A BILL

- To require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint coins in commemoration of the bicentennial of the writing of the Star-Spangled Banner, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Star-Spangled Banner
- 5 Commemorative Coin Act".

1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

2 The Congress finds as follows:

3 (1) During the Battle for Baltimore of the War
4 of 1812, Francis Scott Key visited the British fleet
5 in the Chesapeake Bay on September 7, 1814, to se6 cure the release of Dr. William Beanes, who had
7 been captured after the British burned Washington,
8 DC.

9 (2) The release of Dr. Beanes was secured, but
10 Key and Beanes were held by the British during the
11 shelling of Fort McHenry, one of the forts defending
12 Baltimore.

(3) On the morning of September 14, 1814,
after the 25-hour British bombardment of Fort
McHenry, Key peered through the clearing smoke to
see a 42-foot by 30-foot American flag flying proudly atop the Fort.

(4) He was so inspired to see the enormous flag
still flying over the Fort that he began penning a
song, which he named *The Defence of Fort McHenry*,
to commemorate the occasion and he included a note
that it should be sung to the tune of the popular
British melody *To Anacreon in Heaven*.

24 (5) In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson or25 dered that the anthem, which had been popularly re-

named the Star-Spangled Banner, be played at mili-
tary and naval occasions.
(6) On March 3, 1931, President Herbert Hoo-
ver signed a resolution of Congress that officially
designated the Star-Spangled Banner as the Na-
tional Anthem of the United States.
SEC. 3. COIN SPECIFICATIONS.
(a) \$1 SILVER COINS.—The Secretary of the Treas-
ury (hereafter in this Act referred to as the "Secretary")
shall mint and issue the following coins in commemoration
of the bicentennial of the writing of the Star-Spangled
Banner:
(1) \$5 GOLD COINS.—Not more than 100,000
\$5 coins, which shall—
(A) weigh 8.359 grams;

16	(B) have a diameter of 0.850 inches; and
17	(C) contain 90 percent gold and 10 percent
18	alloy.

(2) \$1 SILVER COINS.—Not more than 500,000 \$1 coins, which shall—

(A) weigh 26.73 grams; (B) have a diameter of 1.500 inches; and (C) contain 90 percent silver and 10 per-cent copper.

12 Banner:

(b) LEGAL TENDER.—The coins minted under this
 Act shall be legal tender, as provided in section 5103 of
 title 31, United States Code.

4 (c) NUMISMATIC ITEMS.—For purposes of sections
5 5134 and 5136 of title 31, United States Code, all coins
6 minted under this Act shall be considered to be numis7 matic items.

8 SEC. 4. DESIGN OF COINS.

9 (a) DESIGN REQUIREMENTS.—

10 (1) IN GENERAL.—The design of the coins
11 minted under this Act shall be emblematic of the
12 War of 1812 and particularly the Battle for Balti13 more that formed the basis for the *Star-Spangled*14 *Banner*.

15 (2) DESIGNATION AND INSCRIPTIONS.—On
16 each coin minted under this Act, there shall be—

(A) a designation of the value of the coin;
(B) an inscription of the year "2012"; and
(C) inscriptions of the words "Liberty",
"In God We Trust", "United States of America", and "E Pluribus Unum".

(b) SELECTION.—The design for the coins mintedunder this Act shall be—

(1) selected by the Secretary, after consultation
 with the Maryland War of 1812 Bicentennial Com mission and the Commission of Fine Arts; and

4 (2) reviewed by the Citizens Coinage Advisory5 Committee.

6 SEC. 5. ISSUANCE OF COINS.

7 (a) QUALITY OF COINS.—Coins minted under this8 Act shall be issued in uncirculated and proof qualities.

9 (b) MINT FACILITY.—Only one facility of the United
10 States Mint may be used to strike any particular quality
11 of the coins minted under this Act.

(c) PERIOD FOR ISSUANCE.—The Secretary may
issue coins under this Act only during the calendar year
beginning on January 1, 2012.

15 SEC. 6. SALE OF COINS.

(a) SALE PRICE.—The coins issued under this Act
shall be sold by the Secretary at a price equal to the sum
of—

19 (1) the face value of the coins;

20 (2) the surcharge provided in section 7 with re-21 spect to such coins; and

(3) the cost of designing and issuing the coins
(including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery,
overhead expenses, marketing, and shipping).

(b) BULK SALES.—The Secretary shall make bulk
 sales of the coins issued under this Act at a reasonable
 discount.

4 (c) Prepaid Orders.—

5 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall accept
6 prepaid orders for the coins minted under this Act
7 before the issuance of such coins.

8 (2) DISCOUNT.—Sale prices with respect to pre9 paid orders under paragraph (1) shall be at a rea10 sonable discount.

11 SEC. 7. SURCHARGES.

12 (a) IN GENERAL.—All sales of coins issued under this
13 Act shall include a surcharge of—

14 (1) \$35 per coin for the \$5 coin; and

15 (2) \$10 per coin for the \$1 coin.

16 (b) DISTRIBUTION.—Subject to section 5134(f) of 17 title 31, United States Code, all surcharges received by 18 the Secretary from the sale of coins issued under this Act shall be paid to the Maryland War of 1812 Bicentennial 19 Commission for the purpose of supporting bicentennial ac-20 21 tivities, educational outreach activities (including sup-22 porting scholarly research and the development of exhib-23 its), and preservation and improvement activities per-24 taining to the sites and structures relating to the War of 1812. 25

(c) AUDITS.—The Comptroller General of the United
 States shall have the right to examine such books, records,
 documents, and other data of the Maryland War of 1812
 Bicentennial Commission as may be related to the expend itures of amounts paid under subsection (b).

(d) LIMITATION.—Notwithstanding subsection (a), 6 7 no surcharge may be included with respect to the issuance under this Act of any coin during a calendar year if, as 8 9 of the time of such issuance, the issuance of such coin would result in the number of commemorative coin pro-10 11 grams issued during such year to exceed the annual 2 12 commemorative coin program issuance limitation under 13 section 5112(m)(1) of title 31, United States Code (as in 14 effect on the date of the enactment of this Act). The Sec-15 retary of the Treasury may issue guidance to carry out this subsection. 16

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
