A BILL

To provide for the administration of Port Chicago Naval Magazine National Memorial as a unit of the National Park System, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Port Chicago Naval
- 5 Magazine National Memorial Enhancement Act of 2009".

1 SEC. 2. PORT CHICAGO NAVAL MAGAZINE NATIONAL ME-

- 3 Section 203 of the Port Chicago National Memorial
- 4 Act of 1992 (Public Law 102–562; 16 U.S.C. 431; 106
- 5 Stat. 4235) is amended—
- 6 (1) by redesignating subsection (c) as sub-
- 7 section (f);
- 8 (2) by inserting after subsection (b) the fol-
- 9 lowing new subsections:
- 10 "(c) Administration.—The Secretary of the Inte-
- 11 rior shall administer the Port Chicago Naval Magazine
- 12 National Memorial as a unit of the National Park System
- 13 in accordance with this Act and laws generally applicable
- 14 to units of the National Park System, including the Na-
- 15 tional Park Service Organic Act (39 Stat. 535; 16 U.S.C.
- 16 1 et seq.) and the Act of August 21, 1935 (49 Stat. 666;
- 17 16 U.S.C. 461 et seq.). Land transferred to the adminis-
- 18 trative jurisdiction of the Secretary of the Interior under
- 19 subsection (d) shall be administered in accordance with
- 20 this subsection.
- 21 "(d) Transfer of Land.—The Secretary of De-
- 22 fense shall transfer a parcel of land, consisting of approxi-
- 23 mately 5 acres, depicted within the proposed boundary on
- 24 the map titled 'Port Chicago Naval Magazine National
- 25 Memorial, Proposed Boundary', numbered 018/80,001,
- 26 and dated August 2005, to the administrative jurisdiction

of the Secretary of the Interior if the Secretary of Defense 2 determines that— 3 "(1) the land is excess to military needs; and "(2) all environmental remediation actions nec-4 5 essary to respond to environmental contamination 6 related to the land have been completed in accord-7 ance with the Comprehensive Environmental Re-8 sponse, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980 (42) 9 U.S.C. 9601 et seq.) and other applicable laws. 10 "(e) AGREEMENT WITH CITY OF CONCORD AND EAST BAY REGIONAL PARK DISTRICT.—The Secretary of 12 the Interior is authorized to enter into an agreement with the City of Concord, California, and the East Bay Regional Park District, to establish and operate a facility 14 15 for visitor orientation and parking, administrative offices, and curatorial storage for the Memorial."; and 16 17 (3) in subsection (f), (as redesignated by para-18 graph (1)), by striking "Secretary of the Navy to 19 provide public access to the Memorial." and insert-20 ing "Secretary of Defense to provide as much public 21 access as possible to the Memorial without inter-22 fering with military needs.".

1	SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS ON REMEDIATION AND RE-
2	PAIR OF PORT CHICAGO NAVAL MAGAZINE
3	NATIONAL MEMORIAL.
4	(a) Remediation.—It is the sense of Congress that
5	in order to facilitate the land transfer described in sub-
6	section (d) of section 203 of the Port Chicago National
7	Memorial Act of 1992, as added by section 2, the Sec-
8	retary of Defense should promptly remediate remaining
9	environmental contamination related to the land.
10	(b) Repair.—It is the sense of Congress that, in
11	order to preserve the Port Chicago Naval Magazine Na-
12	tional Memorial for future generations, the Secretary of
13	Defense and the Secretary of the Interior should work to-
14	gether to—
15	(1) repair storm damage to the Port Chicago
16	site; and
17	(2) develop a process by which future repairs
18	and necessary modifications to the site can be
19	achieved in as timely and cost-effective a manner as
20	possible

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
