It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 34-18 of the General Laws entitled "Residential Landlord and

Tenant Act" is hereby amended by adding thereto the following section:

34-18-19.1. Landlord payment of fuel oil. – Upon termination of a tenancy under this

chapter, a landlord shall reimburse the tenant for the value of any fuel oil remaining on the

5 premises as of the last day of the rental agreement upon the tenant providing a valid receipt or

6 other form of written proof of actual cost to the tenant. The landlord shall be given credit at the

7 <u>beginning of the rental agreement for any amount of fuel oil on the premises as measured and</u>

8 documented at the time the tenant takes possession of the premises. Any amount owed to the

9 tenant as a result of this section can be used to offset any amounts owed to the landlord for unpaid

accrued rent and/or the amount of physical damages to the premises, other than normal wear and

tear, which the landlord has suffered by reason of the tenant's noncompliance with section 34-18-

12 24, all as itemized by the landlord in a written notice delivered to the tenant. The landlord shall

deliver the notice together with any amount owed to the tenant within twenty (20) days after the

14 <u>tenant requests reimbursement.</u>

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon passage.

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EXPLANATION

BY THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

OF

AN ACT

RELATING TO PROPERTY -- RESIDENTIAL LANDLORD AND TENANT ACT

This act would require a landlord to pay a departing tenant the value of fuel oil left in the tank upon the tenant vacating the premises, provided that the tenant produce a valid receipt or other form of proof of the actual costs to the tenant.

This act would take effect upon passage.

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
