Resolved, That the bill from the House of Representatives (H.R. 2471) entitled "An Act to measure the progress of post-disaster recovery and efforts to address corruption, governance, rule of law, and media freedoms in Haiti.", do pass with the following

AMENDMENT:

Strike all after the enacting clause and insert the following:

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Haiti Development, Ac3 countability, and Institutional Transparency Initiative
4 Act".

- 5 SEC. 2. STATEMENT OF POLICY.
- 6 It is the policy of the United States to support the sus7 tainable rebuilding and development of Haiti in a manner
 8 that—

1	(1) recognizes Haitian independence, self-reli-
2	ance, and sovereignty;
3	(2) promotes efforts that are led by and support
4	the people and Government of Haiti at all levels so
5	that Haitians lead the course of reconstruction and
6	development of Haiti;
7	(3) contributes to international efforts to facili-
8	tate conditions for broad, inclusive, and sustained po-
9	litical dialogue among the different actors in Haiti to
10	restore democratic legitimacy and institutions in
11	Haiti;
12	(4) builds the long-term capacity of the Govern-
13	ment of Haiti, civil society, and the private sector to
14	foster economic opportunities in Haiti;
15	(5) fosters collaboration between the Haitian di-
16	aspora in the United States, including dual citizens
17	of Haiti and the United States, and the Government
18	of Haiti and the business community in Haiti;
19	(6) supports anticorruption efforts, promotes
20	press freedom, and addresses human rights concerns,
21	including through the enforcement of sanctions im-
22	posed in accordance with the Global Magnitsky
23	Human Rights Accountability Act (subtitle F of title
24	XII of Public Law 114–328; 22 U.S.C. 2656 note) on

1	individuals implicated in human rights violations
2	and corruption;
3	(7) respects and helps restore the natural re-
4	sources of Haiti and strengthens community-level re-
5	silience to environmental and weather-related im-
6	pacts;
7	(8) promotes political stability through the hold-
8	ing of free, fair, transparent, and timely elections in
9	accordance with democratic principles and the Con-
10	stitution of Haiti;
11	(9) provides timely and comprehensive reporting
12	on the goals and progress of the Government of Haiti
13	and the United States Government, and transparent
14	post-program evaluations and contracting data; and
15	(10) promotes the participation of Haitian
16	women and youth in governmental and nongovern-
17	mental institutions and in economic development and
18	governance assistance programs funded by the United
19	States.
20	SEC. 3. DEFINITION OF APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL
21	COMMITTEES.
22	In this Act, the term "appropriate congressional com-
23	mittees" means—
24	(1) the Committee on Foreign Relations and the
25	Committee on Appropriations of the Senate; and

(2) the Committee on Foreign Affairs and the
 Committee on Appropriations of the House of Rep resentatives.

4 SEC.4.STRENGTHENINGHUMANRIGHTSAND5ANTICORRUPTIONEFFORTSINHAITIAND6HOLDINGPERPETRATORSOFTHELASALINE7MASSACREACCOUNTABLE.

8 (a) PRIORITIZATION BY SECRETARY OF STATE.—The
9 Secretary of State shall prioritize the protection of human
10 rights and anticorruption efforts in Haiti through the fol11 lowing methods:

(1) Fostering strong relationships with independent civil society groups focused on monitoring
corruption and human rights abuses and promoting
democracy in Haiti.

16 (2) Supporting the efforts of the Government of
17 Haiti to identify persons involved in human rights
18 violations and significant acts of corruption in Haiti,
19 including public and private sector actors, and hold
20 them accountable for their actions.

21 (3) Addressing concerns of impunity for the al22 leged perpetrators of and the individuals who orga23 nized and planned the massacre in La Saline that
24 took place on November 13, 2018.

