

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 504

WHEREAS, Mr. Peach admirably illuminates the personal faith of Thomas Jefferson as the basis for his steadfast commitment to religious liberty; and

WHEREAS, John Peach's expertise in genealogy and biography was used to great effect in order to deepen the historical accuracy of the book's portrayal of Thomas Jefferson; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Peach was born in Nashville, Tennessee, and has resided in Knoxville, Tennessee for the past twenty years; and

WHEREAS, John Peach used his experience as a pastor and genealogist to bring a fresh perspective to one of America's foremost founders; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Peach's effort to examine the life of Thomas Jefferson and his tremendous commitment to the invaluable right to religious liberty should be specially recognized; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE, that we hereby honor and extol the book *Thomas Jefferson Roots of Religious Freedom* and its author, John Harding Peach, for a thoughtful contribution to the history of United States of America and Tennessee through an examination of the life of Thomas Jefferson and his commitment to religious freedom.
