 2 mental health services; and
- 3 WHEREAS, To highlight the epidemic of sexual assault in the
- 4 United States Armed Forces, policymakers should initiate an
- 5 examination of military culture and military justice at the
- 6 Statewide level; and
- 7 WHEREAS, In this Commonwealth, the Department of Military and
- 8 Veterans Affairs, local veterans' centers and United States
- 9 Department of Veterans Affairs medical centers are able to offer
- 10 resources for military sexual assault survivors; and
- 11 WHEREAS, The Senate must honor the strength, resolve and
- 12 perseverance of military sexual assault survivors and work
- 13 urgently to end sexual violence in the military throughout this
- 14 Commonwealth; therefore be it
- 15 RESOLVED, That the Senate designate the week of April 18
- 16 through 24, 2021, as "Time to Acknowledge Military Sexual
- 17 Assault Survivors Week" in Pennsylvania.