1	(4) Urging authorities to continue to investigate
2	attacks in the neighborhoods of La Saline and Bel Air
3	in 2018 and 2019 that left dozens dead in order to
4	bring the perpetrators to justice.
5	(b) Briefing.—
6	(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after
7	the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary
8	shall brief the appropriate congressional committees
9	on the events that took place on November 13, 2018,
10	in the neighborhood of La Saline, in Port-au-Prince,
11	Haiti, and the aftermath of those events.
12	(2) ELEMENTS.—The briefing required by para-
13	graph (1) shall include the following:
14	(A) An examination of any links between
15	the massacre in La Saline and mass protests
16	that occurred concurrently in Haiti.
17	(B) An analysis of the reports on the mas-
18	sacre in La Saline authored by the United Na-
19	tions, the European Union, and the Government
20	of Haiti.
21	(C) A detailed description of all known per-
22	petrators of and the individuals who organized
23	and planned the massacre.
24	(D) An overview of efforts of the Govern-
25	ment of Haiti to bring the perpetrators of and

1	the individuals who organized and planned the
2	massacre in La Saline to justice and to prevent
3	other similar attacks.
4	(E) An assessment of the ensuing treatment
5	and displacement of the survivors of the mas-
6	sacre in La Saline.
7	(3) Consultation.—In carrying out paragraph
8	(1), the Secretary shall consult with nongovernmental
9	organizations in Haiti and the United States.
10	SEC. 5. PROMOTING FREEDOM OF THE PRESS AND ASSEM-
11	BLY IN HAITI.
12	The Secretary of State shall prioritize the promotion
13	of freedom of the press and freedom of assembly and the
14	protection of journalists in Haiti through the following
15	methods:
16	(1) Advocating to Haitian authorities for in-
17	creased protection for journalists and the press and
18	for the freedom to peacefully assemble or protest in
19	Haiti.
20	(2) Collaborating with officials of the Govern-
21	ment of Haiti and representatives of civil society to
22	increase legal protections for journalists in Haiti.
23	(3) Supporting efforts to strengthen transparency
24	in the public and private sectors in Haiti and access
25	to information in Haiti.

5 SEC. 6. SUPPORTING POST-EARTHQUAKE, POST-HURRI6 CANE, AND POST-COVID-19 RECOVERY AND 7 DEVELOPMENT IN HAITI.

8 The Secretary of State, in coordination with the Ad-9 ministrator of the United States Agency for International 10 Development, shall prioritize post-earthquake, post-hurri-11 cane, and post-COVID-19 recovery and development efforts 12 in Haiti through the following methods:

(1) Collaborating with the Government of Haiti
on a detailed and transparent development plan that
includes clear objectives and benchmarks.

16 (2) Building the capacity of Haitian-led public,
17 private, and nongovernmental sector institutions in
18 Haiti through post-earthquake and post-hurricane re19 covery and development planning.

20 (3) Assessing the impact of the recovery efforts of
21 the United States and the international community
22 in Haiti since January 2010.

23 (4) Supporting disaster resilience and recon24 struction efforts.

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1	(5) Addressing the underlying causes of poverty
2	and inequality.
3	(6) Improving access to—
4	(A) health resources;
5	(B) public health technical assistance; and
6	(C) clean water, food, and shelter.
7	(7) Assessing the impact of the COVID-19 pan-
8	demic on post-disaster recovery efforts and evaluating
9	United States support needed to help with the pan-
10	demic response in Haiti.
11	(8) Supporting—
12	(A) the export of additional United States-
13	produced COVID-19 vaccine doses to Haiti; and
14	(B) the safe storage, transport, and end-to-
15	end distribution of United States-produced
16	COVID-19 vaccines throughout Haiti, in light of
17	ongoing humanitarian access challenges pre-
18	sented by Haiti's security environment.
19	SEC. 7. REPORT ON DEVELOPMENTS IN HAITI.
20	(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the
21	date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State,
22	in coordination with the Administrator of the United States
23	Agency for International Development (in this section re-
24	ferred to as the "Administrator") and other relevant agen-

cies and departments, shall submit to the appropriate con gressional committees a report on developments in Haiti.
 (b) ELEMENTS.—The report required by subsection (a)
 shall include the following:

5 (1) A strategy for carrying out sections 4(a), 5,
6 and 6, including established baselines, benchmarks,
7 and indicators to measure outcomes and impact.

