## SENATE BILL NO. 156

- FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to require a minimum amount of paid sick leave for
  employees.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF SOUTH DAKOTA:
- 4 Section 1. That chapter 60-11 be amended by adding thereto a NEW SECTION to read as
- 5 follows:
- 6 Each employer shall provide an employee, who is continuously employed by the employer
- 7 for ninety days or more, with a minimum of one hour of paid sick leave for every thirty hours
- 8 an employee works. The paid sick leave shall begin to accrue on the employee's ninety-first day
- 9 of employment. The employee may use the paid sick leave for the employee's, the employee's
- 10 spouse, or the employee's child:
- 11 (1) Illness, injury, or health condition;
- Medical diagnosis, care, or treatment for a mental or physical illness, injury, or health
  condition; or
- 14 (3) Preventive medical care.

15 The employee may use the paid sick leave when the employee is a victim of domestic abuse

1 or sexual violence for obtaining medical or psychological care, obtaining services from a victim 2 services organization, relocation, or for participation in any civil or criminal legal proceedings. 3 The employer may require the employee to provide up to seven days notice of intent to use 4 paid sick leave if the reason for taking the leave is foreseeable, and may require that the 5 employee provide notice of intent to use paid sick leave as soon as practicable if the reason for 6 taking the leave is not foreseeable. The employer may require the employee to provide 7 documentation to verify the reason for taking sick leave if the leave is for three or more 8 consecutive days.
