Mr. FORTENBERRY introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

A BILL

To amend title 31, United States Code, to restore the 10 year statute of limitations applicable to collection of debt by administrative offset, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. RESTORATION OF STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 3716(e) of title 31,
5 United States Code, is amended to read as follows:

6 “(e) This section does not apply—

7 “(1) to a claim under this subchapter that has
8 been outstanding for more than 10 years; or

1 “(2) when a statute explicitly prohibits using
2 administrative offset or setoff to collect the claim or
3 type of claim involved.”.

4 (b) RETROACTIVITY.—In the administration of sec-
5 tion 3716(e) of title 31, United States Code, as amended
6 by subsection (a), the following provisions of law shall be
7 treated as if they had never been enacted:

8 (1) Section 14219 of the Food, Conservation,
9 and Energy Act of 2008 (Public Law 110–234; 122
10 Stat. 1483), repealed as duplicative enactment by
11 section 4 of Public Law 110–246 (7 U.S.C. 8701
12 note).

13 (2) Section 14219 of the Food, Conservation,
14 and Energy Act of 2008 (Public Law 110–246; 122
15 Stat. 2245).

16 **SEC. 2. LIMITATION ON USE OF FUNDS.**

17 The Commissioner of Social Security shall not use
18 any funds to seek an administrative offset pursuant to sec-
19 tion 3716 of title 31, United States Code, for collection
20 of a debt or claim arising out of a benefit payment under
21 title II of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 401 et
22 seq.)—

23 (1) from a child (as defined in section 216(e)
24 of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 416(e))) of the
25 beneficiary, when such child is without fault;

1 (2) from an individual who had not attained the
2 age of 18 years on the date such debt or claim
3 arose; or

4 (3) where such debt or claim has been out-
5 standing for more than 10 years.

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
