A BILL

To require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint coins
in commemoration of the United States Coast Guard.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the “United States Coast
5 Guard Commemorative Coin Act”.

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

7 The Congress finds the following:

1 (1) The United States Coast Guard was founded
2 on August 4, 1790, as the Revenue Cutter Service
3 under the United States Department of the
4 Treasury.

5 (2) Congress created the Coast Guard on January
6 28, 1915, by merging the Revenue Cutter Service
7 and the United States Lifesaving Service, was
8 moved to the Department of Transportation in
9 1967, and on February 25, 2003, became part of
10 the Department of Homeland Security.

11 (3) Although the smallest of the uniformed
12 services, today the United States Coast Guard conducts
13 a wide variety of missions to protect the public,
14 the environment, and the United States economic
15 and security interests in any maritime region, including
16 international waters and America's coasts,
17 ports, and inland waterways.

18 (4) Every day, the United States Coast Guard
19 plays a broad and important role in homeland security,
20 law enforcement, search and rescue, marine environmental
21 pollution response, and the maintenance
22 of river, intra-coastal and offshore aids to navigation
23 (ATON).

24 (5) The United States Coast Guard is our Nation's
25 oldest seasoning military service, staying true

1 to their motto, Semper Paratus or “Always Ready,”
2 for 223 years.

3 (6) The United States Coast Guard has an esti-
4 mated 42,300 men and women on active duty, who
5 in 2012 responded to nearly 20,000 search and res-
6 cue incidents saving over 3,500 lives and protecting
7 \$77 million in property, removed 107 metric tons of
8 cocaine and 56 metric tons of marijuana headed to
9 the United States, and interdicted nearly 3,000 un-
10 documented migrants on the high seas attempting to
11 illegally enter the United States.

12 (7) Section 213 of Public Law 108–293 states
13 that “The Commandant may establish a National
14 Coast Guard Museum, on lands which will be feder-
15 ally owned and administered by the Coast Guard,
16 and are located in New London, Connecticut, at, or
17 in close proximity to, the Coast Guard Academy”.

18 (8) The National Coast Guard Museum Asso-
19 ciation, a nonprofit association dedicated to improve
20 public understanding of the history, service and mis-
21 sions of the Coast Guard, is working with the
22 United States Coast Guard, the City of New Lon-
23 don, the State of Connecticut, and a range of local,
24 regional, and national stakeholders to develop, plan

1 and raise capital for the National Coast Guard Mu-
2 seum, to be located in New London, Connecticut.

3 (9) The United States Coast Guard is the only
4 military service without a national museum through
5 which to share its history and legacy with the Amer-
6 ican public.

7 **SEC. 3. COIN SPECIFICATIONS.**

8 (a) DENOMINATIONS.—The Secretary of the Treas-
9 ury (hereafter in this Act referred to as the “Secretary”)
10 shall mint and issue the following coins:

11 (1) \$5 GOLD COINS.—Not more than 100,000
12 \$5 coins, which shall—

13 (A) weigh 8.359 grams;
14 (B) have a diameter of 0.850 inches; and
15 (C) contain 90 percent gold and 10 percent
16 alloy.

17 (2) \$1 SILVER COINS.—Not more than 500,000
18 \$1 coins, which shall—

19 (A) weigh 26.73 grams;
20 (B) have a diameter of 1.500 inches; and
21 (C) contain 90 percent silver and 10 per-
22 cent copper.

23 (3) HALF DOLLAR CLAD COINS.—Not more
24 than 750,000 half dollar coins, which shall—

25 (A) weigh 11.34 grams;

5 (b) LEGAL TENDER.—The coins minted under this
6 Act shall be legal tender, as provided in section 5103 of
7 title 31, United States Code.

8 (c) NUMISMATIC ITEMS.—For purposes of sections
9 5134 and 5136 of title 31, United States Code, all coins
10 minted under this Act shall be considered to be numis-
11 matic items.

12 SEC. 4. DESIGN OF COIN.

13 (a) DESIGN REQUIREMENTS.—

1 (b) SELECTION.—The design for the coins minted
2 under this Act shall—

3 (1) contain motifs that specifically honor the
4 American Coast Guardsman of both today and yes-
5 terday, in wartime and in peace, such designs to be
6 consistent with the traditions and heritage of the
7 United States Coast Guard, the mission and goals of
8 the National Coast Guard Museum, and the mis-
9 sions and goals of the National Coast Guard Mu-
10 seum Foundation;

11 (2) be selected by the Secretary, after consulta-
12 tion with the Secretary of Homeland Security, the
13 National Coast Guard Museum Foundation, and the
14 Commission of Fine Arts; and

15 (3) be reviewed by the Citizens Coinage Advi-
16 sory Committee.

17 **SEC. 5. ISSUANCE OF COINS.**

18 (a) QUALITY OF COINS.—Coins minted under this
19 Act shall be issued in uncirculated and proof qualities.

20 (b) MINT FACILITIES.—For each of the 3 coins mint-
21 ed under this Act, at least 1 facility of the United States
22 Mint shall be used to strike proof quality coins, while at
23 least 1 other such facility shall be used to strike the uncir-
24 culated quality coins.

1 (c) PERIOD FOR ISSUANCE.—The Secretary may
2 issue coins minted under this Act only during the 1-year
3 period beginning on January 1, 2017.

4 **SEC. 6. SALE OF COINS.**

5 (a) SALE PRICE.—The coins issued under this Act
6 shall be sold by the Secretary at a price equal to the sum
7 of—

8 (1) the face value of the coins;
9 (2) the surcharge provided in section 7(a) with
10 respect to such coins; and

11 (3) the cost of designing and issuing the coins
12 (including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery,
13 overhead expenses, marketing, and shipping).

14 (b) BULK SALES.—The Secretary shall make bulk
15 sales of the coins issued under this Act at a reasonable
16 discount.

17 (c) PREPAID ORDERS.—

18 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall accept
19 prepaid orders for the coins minted under this Act
20 before the issuance of such coins.

21 (2) DISCOUNT.—Sale prices with respect to pre-
22 paid orders under paragraph (1) shall be at a rea-
23 sonable discount.

1 **SEC. 7. SURCHARGES.**

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—All sales of coins minted under
3 this Act shall include a surcharge as follows:

4 (1) A surcharge of \$35 per coin for the \$5 coin.

5 (2) A surcharge of \$10 per coin for the \$1 coin.

6 (3) A surcharge of \$5 per coin for the half dol-
7 lar coin.

8 (b) DISTRIBUTION.—Subject to section 5134(f) of
9 title 31, United States Code, all surcharges received by
10 the Secretary from the sale of coins issued under this Act
11 shall be promptly paid by the Secretary to the National
12 Coast Guard Museum Foundation to help finance the de-
13 sign, construction, operations, and maintenance of the Na-
14 tional Coast Guard Museum.

15 (c) AUDITS.—The National Coast Guard Museum
16 Foundation shall be subject to the audit requirements of
17 section 5134(f)(2) of title 31, United States Code, with
18 regard to the amounts received under subsection (b).
