FISCAL MEMORANDUM

HB 1364 - SB 1166

March 12, 2019

**SUMMARY OF ORIGINAL BILL:** Deletes and rewrites the criminal offense of female genital mutilation. Extends the statute of limitations for criminal prosecutions or civil actions for female genital mutilation of a minor.

FISCAL IMPACT OF ORIGINAL BILL:

NOT SIGNIFICANT

**SUMMARY OF AMENDMENT (005712):** Deletes and replaces language in the bill such that the only substantive change is to specify that body piercing pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. § 62-38-3 is not female genital mutilation when performed on a consenting adult.

**FISCAL IMPACT OF BILL WITH PROPOSED AMENDMENT:**

**Unchanged from the original fiscal note.**


Assumptions for the bill as amended:

- Pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. § 39-13-110(a), female genital mutilation is a Class D felony.
- Based on information provided by the Department of Correction (DOC), there have been zero admissions for female genital mutilation over the last 10 years.
- The proposed legislation does not create a new felony, broaden a felony offense or increase classification. Therefore, any impact to the DOC is estimated to be not significant.
- The proposed legislation authorizes a person to be prosecuted, tried, and punished for female genital mutilation of a minor victim occurring on or after July 1, 2019, no later than 25 years after the minor turns 18.
- Any impact to state or local government resulting from extending the statute of limitations is estimated to be not significant.