8 (2) An assessment of major corruption com-9 mitted among the public and private sectors in Haiti, 10 including identification of any individual or entity 11 that financed corruption activities, and all corruption 12 prosecutions investigated by the judiciary of Haiti 13 since January 2015.

14 (3) An overview of efforts of the Government of
15 Haiti to address corruption, including the Petrocaribe
16 scandal, and corrective measures to strengthen and re17 store trust in the public institutions of Haiti.

(4) A description of efforts of the United States
Government to consult and engage with officials of the
Government of Haiti and independent civil society
groups focused on monitoring corruption and human
rights abuses and promoting democracy and press
freedom in Haiti since January 2015.

24 (5) A description of the response by the Govern25 ment of Haiti to civic protests that have taken place

1	since July 2018 and any allegations of human rights
2	abuses, including attacks on journalists.
3	(6) An assessment of United States security as-
4	sistance to Haiti, including United States support to
5	the Haitian National Police and an assessment of
6	compliance with section 620M of the Foreign Assist-
7	ance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2378d) and section 362
8	of title 10, United States Code (commonly referred to
9	as the "Leahy Laws").
10	(7) A description of the efforts of the Government
11	of Haiti to support displaced survivors of urban and
12	gang violence.
13	(8) An assessment of United States interagency
14	efforts to counter kidnapping and armed violence in
15	Haiti.
16	(9) An assessment of the impact of presidential
17	decrees on the health of Haiti's democratic institu-
18	tions and the safeguarding of human rights, including
19	decrees relating to—
20	(A) reducing the authority of the Superior
21	Court of Accounts and Administrative Litiga-
22	tion;
23	(B) promulgating an antiterrorism law;
24	(C) establishing the National Intelligence
25	Agency; and

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1	(D) retiring and subsequently appointing
2	judges to the Supreme Court of Haiti.
3	(10) A review of the alleged coup against Presi-
4	dent Moïse on February 7, 2021, and subsequent ar-
5	rest and jailings of alleged perpetrators.
6	(11) An analysis, conducted in collaboration
7	with the Government of Haiti, of efforts to support
8	development goals in Haiti since January 2015, in-
9	cluding steps taken—
10	(A) to strengthen institutions at the na-
11	tional and local levels; and
12	(B) to strengthen democratic governance at
13	the national and local levels.
14	(12) An analysis of the effectiveness and sustain-
15	ability of development projects financed by the United
16	States, including the Caracol Industrial Park and
17	supporting infrastructure.
18	(13) A description of procurement from Haitian
19	small- and medium-sized businesses and nongovern-
20	mental organizations by the Government of the
21	United States and the Government of Haiti for devel-
22	opment and humanitarian activities, disaggregated
23	by year since 2015, and a description of efforts to in-
24	crease local procurement, including food aid.

(14) A description of United States efforts since
 January 2015 to assist the Haitian people in their
 pursuits for free, fair, and timely democratic elec tions.

5 (15) An overview of United States efforts to co-6 operate with diplomatic partners in Latin America, 7 the Caribbean, Canada, and Europe to engage with 8 political leaders, civil society, the private sector, and 9 underrepresented populations in Haiti to support a 10 stable environment conducive to holding free and fair 11 elections.

(16) Quantitative and qualitative indicators to
assess progress and benchmarks for United States initiatives focused on sustainable development in Haiti,
including democracy assistance, economic revitalization, natural disaster recovery, pandemic response,
resilience, energy and infrastructure, health, and food
security.

(c) CONSULTATION.—In preparing the report required
by subsection (a), the Secretary and the Administrator shall
consult, as appropriate, with—

(1) nongovernmental organizations and civil society groups in Haiti and the United States; and

24 (2) the Government of Haiti.

(d) PUBLIC AVAILABILITY.—The Secretary shall make
 the report required by subsection (a) publicly available on
 the website of the Department of State.

4 SEC. 8. REPORT ON THE ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT 5 JOVENEL MOÏSE.

6 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 90 days after the 7 date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State, 8 in coordination with the Attorney General, the Secretary 9 of Homeland Security, and the Director of the Central In-10 telligence Agency, shall submit to the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate and the Committee on Foreign Af-11 fairs of the House of Representatives a report on the July 12 7, 2021, assassination of former President of Haiti Jovenel 13 Moïse. 14

15 (b) UPDATED REPORT.—Not later than 180 days after the submission of the report required by subsection (a), the 16 Secretary of State, in coordination with the Attorney Gen-17 eral, the Secretary of Homeland Security, and the Director 18 of the Central Intelligence Agency, shall submit to the Com-19 mittee on Foreign Relations of the Senate and the Com-20 21 mittee on Foreign Affairs of the House of Representatives 22 an updated version of the report that includes any signifi-23 cant developments related to the assassination of former President of Haiti Jovenel Moïse. 24

(c) ELEMENTS.—The report required by subsection (a)
 and the report required by subsection (b) shall each include
 the following elements:

4 (1) A detailed description of the events leading
5 up to the assassination of former President Jovenel
6 Moïse and the subsequent investigation of the assas7 sination, including a description and identification of
8 key dates and the names of foreign persons related to
9 the assassination and the investigation of the assas10 sination.

(2) A description of United States support for
 the efforts of Haitian authorities to investigate the as sassination of former President Jovenel Moïse.

14 (3) An assessment of the independence and ca15 pacity of Haitian authorities to investigate the assas16 sination of former President Jovenel Moïse, including
17 analysis of significant advances and deficiencies of
18 the investigation.

(4) A description of any threats and acts of intimidation against Haitian law enforcement and judicial authorities involved in the investigation of the
assassination of former President Jovenel Moïse, including the identification of foreign persons involved
in such threats and acts of intimidation.

1	(5) A description of any efforts to interfere in or
2	undermine the independence and integrity of the in-
3	vestigation of the assassination of former President
4	Jovenel Moïse.
5	(6) A description of whether any foreign persons
6	previously employed by or who served as a contractor
7	or informant for the United States Government were
8	involved in the assassination of former President
9	Jovenel Moïse.
10	(7) A description and the identification of for-
11	eign persons involved in the execution and planning
12	of the assassination of former President Jovenel Moïse
13	and an assessment of the intentions of such foreign
14	persons.
15	(d) FORM OF REPORT.—The report required by sub-
16	section (a) and the updated report required by subsection
17	(b) shall each be submitted in an unclassified form, but each
18	may include a classified annex.
19	(e) PUBLICATION.—The Secretary of State shall post
20	on the public website of the Department of State—
21	(1) the unclassified version of the report required
22	by subsection (a) not later than 15 days after the date
23	on which the report is submitted under such sub-
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24 section; and

(2) the unclassified version of the report required
 by subsection (b) not later than 15 days after the date
 on which the report is submitted under such sub section.

(f) BRIEFING REQUIREMENT.—The Secretary of State, *in* coordination with the Attorney General, the Secretary *of* Homeland Security, and the Director of the Central In-*telligence* Agency, shall brief the Committee on Foreign Re-*lations* of the Senate and the Committee on Foreign Affairs *of* the House of Representatives on—

(1) the contents of the report required by subsection (a) not later than 15 days after the date on
which the report is submitted under such subsection;
and

(2) the contents of the report required by subsection (b) not later than 15 days after the date on
which the report is submitted under such subsection.
SEC. 9. REPEAL.

19 The Assessing Progress in Haiti Act of 2014 (22
20 U.S.C. 2151 note; Public Law 113–162) is repealed.

1 SEC. 10. TERMINATION.

2 This Act shall terminate on December 31, 2025.
